- 7. Replace or repair all exterior doors of the Structure so that they are weathertight, operational, fit tightly within their frames when closed, and locked so as to prevent entry, with at least one entrance door capable of being locked from both inside and outside;
- 8. Replace or repair the ceiling were mold has occurred and ensure the roof of the Structure is in a watertight condition with no leaks;
- Replace or repair balconies and porches to a safe and clean condition free from rot, holes, cracks, excessive wear and warping, or hazardous obstructions; and

Replace or repair all fire protections systems, heat detections, smoke detections, fire alarms, fire extinguishers, fire caulking, sprinkler systems, exit signs, emergency lighting, fire separations and means of egress required by the BC Building Code and BC Fire Code to a functional and unobstructed condition;

Held on an annual basis, the LGLA Leadership Forum provides relevant and timely leadership development opportunities to elected officials and senior administrators in the interest of improving governance at a municipal level.

The BRE: Building Strong and Resilient Communities workshop is a four-part series presenting the core components of the Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) program, including how to understand and address business needs, and how to build and manage a BRE program. Participants will learn how to engage with local businesses to gather solid business and worker impact data to inform local leadership's response and create resiliency in communities.

Councillor Haggard expressed interest in participating in the Forum and Workshop and while the City's Travel Expense Policy authorizes members of Council to attend AVICC and UBCM, members of Council wishing to participate in additional conferences requires authorization on the part of Council.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- 1. That Council authorize Councillor Haggard's participation in the Annual Local Government Leadership Academy Forum and BC Economic Development Association Workshop.
- 2. In addition to Councillor Haggard, Council may wish to authorize other members of Council to participate virtually.
- 3. That Council not authorize Councillor Haggard to participate in the LGLA Forum or BCEDA Workshop.

ANALYSIS

Option 1- The City's 2020-2024 Five-Year Financial Plan currently identifies \$50,000 to fund 2020 Council Travel and Development. Cost to register Councillor Haggard to participate in the Forum is \$200 plus GST and \$300 plus GST for the Workshop series. Due to COVID-19 and the associated restrictions on public gatherings resulting in a shift to 'virtual' conference platforms, travel costs on the part of Council members to attend conferences/development opportunities has been significantly reduced. At the writing of this report [approximately \$41,000.00] remains in Council's Travel and Development fund. As the Forum and Workshop is being held virtually, no additional expenses outside of registration fees are anticipated.

Option 2 – Council may wish to authorize additional members of Council to participate in the Forum and/or Workshop given the affordable registration fees and no additional expenses being associated with participating.

Option 3 – It is Council's prerogative to either support and/or deny the attendance of Council members at a particular conference/convention outside of those identified in the City's *Travel Expense Policy No. P6*. When considering an item based on policy, Council is encouraged to consider the merits of the conference and development being offered and how City representation will contribute to the betterment of the City.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial implications associated with Councillor Haggard's virtual participation in the LGLA Leadership Forum is \$200 plus GST and \$300 plus GST for BCEDA Workshop. The balance of Council's 2020 Travel and Development fund at the writing of this report is \$41,035.58.

ANALYSIS

Should the bid to host the 2026 BC Summer Games be successful, the legacy and economic impact to the Alberni Valley would be significant.

That Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to seek comment on next steps from the Ministry of Environment;

That Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to prepare a report recommending potential local and professional participants who might sit on a City advisory group;

That Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to send a letter of thanks to Dr. Hasselback. CARRIED At Council's Regular meeting held November 23, 2020, Mr. John Adams, who resides on Batty Road, Port Alberni, submitted the following questions which were read out by the Director of Corporate Services during Council's Question period.

Response received by provincial staff note that they can only provide advice with respect to legislation around management of contaminated sites. As for septic systems, they do not typically comment [Health Authority is the area of responsibility].

This report is being provided for Council's information.

PURPOSE

To provide Council with approximate cost estimates associated with making an application for exclusion to the Agricultural Land Commission for property located/designated ALR [Mclean Mill].

BACKGROUND

The McLean Mill National Historic Site [MMNHS] is owned by the City. The City has entered into an agreement with the Alberni Valley Chamber of Commerce to maintain and operate the Mill on the City's behalf. The City recently made a Non-Farm Use Application to the ALC in an effort to come into compliance with ALR regulations while maintaining current services at McLean Mill. While the City's application was denied, a statement contained in the response from ALC indicated that the ALC [the Panel] would accept a submission of an exclusion application for the Property for the Commission's consideration noting that any such application would be considered by the Commission based on the merits of the application and in the context of the Commission's mandate.

At Council's Regular meeting held November 9, 2020, Council considered a recommendation that staff be directed to prepare and submit an application to the Agricultural Land Commission to have the MMNHS removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve. Prior to Council deciding on the matter, staff clarified that the City would be engaging the services of third-party consultants to assist the City with making an exclusion application [e.g., engineer/agrologist.] Council then resolved as follows:

MOVED and SECONDED, THAT Council direct staff to bring forward a report outlining associated costs involved with preparing and submitting an application to the Agricultural Land Commission to have the MMNHS removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve. **CARRIED | Res. No. R20-280**

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

This report is being provided for Council's information and as such, no alternatives/options are being provided.



ANALYSIS

Effective September 30, 2020, the ALC has prepared an Exclusion Application Guide for local governments to follow should they wish to initiate an exclusion application. Steps include completing a prescribed application form, signage, notices [for required public hearing], confirmation the public hearing has been held, resolution of Council to forward or not forward the application and documentation that confirms the local government has followed the steps noted in the guide. An application fee of \$750 must be included with the completed application at which time ALC will begin processing the application. [Sample application is attached].

Upon review of the application, item 4 - Land Use may be seen as labour intensive as well as preparing for, and holding the required public hearing.

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EXCLUSION APPLICATION GUIDE

EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 30, 2020

Published August 6, 2020

Purpose: this guide is intended to outline the process for submitting a local or First Nation government initiated or prescribed body initiated exclusion application to the Agricultural Land Commission as of September 30, 2020.

LOCAL OR FIRST NATION GOVERNMENT INITIATED EXCLUSION APPLICATIONS

STEP 1: Local or First Nation Government Fills out the Application

- Log into the ALC Application Portal using your local or First Nation government's BCeID Business account, found here: http://a100.gov.bc.ca/pub/oatsp/list?execution=e1s1
 - Please contact the ALC if your local or First Nation government does not currently have an account registered with the Portal
 - The ALC must also assign a local or First Nation government 'role' to every local or First Nation government staff BCeID used to submit a local or First Nation government initiated application
- Create the exclusion application
- Complete the application up to Step 7 and save (do not submit the application). You can
 move between the steps, save and exit the application multiple times
- Download a copy of the application

STEP 2: Local or First Nation Government Gives Notice of the Application

Sign:

- Post a sign on the affected parcel(s) advising of the exclusion application
 - Contact the ALC to confirm where to place signs if multiple parcels are involved
- The Sign must be:
 - at least 60 cm x 120 cm in size
 - located at the midpoint boundary of the parcel fronting a roadway
- Provide a summary of the application and a map showing the subject parcel(s)

Notice of Public Hearing:

- Provide notice of the public hearing in at least two issues of a local newspaper, with the last notice appearing not less than 3 days and not more than 10 days before the public hearing. Should your area not have a local newspaper, please contact the ALC to discuss alternative notice options
- Notice must identify:

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- Time and place of the public hearing
- Parcel(s) affected
- Intent of the application
- When and where application will be reviewed

❖ Notice of Application:

 Provide a copy of the application to adjacent or affected local or First Nation governments, where applicable

STEP 3: Local or First Nation Government Holds the Public Hearing

- Hold the public hearing in accordance with s. 465 of the Local Government Act
 - At the public hearing:
 - All persons must be afforded an opportunity to speak
 - Public hearing may be adjourned from time to time
 - A Council/Board member who did not attend public hearing may vote on the application if provided with a written or oral report of public hearing

STEP 4: Local or First Nation Government Passes a Resolution on the Application

- Council/Board passes a resolution to forward or not forward the application to the ALC
 - If forwarded, the application proceeds to the ALC for consideration (see Step 5 below)
 - If not forwarded, the application is refused.
- Local or First Nation government will update the application status in the ALC Application
 Portal to reflect the outcome of the Council/Board's resolution

STEP 5: Local or First Nation Government Submits the Application

- Proof of notice must be submitted with your application including a copy of the newspaper advertisement and photographs of the sign showing the location of posting in relation to the road or other public access
- Upload public hearing report and any other public comments received
- Upload a copy of the local or First Nation government Council/Board resolution
- Include any other application materials

STEP 6: Local or First Nation Government Pays the Application Fee

- Submit the \$750 application fee to the ALC
 - Fees can be paid by cheque (made out to the Minister of Finance) or by credit card over the phone or in person

STEP 7: ALC Holds the Exclusion Meeting

 Once a completed application and prescribed fee is received, ALC processing of the application will begin

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- The ALC must offer an exclusion meeting with written notice to the local or First Nation government not more than 30 days before the meeting
- If the ALC considers it advisable, the ALC may notify adjacent or affected landowners of the parcel(s) subject to the application
- In advance of the exclusion meeting, the ALC must give notice of the materials that will be considered at the meeting, and any new information received
- At the exclusion there may be:
 - representations from the local or First Nation government (e.g. a presentation)
 - written submissions and other forms of evidence to be considered by ALC
 - representations, evidence, opinions of any person present at meeting
- Following the exclusion meeting, the ALC will provide a draft summary of the exclusion meeting proceedings (the "exclusion meeting report") for verification and sign-off by the local or First Nation government

STEP 8: ALC Makes a Decision on the Application

- The ALC must make a decision on the application taking in consideration its mandate under s. 6(1) and the priorities it must consider in doing so under s. 6(2) of the ALC Act. More information about what the ALC generally considers when making a decision on applications can be found here: https://www.alc.gov.bc.ca/alc/content/applications-and-decisions/what-the-commission-considers
- The ALC must provide a decision in writing, whether to refuse, approve (with or without conditions), or approve as an alternate use, such as a non-farm use
- The ALC strives to communicate most of its decisions, in writing (electronic or mail), within 60 business days of an application being received and the majority of its decisions in 90 business days. Please be advised that the 60 and 90 business day application process timeline may not be consecutive given the specifics of an application; the ALC may "pause" the business day timelines should any of the following be required:
 - The exclusion meeting
 - A site visit
 - A request for additional information (from the local government or any other person considered appropriate)

ATTACHMENT A:

APPLICABLE ACT AND REGULATION SECTIONS FOR LOCAL OR FIRST NATION GOVERNMENT INITIATED EXCLUSION APPLICATIONS

ALC Act

Note: These sections of the ALC Act come into force and effect September 30, 2020. See <u>Bill</u> 15-2019 for text until BC Laws is updated.

- s. 29 (1) A person may apply to the commission to have land excluded from the agricultural land reserve if the person is
 - (a) the owner of the land and is
 - (i) the Province, a first nation government or a local government, or
 - (ii) a prescribed public body,
 - (b) a local government, and the land is within the local government's jurisdiction, or
 - (c) a first nation government, and the land is within the first nation's settlement lands.
 - (2) Subject to subsection (3),
 - (a) an applicant must give notice, in the prescribed form and manner and before making the application, of the application and of a public hearing respecting that application, and
 - (b) the public hearing must be held in the prescribed manner.
 - (3) On request of an applicant described in subsection (1) (a), the commission may waive one or more of the requirements of subsection (2).
 - (4) An application made by an applicant described in subsection (1) (a) may not proceed unless authorized as follows:
 - (a) by a resolution of a local government if the application is made by a person other than a first nation government and, on the date the application is made, the application
 - (i) applies to land within the local government's jurisdiction that is zoned by bylaw to permit farm use, or

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- (ii) requires, in order to proceed, an amendment to an official settlement plan, official community plan, official development plan or zoning bylaw of the local government;
- (b) by a law of a first nation government if the application applies to settlement lands over which the first nation has legislative authority.
- s. 29.1 (1) In this section, "decision respecting proposed settlement lands" means a decision of the commission made under subsection (2) (b) or (c) of this section on receiving an application under section 29
 - (a) by an applicant described in subsection (1) (a) of that section, and
 - (b) in relation to proposed settlement lands.
 - (2) On receiving an application under section 29, the commission may do one of the following:
 - (a) refuse permission to have land excluded from the agricultural land reserve;
 - (b) grant permission, with or without limits or conditions, to have land excluded from the agricultural land reserve;
 - (c) permit, with or without limits or conditions, a non-farm use, non-adhering residential use, soil or fill use or subdivision of land.
 - (3) A decision respecting proposed settlement lands is not effective unless and until
 - (a) those lands are established, in whole or in part, as settlement lands, and
 - (b) the first nation government that has jurisdiction over those settlement lands enacts a law approving the commission's decision and provides a certified copy of the law to the commission.
 - (4) Unless a decision respecting proposed settlement lands first becomes effective under subsection (3), the decision expires on the earlier of the following dates:
 - (a) the date the decision expires according to its terms;
 - (b) the date a notice to suspend negotiations takes effect.
 - (5) The commission must deliver its written decision to the applicant.
 - s. 34 (1) This section applies to the following types of applications:

- (a) an application made by a first nation government as the owner of proposed settlement lands, other than an inclusion application under section 17;
- (b) an exclusion application made by a person referred to in section 29 (1) (b) or (c);
- (c) an application for which review would be required under section 34.1, but the application is made by the local government or first nation government that would be responsible for the review;
- (d) an application for a specific type of use prescribed by regulation as an application that must be filed directly with the commission;
- (e) an application made under section 58.3 (1) (e), unless a regulation made under that section provides otherwise.
- (2) A person may make an application described in subsection (1) by submitting the application and paying the prescribed application fee to the commission.
- (3) In respect of an application described in subsection (1) (d), the commission
 - (a) may request comments and information from the local government or first nation government for the area in which the land described in the application is located, and
 - (b) if a request is made under paragraph (a) of this subsection, pay a prescribed portion of the fee received under subsection (2) to the local government or first nation government.
- (4) A local government or first nation government that is paid a fee under subsection (3)
- (b) may retain the fee, and the *Financial Administration Act* does not apply in relation to that fee.
- s. 34.1 (1) A person may make an application to which section 34 does not apply by submitting the application and paying the prescribed application fee, if any, to the following, as applicable:
 - (a) the municipality, if the land described in the application is in a municipality;
 - (b) the regional district, if the land described in the application is in a regional district but not in a municipality or a local trust area;

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- (c) the Islands Trust, if the land described in the application is within a local trust area under the *Islands Trust Act*;
- (d) the first nation government, if the land described in the application is in the settlement lands of a first nation.
- (2) A local government or first nation government that receives an application must review the application and do one of the following:
 - (a) forward to the commission
 - (i) the application, and
 - (ii) the comments and recommendations of the local government or first nation government respecting the application;
 - (b) notify the applicant that the application will not be forwarded to the commission if
 - (i) the application is refused, or
 - (ii) the application may not, under this Act, proceed unless authorized by a resolution of the local government or a law of the first nation government and the required resolution or law is refused.
- (3) If a local government or first nation government forwards an application under subsection (2) (a) to the commission, the applicant must pay the prescribed application fee, if any, to the commission.
- (4) The application fee that must be paid under subsection (3) is in addition to the application fee, if any, paid under subsection (1).
- (5) A local government or first nation government that collects a fee under subsection (1) may retain the fee, and the *Financial Administration Act* does not apply in relation to that fee.

ALR General Regulation – Effective September 30, 2020

Note: These sections of the ALR General Regulation (BC Reg. 57/2020) come into force and effect September 30, 2020. See OIC 131/2020 for text until BC Laws is updated.

Procedures at meetings and public hearings

- s. 9 (1) a local government or a first nation government that holds a public hearing with respect to an application may, without limiting any other powers of the commission, local government, first nation government or public body applicant,
 - (a) designate the date, time and place for the meeting or public hearing, and
 - (b) adjourn the meeting or public hearing
 - (2) a local government or a first nation government holding a public hearing
 - (a) must give all persons present an opportunity to be heard on matters related to the proposal or application that is the subject of the public hearing, and
 - (b) may, without further notice, allow a proposal or application that is the subject of the public hearing to be amended to accommodate representations made at that public hearing
 - (3) a local government or a first nation government who was not present at a public hearing may vote on the proposal or application that was the subject of the public hearing if an oral or written report of the public hearing has been given to the member

Applications by local or First Nation government applicants

- **s. 14** (1) If a local or first nation government applicant is applying to include land in, or exclude agricultural land from, the agricultural land reserve, the applicant must do all of the following:
 - (a) give notice of the application not less than 3 days and not more than 10 days before the date of the public hearing;
 - (b) give a copy of the application to the following:
 - (i) if the land that is the subject of the application is adjacent to an area over which a different local government or first nation government has jurisdiction, that different local government or first nation government;
 - (ii) each local government or first nation government whose interests, the local or first nation government applicant believes, will be affected by the application;
 - (c) include with the application
 - (i) a report of the public hearing and any additional public comments,

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and

- (ii) any other supporting material the commission may require;
- (d) post a sign, in a form and manner acceptable to the commission, on the land that is the subject of the application.
- (2) Despite subsection (1) (b), a local or first nation government applicant is not required to give a copy of an application to a first nation government referred to in paragraph (b) of the definition of "first nation government" in section 1 of the Act.

Notice of public hearing

- s. 15 (1) A notice of a public hearing must be given in accordance with this section by
 - (a) the commission, in respect of a proposal on the commissions' own initiative to include land in, or exclude agricultural land from, the agricultural land reserve, and
 - (b) a local or first nation government applicant, in respect of an application by the applicant to include land in, or exclude agricultural land from, the agricultural land reserve.
 - (2) The notice must do all of the following:
 - (a) state the general intent of the proposal or application;
 - (b) identify the land affected, whether by using the legal description or by describing the land generally;
 - (c) state the date, time and place of the public hearing;
 - (d) state when and where a copy of the proposal or application may be inspected.
 - (3) The notice must be published as follows:
 - (a) publication must be in at least 2 issues of a newspaper within the meaning of the *Community Charter*;
 - (b) the newspaper must be circulated in the municipality, regional district or settlement lands within which the land that is the subject of the proposal or application is located;

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- (c) the last publication must be circulated not less than 3 days and not more than 10 days before the date of the public hearing.
- (4) Despite subsection (3) of this section, if the requirements of that subsection are not practical, the commission or local or first nation government applicant, as applicable, may give notice in the same manner as a council may give notice under section 94 (4) and (5) of the *Community Charter*.

Commission meeting

- s. 20 (1) The commission must do all of the following:
 - (a) hold a meeting to determine an exclusion application;
 - (b) not more than 30 days before the meeting, give written notice of the meeting to
 - (i) the applicant,
 - (ii) the local government or first nation government that has jurisdiction over the agricultural land that is the subject of the application, and
 - (iii) if the commission considers it advisable, each owner of agricultural land that shares a common boundary with, or is separated by a public road right of way from, the agricultural land that is the subject of the application;
 - (c) before the meeting, give notice to the applicant of the following:
 - (i) the information, if any, related to the application that will be considered at the meeting;
 - (ii) any new information that becomes available.
 - (2) At the meeting, the commission may do one or more of the following:
 - (a) hear representations from the applicant;
 - (b) accept written submissions or any other form of evidence, whether or not it would be admissible as evidence in a court of law;
 - (c) hear representations, evidence and opinions the commission considers

relevant of

- (i) any person present or represented at the meeting, and
- (ii) the local government or first nation government that has jurisdiction over the agricultural land that is the subject of the application.

Evidence presented at meeting

- s. 21 (1) This section applies if
 - (a) evidence is presented at a meeting of the commission held to determine an exclusion application, and
 - (b) a statement or summary of that evidence has not been given to the applicant before the meeting.
 - (2) If the applicant is present at the meeting, the commission may
 - (a) hear further representations in respect of the evidence, or
 - (b) adjourn the meeting to enable the applicant to answer the evidence.
 - (3) If the applicant is not present at the meeting, the commission must notify the applicant personally or by registered or electronic mail of
 - (a) the evidence, and
 - (b) the date by which the additional evidence may be answered.

PURPOSE

To provide an update to Council as it relates to buildings located at 3123 3rd Avenue & 4781 Margaret Street.

BACKGROUND

At Council's Regular meeting August 10, 2020 Council resolved as follows:

MOVED and SECONDED, THAT Council direct staff to prepare a report providing an update as it relates to properties located at 3123 3rd Avenue and 4781 Margaret Street for Council's information at its next Regular meeting. CARRIED | Res. No. R20-204

While staff had intended to provide this information to Council at its Regular meeting in September, staff were addressing a number of other higher priority properties requiring the City's attention at the time.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

This report is being provided to Council for information purposes only and therefore, no alternatives/options are identified.

ANALYSIS

3123 3rd Avenue - The property at 3123 3rd Avenue is owned by 568165 BC Ltd. A previous application under the Façade Improvement Program was approved with a deadline for completion of the work extended to March 20, 2020. Given that no work had been undertaken by the extended deadline date, the Program Administrator of Community Futures Alberni-Clayoquot advised the property owner that his previously approved application had been closed and that the owner was no longer eligible for funding due to failure to meet program requirements.

In mid 2020, the owner subsequently began to undertake improvements to the building façade including applying for a building permit to address the window retrofit. When renovations began, it was noted that the structural integrity of the building may be compromised and led to the requirement of a second building permit application engaging a professional engineer to speak to the structural integrity of the building. At the writing of this report, the two building permit applications have not been issued due to outstanding requirements on the part of the property owner. In addition, the property owner is also required to apply for a Development Permit given changes proposed for the upper floor and in keeping with the City's guidelines.

4781 Margaret Street - On March 11, 2019 Council unanimously passed a resolution declaring the property at 4781 Margaret Street a nuisance and imposed remedial action requirements to:

- a) demolish the damaged building;
- b) remove all debris from the demolition to an appropriate disposal site; and
- c) level the site

At the writing of this report, the property is currently in foreclosure and demolition has not occurred. There is an offer to purchase the subject property and the sale is pending court approval with courts scheduled to hear the application on December 16th. Should the sale of the property be approved at court, the contract of purchase and sale is scheduled to complete December 30° 2020. The potential purchaser is aware of the requirements outlined above and if the sale is finalized, a date for completion of the works will be determined in consultation with the new owner.

RECOMMENDATION[S]

PURPOSE

This report is provided to update Council regarding progress on the mitigation of damage caused by a release of bunker oil at McLean Mill.

BACKGROUND

On November 3, 2020 the CAO reported to Council that sometime prior to October 26th a locked valve was opened on a rail tank car at McLean Mill National Historic Site releasing bunker oil onto the ground. The volume of oil released has been estimated at 6,000 liters. Bunker Oil was stored on site as fuel for the Alberni Pacific Railway's steam locomotive. The tank car has now been removed from the site.

The City engaged TerraWest Environmental as prime contractor to manage the spill mitigation and clean up. Subcontractors included:

- Coastal Bridge & Construction Ltd excavation and backfilling
- D.R. Clough Consulting biological investigation
- Element Materials Tech. Canada Inc. laboratory sample testing and reporting
- TerraPure Environmental hydrovac, haul & dispose contaminated water and soil
- Walco Industries Ltd. hydrovac contaminated water
- Drillwell Enterprises Ltd. install monitoring wells

The release of oil was reported to Ministry of Environment, Department of Fisheries, and Alberni Clayoquot Regional District. The City has also engaged with other regulatory agencies regarding this incident.

Released oil and contaminated water have been recovered and transported to a licensed disposal facility on southern Vancouver Island. Contaminated soil was removed and transported to Summit Earthworks' licensed disposal facility located in Mission BC. The resulting excavation has been backfilled with clean aggregate material. There is no evidence that bunker oil entered any stream.

There will be an ongoing requirement that the spill site be monitored for evidence of residual contamination. Several monitoring wells have been installed for that purpose.

The City's full costs related to mitigation and clean up of the oil release have not yet been determine as the City has not yet been invoiced for several elements of the response efforts. A claim has been filed with the City's



insurer. The City holds a Land and Water Pollution Cleanup insurance policy with an aggregate maximum of \$100,000 (\$10,000 deductible). The costs incurred in responding to the oil release will significantly exceed the insurance policy limit. It is anticipated that a full costing for the City's response to the incident will be provided to Council early in 2021.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

This report is provided for information.

ANALYSIS

The magnitude and timeliness of the response required to prevent the released oil from causing environmental damage will result in significant costs not included in the City's Financial Plan. Limitations of the City's insurance coverage for environmental matters mean that, unless the person responsible for releasing the oil can be identified and the costs recovered from that person, the City will bear the cost resulting from this incident.

IMPLICATIONS

At a future meeting Council will need to allocate funds to pay the costs of remediation. This will impact the City's ability to provide other services and/or achieve strategic goals.

SUMMARY

Sometime prior to November 26, 2020 an unknown person opened a locked valve on a rail tank car at McLean Mill National Historic Site, releasing an estimated 6,000 liters of bunker oil. The City responded to that incident with considerable effort, engaging a number of professionals and contractors. The oil has been recovered and disposed of. Contaminated soil has been removed and disposed of.

Costs for the response to this incident, while not yet finalized, are anticipated to be impactful to the City. There will also be a requirement that the City conduct ongoing monitoring of the site.

McLean Mill National Historic Site Oil Release

Port Alberni, BC – During the week of October 26th, the City responded to the report of a potential oil spill at McLean Mill National Historic Site. City personnel found that an undetermined amount of Bunker C oil had been released from a rail tank car on site. Early investigation into the cause of this incident indicated that the oil was released through a previously locked valve that was found to be in the 'open' position. How that valve came to be opened is currently being investigated by the R.C.M.P. The incident has been reported to the Ministry of Environment, Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District.

The rail tank car had been located on a rail siding near the eastern property boundary. It had been used to store fuel for the #7 steam engine that operated between the City and McLean Mill.

Bunker C oil is the residual oil left over after the lighter, more volatile products such as gasoline, diesel and natural gas are distilled out of crude oil. Bunker C is a heavy oil commonly used by freighters. The oil that was released from the rail tank car at McLean Mill was approximately 93 percent Bunker C oil and 7 percent diesel fuel.

The City has mobilized several contractors and professional consultant firms in order to mitigate the environmental impact. Based on preliminary inspection reports from David Clough of D.R. Clough Consulting "it would appear that fuel spill and environmental damage was limited to the railway corridor and dip tank area. At this stage of the investigation based on the visual observations by on-site professionals, there appears to be no escape into surface waters."

The rail tank car has since been removed from the McLean Mill site and contractors are currently working to remove the contaminated rail ties and ballast. Consultants are working to determine an estimate of the volume released. At present, the site is stable and contained.

RECOMMENDATION

This report is being provided for Council's information.

PURPOSE

To advise Council of:

- the progress and investments that have been made in support of the small business community in Port Alberni since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared.
- progress and investments in other economic development initiatives.

BACKGROUND

At the Regular meeting of Council on May 13, 2020 Council approved a recommendation to invest \$140,000 of the economic development allocation in support of a number of measures proposed to assist the small business community through the COVID-19 pandemic.

The measures were proposed in part by the joint ACRD-CPA Emergency Operations Centre and in part by an adhoc small business task force consisting of representatives from Community Futures Alberni-Clayoquot, the Alberni Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Port Alberni Port Authority, the Alberni Valley Employment Centre, and the City of Port Alberni.

Council approved the measures while recommending that they be adjusted if necessary to respond to changing circumstances. The measures are consolidated in a table attached as an Appendix to this report. The table lists the proposed measure, its current status, the cost of the initiative, and the source of funds.

Other economic development initiatives that are in motion include progress on the Municipal Regional District Tax and a pre-feasibility study for a seaweed research centre.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

Given the nature of this report, no alternatives are considered necessary.



ANALYSIS

- 1. Approximately \$1.28 million has been invested in these measures thus far with 85 per cent of that coming from Community Futures.
- 2. \$178,697 has been invested by the City thus far.
- 3. Our new Investment Attraction/Digital Marketing website <u>chooseportalberni.ca</u> was soft launched in October 2020. Following the completion of required modifications, a formal launch will be announced.
- 4. Following a Façade Improvement Programs survey completed across Canada, it was recommended to the City of Trail that they adopt the model implemented in Port Alberni.

IMPLICATIONS

A survey of businesses conducted in the latter half of October 2020 indicates the vast majority of those who responded believed they could survive COVID-19 Provincial Health Officer measures designed to reduce the spread of the virus. That was prior to the announcement of increasing restrictions on gatherings and prior to the revelations of positive tests for COVID-19 in Port Alberni, so it is anticipated the optimism of the business community may be strained.

COMMUNICATIONS

Radio ads, newspaper ads, phone calls, Chamber newsletters and social media have been used to convey support measures available to the business community.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

The initiatives support Council's Strategic Plan Goal 2.3 | 'The economy grows with an emphasis on small business.'

The Harbour Quay initiative and other public space offerings support Council's Strategic Plan Goal 3.1 | 'The highest and best use is made of City-owned assets.'

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council direct staff to refrain from considering additional enforcement measures so long as significant and appropriate progress continues to be made on the part of the property owner/managers on completing the outstanding Remedial Action Requirements as ordered by Council at its meeting held September 14, 2020. Further, that Council will revisit this matter at its Regular meeting on January 11, 2020 to ensure remedial action requirements are continuing to be met.

PURPOSE

This report is to provide Council with an update regarding the works being carried out at property located at 3118 3rd Avenue in relation to Council's Remedial Action Order and to obtain Council's support in forgoing further enforcement considerations at this time.

BACKGROUND

On September 14, 2020, Council resolved Remedial Action Requirements for property located at 3118 3rd Avenue and owned by Folded Hills Farms. On October 14, 2020 Council passed a resolution to extend the time to the property owner to address the requirements by an additional 30 days.

The City's Community Safety Manger, Building Inspector, Bylaw Enforcement Officer and Fire Prevention Officer did a walk through on November 5, 2020 and observed that the remedial action order had not been acted upon, as such, Council, at its Regular meeting held November 23, 2020 resolved as follows:

MOVED and SECONDED, THAT Council, in the absence of progress being made on the part of the property owner to address the Remedial Action Requirements as ordered by Council, return to an in-camera meeting to consider Council's next steps in addressing property located at 3118 3^{rd} Avenue, noting that further considerations of this item in an in-camera meeting meets Section 90(1)(e) of the Community Charter.

CARRIED | R20-286



At this same meeting, and during the question period, the Corporate Officer advised Council of receipt of an email [@ 1:45 pm] from the property owner outlining works that had been carried out. Given the timing of receipt of this information, staff were not in a position to confirm actions taken.

On Wednesday, December 9, 2020 staff were on-site to review and inspect the actions that have taken place since Council's order of September 14th.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- 1. That Council direct staff to refrain from enforcement action subject to significant and appropriate progress continuing to be made to address outstanding Remedial Action Requirements.
- 2. That Council provide staff with alternate direction.

ANALYSIS

The following analysis contains the remedial orders as described by Council at its September 14, 2020 Regular meeting. Staff comments are noted in blue and reflect/confirm work that has been done as of December 9th, 2020.

- Most repairs to the exterior walls of the Structure have been done, including coping and flashing, to restore the integrity of the building envelope to a condition sufficient to protect the Structure from the weather and from infestations of insects, rodents and other pests, including without limitation by:
 - remediating any holes, breaks, loose or rotting boards or timbers and any other condition which might permit the entry of insects, rodents or other pests to the interior of the walls or the interior of the Structure;
 - Applying paint, stain or other protective coating to the exterior walls so as to adequately protect them against deterioration;

Exterior cladding, facia boards and paint has been adequately applied to the building.

- 2. Repair was done on downspouts in such a manner as to control drainage so that runoff to neighbouring properties and access ways is eliminated;
 - It appears repairs were made but then sustained damaged. Protective guards will need to be installed.
- 3. Replace all broken or missing handrailing's on staircases; Handrailing's on staircases have been replaced.
- 4. Remove or permanently cover all graffiti from the exterior of the Structure;
 - All graffiti has been covered. Manager to repaint as necessary.

5. Replace all broken, cracked or otherwise compromised exterior windows to a weathertight condition which operates to provide light and ventilation;

All windows with the exception of unit 103 and 101 have been replaced.

6. Replace or repair all damaged, decayed or deteriorated window sashes, window frames and casings;

Unable to confirm at time of inspection.

7. Replace or repair all exterior doors of the Structure so that they are weathertight, operational, fit tightly within their frames when closed, and locked so as to prevent entry, with at least one entrance door capable of being locked from both inside and outside;

Property owner has repaired the doors so that they lock to prevent entry. Property owner continues to work on doors to ensure doors are weather tight and fit in frames properly.

8. Replace or repair all interior entrance doors and door frames for each unit and provide locking door knobs.

All have been repaired with the exception of Unit 106.

9. Replace or repair the roof of the Structure to a watertight condition with no leaks;

Unable to access units at time of inspection however, the balconies do appear to have had repair and maintenance work done.

10. Replace or repair all fire escapes, stairs, balconies and porches to a safe and clean condition free from rot, holes, cracks, excessive wear and warping, or hazardous obstructions; and

Repairs on all fire escapes and stairs are safe and in clean condition and no hazardous obstructions [includes new lighting and windows]. Direct access to the balconies was not available at time of inspection however, it appears the balconies and porches have been cleared of heavy objects, and hazardous obstructions. Repairs have been done to the facia boards. A few minor repairs to upper balcony spindles are still required.

11. Replace or repair all fire protections systems, heat detections, smoke detections, fire alarms, fire extinguishers, sprinkler systems, exit signs, emergency lighting, fire separations and means of egress required by the BC Building Code and BC Fire Code to a functional and unobstructed condition;

Repairs to emergency pulls for fire alarms have been made, exit signs and emergency lighting has been replaced and means of egress are functional and no obstructions are present.

12. Remove and properly dispose of all refuse from the interior and exterior common spaces of the Property, including food waste, combustibles, non-combustibles, furniture, appliances, tires, construction waste, stripped or wrecked automobiles, trucks, trailers, boats, vessels or machinery; parts or components of any of the aforementioned, to an appropriate disposal site;

All refuse from interior and exterior common spaces has been removed.

- 13. Empty, clean and repair the garbage disposal bins on the Property;
 Bins have and are being emptied on a regular basis.
- 14. Eliminate all rodents, vermin and insects from the Structure; While unable to access all units at the time of inspection, no rodents, vermin or insects were observed in common areas.
- 15. Permanently remove all objects placed, stored, or maintained upon any balcony, hallways, or entrance way which may interfere with access or egress to or from the Building in case of fire or other emergency; and All objects on balconies, hallways and entrance have been removed.
- 16. Prepare a Fire Safety Plan in cooperation with Port Alberni Fire Department.

Manager currently working on plan.

Without displacing current tenants, the owner and property managers have been able to make progress on fulfilling the list of requirements as outlined in Council's Remedial Action Order. Further, the owner and managers as of late, have engaged proactively with the RCMP to assist with managing undesired persons and unwelcome guests.

IMPLICATIONS

While remedial work remains outstanding, the property owner continues to work toward bringing the subject property into compliance, including their cooperation in working with City staff, RCMP and Fire. Overall, the work that has recently taken place has improved the building and the safety of its occupants.

SUMMARY

On September 14, 2020 a Remedial Action Order was issued by Council requiring the property owner of 3118 3rd Avenue to carry out a variety of works to bring the building into compliance and to address public health/safety requirements for property located at 3118 3rd Avenue. The property owner did ask Council for a reconsideration of the matter at which time Council granted the property owner an extension to complete the works. At Council's Regular meeting held November 23, 2020 Council resolved to consider its next steps in an in-camera meeting given the inactions of the property owner to comply with Council's Order. At that same meeting, the property owner submitted a late email to Council outlining the work that had taken place. Staff conducted an on-site visit on Wednesday, December 9th which confirms significant progress being made on the part of the property owner to comply with Council's Order.

In light of the work that has been done and given the recent cooperation and commitment on the part of the property owner and managers to continue their efforts in bringing this property into full compliance, Council is being asked to consider the recommendation identified in this report.

PURPOSE

For Council to consider three readings and final adoption of the City's "Five Year Financial Plan 2020 – 2024, Bylaw No. 5003-1".

BACKGROUND

Section 165(1) of the *Community Charter* provides authority for the City's Five-Year Financial Plan. Section 165(2) allows the City to amend the Financial Plan, by bylaw, at any time in order to provide for changes that occur during the year. The City's practice, which is common among other municipalities, is to review budget to actual amounts for revenues and expenditures and/or capital project changes throughout the year and to amend the City's Five-Year Financial Plan towards the end of the year so the Plan reflects more accurate budget projections, for operations and capital. The following amendments have been approved by Council through Council resolutions in 2020.

At Council's May 11, 2020 Regular meeting, Council resolved as follows:

That Council authorize staff to redirect \$90,000 of the 2020 Economic Development allocation for marketing activities to be invested in initiatives to support the small business sector through the COVID-19 pandemic measures.

CARRIED | Res. No. R20-135



At Council's May 11, 2020 Regular meeting, Council resolved as follows:

That Council authorize staff to redirect \$50,000 of the 2020 Economic Development allocations for consulting service fees and contract services to be invested in initiatives to support the small business sector through the COVID-19 pandemic measures.

CARRIED | Res. No. R20-136

At Council's May 25, 2020 Regular meeting, Council resolved as follows:

To All British Columbia Municipalities,

On November 3, 2020 Council passed the attached resolution regarding Flood Risk Mitigation through Green Infrastructure and Natural Assets.

Port Moody City Council is requesting that your Council consider supporting the need for flood risk mitigation and reach out to the Minister of Environment & Climate Change Strategy, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Minister of Agriculture, and the Premier of British Columbia.

In the 2020 UBCM convention, a resolution regarding Flood Risk Mitigation through Green Infrastructure and Natural Assets was slated to be NR16. However, because of a new format and timing constraints, members did not get to vote on this critical environmental protection piece, which was sponsored by the LMLGA executive. As BC faces the challenges of a climate crisis and rebuilding the economy in a more resilient manner, the creation of fish-friendly flood infrastructure is a critical part of a just recovery.

Our current flood protections drastically impact the lives of fish and other species and rarely take into account diffusing polluted water runoff before it ends up in our watersheds. And of course, protecting our fish protects ecosystems as a whole, which in turn protects food webs and keystone species, food security and food sovereignty, and protect fisheries jobs. Nature-based flood-control solutions that provide both flood protection and fish passage are currently not required by regulators or by funding programs for upgrades of existing structures, even though they are well proven to be effective. In fact these win-win solutions provide excellent return on investment and can make our communities even safer from flooding, but are severely underfunded here in BC.

A major flood with our current infrastructure would be catastrophic, upgrading flood infrastructure needs to be a high priority for capital spending. The solution can be one that provides multiple benefits that creates green jobs, helps us adapt to climate change, advances reconciliation and UNDRIP commitments, while also improving recreational and aesthetic values and of course, is economically smart.

Expanding on this last point:

- Existing flood mitigation funding can be leveraged for multiple benefits: studies have found that investment in ecosystem services generates significant economic value and helps communities avoid millions of dollars in future costs.
- In addition, investing in natural flood control is often cheaper and more efficient than investing in "grey" infrastructure not just in Canada but across the world.
- And finally, data from the United States show that short-term economic benefits –
 jobs and other economic spinoffs from watershed restoration projects are



equivalent to other kinds of public infrastructure works. For example, a \$1M investment in watershed restoration creates between 13 and 22 jobs, and \$2M to \$3.4M in economic activity.

Reducing storm water-related impacts also reduces our communities' exposure to water pollution and flooding-related health hazards and their associated health outcomes, such as waterborne illness, respiratory disease and asthma associated with mold and bacteria, vectorborne disease, stress, injury, and death. Trees, bushes, and greenery have the ability to absorb air pollutants and trap airborne particulates on their leaves, reduce surface and air temperatures. And because it more resilient to climate related impacts it reduces the need to fix grey infrastructure, which saves money for our residents.

Green infrastructure, such as fish-friendly flood infrastructure, also provides a plethora of cobenefits. Such projects increase exposure to the natural environment, reduce exposure to harmful substances and conditions, provide opportunity for recreation and physical activity, promote community identity and a sense of well-being, and provides economic benefits at both the community and household level. These benefits are all known to directly or indirectly benefit public health. The degree to which the environmental, social, economic, and public health benefits of green infrastructure are realized is dependent on a number of factors, including the design, installation, and maintenance of the green infrastructure features.

Evidence is clear that holistic innovative solutions seem more expensive in the short-term, but provincial political will is needed to reap a myriad of co-benefits that far outweigh the upfront costs. Local governments are dedicated to climate solutions; however, with our only means of funding being property taxes, the province needs to come to the table as a funding partner.

We strongly encourage all BC Local Governments to consider the benefits healthier, reconnected ecosystems can have not just in the next year or two, but into the future as we work to build back a better BC. We hope you join us to advocacy to the Provincial Government to support this initiative through grants and funding as part of a just and green economic recovery.

And whereas these waterways provide moderating effects for localized and riverine flooding and valuable habitat for wild salmon and other important species; And whereas there is no current requirement or standard practice for treating these natural and manmade waterways as valuable natural assets for their provision of the aforementioned ecosystem services:

Therefore be it resolved that Union of British Columbia Municipalities request that the federal and provincial governments remove constraints and implement requirements for incorporating green infrastructure and nature-based solutions in flood management to ensure effective flood risk mitigation while maintaining or restoring social, cultural and ecological co-benefits for these systems;

And be it further resolved that Union of British Columbia Municipalities request that the federal and provincial governments promote natural assets as a viable emergency planning solution and provide appropriate funding through the Disaster Mitigation Adaptation Fund,



Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, Community Emergency Preparedness Fund, Emergency Management BC and other similar emergency planning and mitigation funds.

AND THAT a letter advocating for Flood Risk Mitigation Through Green Infrastructure and Natural Assets as part of a provincial climate resilience strategy, as well as economic green stimulus package, be sent to the Minister of Environment, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Minister of Agriculture, and the Premier of BC;

AND THAT Port Moody write to all other municipalities in BC asking them to write letters of support to the aforementioned ministries.

On November 23, 2020, Saanich Council considered a Report to Council from Mayor Haynes dated November 6, 2020 and resolved:

- "That Council endorse the letter of support addressed to the Federal Minister of Indigenous Services, copying the British Columbia Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation, to encourage making September 30 a statutory holiday marking a national day of remembrance of residential school Survivors of Canada; and
- 2. That Council provide the report to other local governments within British Columbia."

On behalf of Saanich Council, I write to you to encourage royal assent of Bill C-5 for recognition of September 30 as a statutory national holiday for Truth and Reconciliation. This national holiday would acknowledge residential school survivors and recognize the harms that 150,000 children experienced in 139 residential schools across Canada. The last residential school in our country did not close its doors until 1996.

In the words of residential school survivor, Eddy Charlie, "This Bill will help increase the rights of Canada's Indigenous peoples, including rights to self, determination, lands and languages, and by having this Bill passed it will create an opportunity for all Canadians to celebrate equality."

We encourage the federal government to pass Bill C-5 to show that our nation is serious about recognizing the harms experienced by Indigenous peoples of Canada. The Bill emphasizes the rights of Indigenous peoples to maintain and strengthen their own institutions, cultures, and traditions, and to pursue their development in keeping with their own needs and aspirations.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Endorse the attached draft letter of support addressed to the Federal Minister of Indigenous Services, copying the British Columbia Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation, to encourage making September 30 a statutory holiday marking a national day of remembrance of residential school Survivors of Canada; and
- 2. share this report with other local governments within British Columbia.

BACKGROUND

On September 28, 2020, Saanich Council presented a proclamation to residential school Survivor Eddy Charlie and Kristin Spray declaring September 30, 2020 Orange Shirt Day in Saanich. Eddie Charlie has since approached Saanich Council requesting a letter of support to encourage the federal government to establish September 30 as National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

September 30 is symbolically named for the orange shirt Phyllis Webstad's grandmother gave to her on her first day of residential school. The shirt was immediately taken from her upon arrival at the school and never returned.

Approximately 150,000 Metis, Inuit and First Nations children were sent to residential schools between the 1860s and the 1990s, with the last residential school operating until 1996.

Assembly of First Nations National Chief Perry Bellegarde said, "Canada's Residential Schools were an attempt at genocide, they had a severe negative impact on our cultures, our nations, our languages, and for reconciliation to occur, Canada must right this wrong and help the former students and our nations recover and heal from this tragic history."

On September 29, Minister of Canadian Heritage Steven Guilbeault introduced House Government Bill C-5, seeking to establish a National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

"An Act to amend the Bills of Exchange Act, the Interpretation Act and the Canada Labour Code (National Day for Truth and Reconciliation)."

Bill C-5 would amend certain Acts to make a National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, observed on September 30. This national holiday would seek to honour Survivors, their families, and communities, and ensure public recognition of the disturbing history and legacy of residential schools. The reconciliation process requires this recognition of the harms committed against First Nation, Inuit and Metis people.

CONCLUSION

Endorsement of the above-noted recommendations acknowledges the past and ongoing harm residential schools inflicted on Canada's Indigenous people, and the necessity of reconciliation to build a more inclusive Canada.

Mr. Premier:

My Council has directed me to write this letter to you to emphasize our growing alarm at the rapid increase in the rates of COVID-19 on Vancouver Island.

To be clear, we are in full support of the measures announced by Dr. Bonnie Henry earlier this week with respect to masking, restrictions on gatherings, and the ongoing emphasis on keeping travel as "local" as possible. While there are no explicit travel bans in place, it's good to see that the Province has articulated an expectation that British Columbians will limit their excursions, as much as possible, to "local" or "essential" travel only.

However, experience has shown that an "expectation" to follow a directive is not the same as a formal "Order"; "expectations" have historically proven to be less than fully effective.

As you know, in April of this year, I wrote a letter to you, Dr. Bonnie Henry, and others, a letter that was co-signed by more than 40 other Mayors and Regional District Chairs from the AVICC Region. At that time, we asked for a ban on all non-essential long weekend travel on BC Ferries in an effort to prevent the spread of COVID to Vancouver Island. That mandate was never implemented. However, given the recent spike in cases, my Council believes that the time has come for more forceful action. If mandating "essential travel only" on the ferry system is too complex from a logistical or enforcement perspective, we would request - as an alternative - that your government implement a suggestion made by the Chief Medical Health Officer for Island Health, Dr. Richard Stanwick, for the implementation of a mandatory 14 day quarantine for those arriving on the Island. Particularly those from the "vortex" of the pandemic infections in the Vancouver Coastal and Fraser Health regions.

While this may be somewhat logistically challenging, this process has already been put in place on a national basis for international travellers, so the precedent, experience, and enforcement mechanisms for this are already in place.

Mr. Premier, as a long-time resident of Vancouver Island yourself, you understand full well the unique geographical advantages inherent in our location with respect to controlling the spread of this virus. But the reality is that our first responders have spent the last eight months giving their all to prevent exactly what we are now experiencing. We owe them, our residents and all those who have perished from this disease every reasonable effort in preventing the spread of this virus in our communities. We believe the suggestion from Dr. Stanwick is not only a "reasonable effort", but also very achievable.

To quote Dr. Henry's mantra, it is indeed time to "be kind, be calm, and be safe," and we believe Dr. Stanwick's idea should be implemented to limit the spread of COVID-19 and to beat it once and for all.

McLean Mill National Historic Site

Port Alberni, BC – During the week of October 26th, the City responded to the report of a potential oil spill at McLean Mill National Historic Site. City personnel found that an undetermined amount of Bunker C oil had been released from a rail tank car on site. Early investigation into the cause of this incident indicated that the oil was released through a previously locked valve that was found to be in the 'open' position. How that valve came to be opened is currently being investigated by the R.C.M.P. The incident has been reported to the Ministry of Environment, Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District.

The rail tank car had been located on a rail siding near the eastern property boundary. It had been used to store fuel for the #7 steam engine that operated between the City and McLean Mill.

Bunker C oil is the residual oil left over after the lighter, more volatile products such as gasoline, diesel and natural gas are distilled out of crude oil. Bunker C is a heavy oil commonly used by freighters. The oil that was released from the rail tank car at McLean Mill was approximately 93 percent Bunker C oil and 7 percent diesel fuel.

The City has mobilized several contractors and professional consultant firms in order to mitigate the environmental impact. Based on preliminary inspection reports from David Clough of D.R. Clough Consulting "it would appear that fuel spill and environmental damage was limited to the railway corridor and dip tank area. At this stage of the investigation based on the visual observations by on-site professionals, there appears to be no escape into surface waters."

The rail tank car has since been removed from the McLean Mill site and contractors are currently working to remove the contaminated rail ties and ballast. Consultants are working to determine an estimate of the volume released. At present, the site is stable and contained.

Mayor and Council,

Good Day Twyla

Thank you for the opportunity to bring my concern to you.

As we approach the upcoming time to budget for next year, I know there is always pressure on Council to prioritize what and where to spend and whether or not to raise taxes.

We all know it takes a lot to run a city and to provide the services we have become accustomed to. The replacing and renewing of City infrastructure, keeping up with new regulations and standards, and the rising costs of daily operations all combine to create a tough balancing act.

No one wants their taxes raised or their services cut. In fact, there is never a shortage of those wanting more, especially during tough economic times.

Since the decline of the forest industry in the valley, Councils have made it a priority to reinvent our City in order to encourage investment and attract people to the community whether to live or to visit. That priority has taken on many directions while entertaining several ideas and costing a lot of money. Unfortunately, I think that approach has caused us to lose sight of the things that are most important for the community while we go in various directions searching for the one shiny project that will turn Port around and bring us back to "the good old days".

Previous possibilities considered were a smelter, a bio fuel burning plant, the link road, ring road, truck route, Johnston Road and Argyle Street upgrades, to name a few. And while we did take over the old plywood plant site and invested in the airport expansion, those two investments have so far only contributed a small portion to the reinvention.

Recently, Council decided to commit to spending \$1.5 million on 2 blocks of uptown 3rd Avenue, and to consider spending \$7-8 million to build a quay to quay walkway along industrial land the City doesn't own. I am taking a guess that committing to a \$7-8 million path project may qualify the city for a \$2.5 million grant towards the cost of the project. Regardless, it is a lot of money for a project that appears to have no plan or a serious cost estimate. In the short term, the CAO says the path would use the existing rail grade. Really? I would like to remind Council that when the Dry Creek flood mitigation project was done, a path was built on the east side of Dry Creek from Smitty's Restaurant to the Mohawk gas station. The city planted trees along the path and installed irrigation. Currently, the irrigation pipe is broken, the trees are dying, the path is over grown with foliage and nothing has been done about it. The city had an agreement with WFP and ITL to do the work and for maintenance of the creek but that agreement expired in January of this year. To my knowledge nothing has been done

renew it to date. And it's typical that we have not been taking care of the things we already have. Did anyone think of incorporating this existing section of path into the new plan?

I know nothing has been budgeted and no final decisions have been made, but Council has started down the road of having these projects move forward. Council has already paid a consultant for the 3rd Avenue design, an engineering company to provide an estimate for the quay to quay project, and are applying for a grant for that project. I see this Council continuing down the same path as past Councils as one of our most important assets, the Echo aquatic center, gets older and older with no replacement plan in sight...other than being a line item in the budget.

In fact the pool upgrade / replacement is not even on your Strategic Priority list, but lots of other costly projects are that are far less important to the community. I think the pool fits into the "Quality of Life" and "Quality of Services" priorities and, in my opinion, having the pool fit into two categories makes it a top priority. Maybe Council should be asking the community what they think is a priority?

With every major project, the City borrows money and more tax money is spent to service that debt leaving little room to take on more debt if needed for the pool. Projects like the ones mentioned earlier would be great if the City had the money and all core facilities were not needing replacement or upgrading. There is still the major sewer lagoon upgrade under construction and the final costs are still unknown. Once known this could possibly result in more borrowing.

The one bright spot is that the City has \$2 million dollars from the community forest fund. I would like to encourage Council to take that money and make a serious commitment to budgeting for the pool upgrade or replacement instead of following the temptation to spend it on some wishful project. Also the City received \$3.5 million from Senior Governments under the Covid-19 Safe Restart Grant. That money can't be used for the pool, but if Council used it for projects that would normally use taxation money, that taxation money could be added into the pool fund.

10 years have passed since the Aquatic Replacement study and report was done on the pool which gave the City options on the pool's future. It is attached for those of you who have not read it. Over the years since the study was released it is only on occasion that talk of its replacement comes up, but then fades away again. It has been so long since the study was completed that Council will have to start all over again and at additional cost.

Long ago, a program was set up which called for putting a percentage of parks revenue into the parks reserve fund. This money was to be used for repairs or replacement of major parks and rec facilities such as the pool not for things like the clock tower which is a city facility. All too often reserve funds are raided to pay for shiny projects.

In 2016 the newly appointed and current CAO did a budget presentation on how the City was going to take 3% of heavy industrial tax and put it into the capital project reserve fund. His data showed that the City would have millions of dollars to spend over the next 10 years. Mayor Ruttan also said that year that the 3% tax money would go for a new pool but that didn't happen. This year, the City should have had \$2.8 million accrued in that fund. Instead, the reserve fund has only \$277 thousand dollars allocated for use in 2021. It looked good on paper I guess.

Since that time, no money and no serious commitment for the replacement of the pool had been discussed until last year when the City tried to shift the pool replacement onto the ACRD. We are still waiting on a staff report from that conversation. If Council started today, it could take 3 maybe up to 4 years to go through the assessment process and have a new pool built, and we are years away from even that. In the meantime, Echo pool gets older and before we know it, we will have a 60 year old pool. Have any of you ever wondered how many families have gone to Nanaimo to use their pool over the years? Or wondered if the City does find itself without a pool, what impact would that have on our

community? Or considered the positive impacts on the quality of life for people living in the valley that could result from a new pool?

There is no doubt in today's economic times that the entire Alberni Valley region should be involved in the cost of a replacement pool as it is used by people from all regions of the Valley. It would be an asset for the City and the whole region and would attract people here no matter where they live. But it is unrealistic to think the City can do it alone. We (the entire Valley) are a community, and we should all be working to make our community the best one we can because it would benefit us all. Take the Multiplex for example. Now 20 years old it is a community success—even with one region opting out of its construction—and it has brought so many opportunities for the community.

While a new pool would benefit the entire Valley, the City would be its biggest customer and therefore should be the one leading the project instead of handing it off to the ACRD. A project this size is a huge undertaking and needs a driving force, someone to promote it and work with all the Regions, First Nations and parties of the community. I could not see a bigger success for the valley than getting a replacement pool moving to reality.

There has been recent consideration of again hosting the BC Summer Games. What would happen if the pool were to fail prior to hosting that event? How much will be spent on repairs if there is a major failure? Remember that the diving board was removed years ago because it was worn out and has never been replaced. Today, the replacement of the pool should be a priority for all the regions of the Valley.

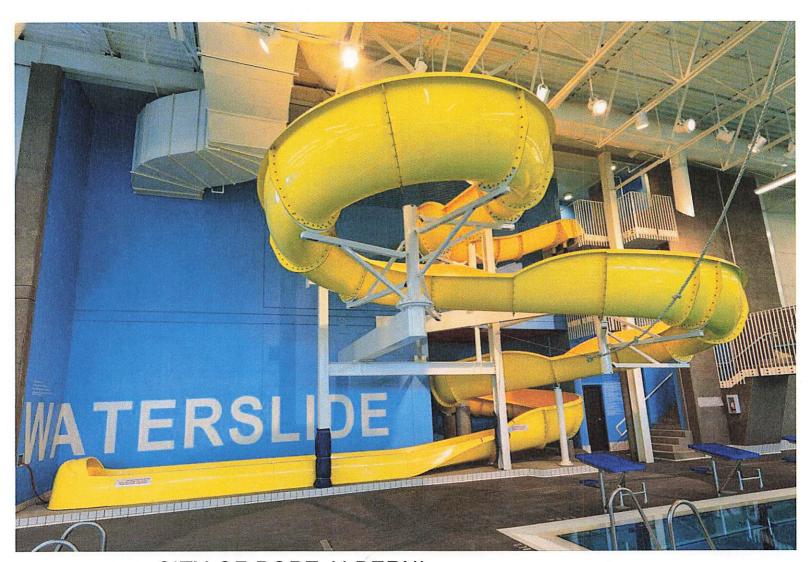
In order to accomplish a new pool project, the City would need to have at least 1/3 of the cost, \$7-8 million depending on what option is selected, as well as completed the consultation and design phases, and have advanced plans ready to even possibly qualify for any government funding. And the more a project is "shovel ready" the more it will be successful in securing funding. Currently the City only has \$1.7 million in parks reserve funds, basically nothing in the capital project reserve fund, and after doing a little research i think some of the gas tax and DCC money could be used. If the City cannot use those funds it is in a much deeper hole than ever. Council should start now and seriously be looking at having the money for this project.

Again, as a first step I encourage council to put the \$2 million from the community forest fund aside and focus on the replacement of the pool as it's Number 1 priority, not just in words but in action.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In the spring of 2011, the City of Port Alberni retained the services of Venture Pacific Construction Management, along with Bruce Carscadden Architect Inc. and Professional Environmental Recreation Consultants Ltd. (PERC) to prepare a Facility Feasibility Study related to the possible renovation or replacement of the Echo Aquatic Centre.

The study was completed over a six month period and involved a number of key steps including:

- . Meetings with City, Regional District, Recreation Department staff, local organizations and the general public;
- A review of background information including previous studies and reports;
- · A review of demographic information;
- A review of the current condition of the aquatic centre;
- Research related to trends in aquatic facility design and use;
- The development of information related to capital and operating costs and their impact on local taxpayers;
- The preparation and presentation of a draft and final report.

The consultants developed three Concept Options for presentation at the first of two public meetings.

Option One retained the existing pool and added a leisure pool with new change rooms. The leisure pool would include two swimming lanes, and would have water depth appropriate for instruction, play and rehabilitation programs. The cost for this option was estimated at \$12 million. This option would require closure of the pool for several months.

Option Two retained and renovated the existing pools and added new leisure pool components as well as fitness and multipurpose space. The leisure pool would include two swimming lanes and appropriate water depth. This option would also include an outdoor patio with a winter hot tub and spray pool. The cost of this option was estimated at \$15 million. This option would also require the pool to be closed for a period of time.

Option Three would involve the construction of a new six lane 25 meter pool with new change rooms and staff areas, and a leisure pool that would include three swimming lanes. An outdoor patio with a winter hot tub and spray pool would also be included. The existing pool area would be renovated for fitness and multipurpose space. The estimated cost was \$18 million. The existing aquatic center would be able to continue operation during the construction of the new facility with this option.

Following the first public meeting on June 27, 2011 the consultants reviewed the comments on each of the three options and developed additional options (four and five) based on additional public input.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Option Four included a new aquatic facility to the north of the existing community centre, and improvements to the existing pool for fitness and multipurpose space, and included a "Surf Rider", which simulates surfing in a confined indoor space. A leisure pool with three swimming lanes and related features would be included along with a large hot tub, steam room and sauna. This option would include new accessible change rooms for men, women and families. The cost was estimated at \$15.8 million and would not require the existing pool to be closed during construction.

Option Five included a new aquatic facility to the north and renovation to the existing aquatic centre for fitness and multipurpose space, as well as water slide. A leisure pool with three swimming lanes and related features would be included along with a large hot tub, steam room and sauna. This option would include new fully accessible change rooms for men, women and families. In Option Five, a new entrance would be developed providing enclosed lobby space with entry to the aquatic centre and the community centre. The cost of this option was estimated at \$17 million and would not require closing the existing pool during construction.

Option Six is the **Preferred Option**. This plan builds a new aquatic facility to the north, and renovates the existing natatorium for fitness and multipurpose spaces, and includes a waterslide.

The new pool would significantly enhance the services provided to the community as a whole. The leisure pool offers swimming lessons, play for all ages, rehabilitation opportunities and frees up the 25 meter pool for length swimming and advanced lessons. The separate pools allow for different water temperatures to be provided ensuring all age groups can enjoy their aquatic experience.

In terms of operating costs, a pool with the features described above generally draws more participants resulting in increased revenue opportunities. Other communities that have added leisure components to their aquatic facilities have experienced up to a 40% increase in general swim participation. On the expenditure side, a larger aquatic centre requires more staff and additional maintenance; however, facilities have found that the increase in revenues offsets the increase in expenditures.

From an attendance point of view, most renovated or replaced aquatic facilities have experienced increased participation in lessons and other programs as well as at general swimming sessions. Pool staff has found in many cases that other program areas have experienced increased participation as well.

RE: Application for Exclusion of the McLean Mill from the Agricultural Land Reserve

This letter is to provide support from the Alberni Valley Heritage Commission for the exclusion of the McLean Mill National Historic Site from the Agriculture Land Reserve.

In 1996 the McLean Mill was selected for commemoration as a National Historic Site by Canada because, of all applicants, it best combined associative and physical attributes related to the British Columbia forest industry. At that time the City entered into agreements with the Government of Canada and the Government of British Columbia agreeing to maintain, conserve and present the McLean Mill National Historic Site to visitors and promote understanding of the national significance of the site with respect to the British Columbia Forest Industry. Since that time the City, in conjunction with heritage stakeholders in the community, has committed considerable resources and, in our view, done an amazing job promoting and interpreting this nationally significant site.

Recently is has become clear that some of the activities that support the City's goal of making the McLean Mill a commercially viable tourist and public education attraction are inconsistent with the site's inclusion in the Agricultural Land Reserve. We understand that the Agricultural Land Commission has suggested that, to rectify this, the City make application for the site's removal from the ALR.

The Heritage Commission strongly supports such an application being made as soon as possible to ensure that the McLean Mill can continue to offer active interpretation events, and promote tourism and local vitality through commercial events and sales.

On January 14th this year, drag races at the Alberni Valley Regional Airport were ordered to stop by a Provincial Authorization Officer. A statement from the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development said, in part, "The ACRD were granted these lands in perpetuity at far less than fair market value because the development of an airport was deemed beneficial to the entire region, including the City of Port Alberni." Also, there is a reversionary clause that was included in the Crown Grant, which states that the land is to be "used for an airport including associated aircraft related commercial enterprises, subject to reversion if not so used." If the ACRD wanted to use the airport for short-term commercial events, it would either have to cancel the Crown Grant and apply for a Crown land tenure or it must apply to purchase the lands outright at fair market value.

The 12.8-hectare McLean Mill property was created by subdividing the land out of two existing larger properties, both of which are located in the Agricultural Land Reserve. The McLean Mill property remains in the ALR, and is subject to all of the land use provisions as captured in ALC and ALR regulations. At the time the lot was created, special dispensation, with respect to ALC regulations, was extended to this property for the express purpose of the City, "To develop the site as an historic sawmilling complex for educational and interpretive use of the public in partnership with the Province of British Columbia (Heritage Conservation Branch) and with Environment Canada (Canadian Parks Service)." The city then entered into a contract with Canada to preserve and present the historic sawmilling complex to the public. The land was obtained by the city for one dollar. This transaction happened because at the time, local public and elected officials deemed the development of McLean Mill into an historic sawmilling complex to be of economic benefit to the entire region, including the City of Port Alberni.

A recent Agricultural Land Commission decision delivered to the City, upheld two 1992 Resolutions rendered by the ALC of the day that confirm commercial enterprises in the entertainment, convention, wedding and special events category on the McLean Mill land are not permitted uses, as the land is currently classified.

Similar to the ACRD's acquisition of the airport lands, the City acquired the McLean Mill land at far less than fair market value. And, similar to restrictions for what types of commercial activities are permitted on the airport lands, use of the McLean Mill land is also restricted. Two such documents with effect are Restrictive Covenants, EH1630 and EH1631. Both are registered as a charge against the title for the McLean Mill property, and are on file at the Land Registry and Survey Authority of BC.

Existing documentation permits the city to operate the historic sawmilling complex on the McLean Mill land, along with associated forestry related commercial activities. However, council recently discussed the feasibility of having the property removed from the ALR as a possible solution that would instead, allow council to use the land for weddings, corporate events and music festivals, which are commercial activities unrelated to the presentation of an historic sawmilling complex, and would therefore be non-compliant with existing documentation. The discussion to consider the removal of this property from the ALR, confirms that council has shifted focus away from presenting sawmilling and logging history to the public, the original intended and permitted use of the McLean Mill property, and to instead, move into the wedding, music festival and corporate events market – a focus they denied they were heading towards 4 years ago.

Perhaps there will be no objection by the successor holder and beneficiary of Covenants EH1630 and EH1631 should the city decide to petition the ALC to break the terms that govern how the McLean Mill land is to be used by the city, despite the city obtaining the 12.8 hectares of land from the beneficiary of those Covenants for one dollar. But the spirit of the language in Covenant EH1630 is similar to the spirit of the language of the 1992 ALC Resolutions that were just upheld by the current ALC, in that commercial activity unrelated to the presentation of sawmilling history on the McLean Mill land is not permitted. If there is an objection by the beneficial holders of EH1630 and EH1631, council's response to any objection could reveal how little or how much effort council is willing to extend in order to gain the ability to get into the wedding, music festival and corporate events business at McLean Mill.

We might ask if a municipality's mandate to its citizens also includes spending public funds to pay a contractor to operate in segments of the economy that should be the domain of the private sector. But this is clearly where council is headed on the McLean Mill file, since buying an old industrial property 30 years ago for one dollar, complete with restrictive covenants and resolutions attached, that was supposed to generate hundreds of thousands of dollars of annual economic activity from the projected 100,000 plus annual visitors possessing an interest in old sawmills, hasn't panned out, great expectations notwithstanding.

The public has been told by council for years that we have to keep going with McLean Mill because we "have this contract to operate the mill", and we can't break it. We've also been told that it would cost at least \$100k per year to maintain the historic zone as a static site. So, the current proposition by council is to commit to a minimum historical average of at least \$300k per year to support a contractor's attempt to generate \$1 million in sales at the McLean Mill property, upon which a 10% commission of \$100k can be levied, which in turn will be used to pay the \$100k expense to keep the historic zone maintained each year. But a review of the financial performance of the venture over the last two decades suggests the likelihood of a contractor generating \$1 million in annual sales is highly improbable. What is probable is that if the public were asked, council may find that most want spending at the mill to end. Having thus far expended at least \$14 million of municipal support, and \$8 million of other agency support over close to three decades on the McLean Mill venture, suggests that giving it the old college try has run its course.

Once brought to their attention, local elected and unelected officials soon learned that three-decade old clauses and covenants carry weight, as they had to acknowledge when informed of a clause that outlined incompatible commercial activities on the airport land. Meanwhile, council's endorsement and support of incompatible commercial activities on the McLean Mill land is why the city has recently come under scrutiny by outside agencies. Perhaps the covenants attached to the McLean Mill property can be easily negotiated away. However, if it was an easy task, the city should have negotiated the restrictive covenant off the former plywood plant property years ago. But the restrictive covenant on that land remains, as restrictive covenants remain and continue to have affect on the McLean Mill land, and a restrictive clause affecting permitted use on the airport land, remains.

Instead of negotiating with regulators and covenant holders with the end goal for the city being able to pay public funds to a contractor to promote and host weddings, corporate events, and music festivals at the historic sawmilling site, the city should make this the time to negotiate a permanent exit from this venture.

RE: Letter of Support - CMHA-PA Affordable Rental Housing Proposal

The City of Port Alberni is pleased to provide a letter supporting the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) of Port Alberni's proposal to the BC Housing Request for Proposals #1070-2021/28 for New Rental Housing Units Under the Building BC: Community Housing Fund program to develop affordable rental housing at 3027-3037 2nd Avenue in Port Alberni, BC. The property is municipally owned and centrally located in the Uptown District close to public transit, parks, recreation, services, and neighbourhood amenities.

The proposed project will include a mix of unit sizes to address the needs of target occupant groups in Port Alberni. A minimum of 70% of the units are below-market, with the remaining 30% aligning with BC Housing's Affordable Market rents to help subsidize the below-market units. This mixed-income model fits with the programmatic goals of the Community Housing Fund and reflects sound practices in providing affordable housing.

If funded, the City will be contributing the land at a nominal cost to CMHA-PA (either through Agreement of Purchase and Sale or a long-term lease), with the requisite legal agreements to ensure that the long-term affordability of the rental housing remains protected.

CMHA-PA is a well-respected, locally based housing and social service provider. CMHA-PA currently operates a range of housing across the housing continuum, including transition housing, supported housing, and affordable housing for persons living independently. CMHA-PA is an experienced housing provider and offers a wide variety of social services and programs that help meet the needs of vulnerable populations in Port Alberni.



We note that the City of Port Alberni has supported CMHA-PA's work on this proposed rental housing project to date, and planning staff at the City are currently working with CMHA-PA on the planning process. We expect this project will help address critical housing needs in Port Alberni, and strongly encourage BC Housing to considering investing in this project.

November 19, 2020 – Advisory Planning Commission – A development application was received for the property located at 4279 Ravenhill Ave. The applicant is proposing to rezone the property to enable a future subdivision of the property and will also be partially rezoned for parks and open space.

November 19, 2020 – Bread of Life AGM – The Bread of Life held its annual general meeting. A report was given on the challenges of the past year and also its successes. It was reported that they are currently doing renovations and hiring staff to open a warming centre for those needing a place to come.

November 24, 2020 – Coastal Communities Social Procurement Initiative – The Director of Finance and I attended a meeting with the CCSPI for a check in to our progress on this initiative. Due to the hiring of a new Director of Finance and the many challenges of the last few months, little progress has been made in the development of a social procurement policy for the City. However, a plan was developed to move this initiative forward.

November 24, 2020 – Third Avenue Merchants Association – I attended a meeting of the 3rd Avenue Merchants Association. A Customer Appreciation Event was planned for the evening of December 11th.
