

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2015

1. General

The City of Port Alberni (the "City") is a municipality in the Province of British Columbia and operates under the provisions of the Community Charter. The activities of the corporation are carried out through the following funds: General Revenue Fund, General Capital Fund, Reserve Funds, Water Revenue Fund, Water Capital Fund, Sewer Revenue Fund, and Sewer Capital Fund.

In December, 2009 the City of Port Alberni incorporated a company known as Alberni Valley Community Forest Corporation. The City retains full ownership of the company. Alberni Valley Community Forest Corporation general operations include forestry and business activities associated with forestry including harvesting and selling timber and non-timber forest products.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the City conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to British Columbia municipalities. The financial statements have been prepared using guidelines issued by the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA).

Basis of Presentation

The City practises fund accounting. Funds are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations. Funds currently in use are:

- 1) **General Revenue Funds** to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The General Revenue Fund is the City's operating fund including collection of taxation, administering operations, roads, policing, fire protection etc.
- 2) **Capital Funds** to account for all capital assets and unfunded work-in-progress of the City and offset by long-term debt and investment in capital assets.
- Reserve Funds to account for activities within designated funds established for specific purposes with the approval of the Ministry of Community Development. The funds are governed by bylaws defining their purpose, and are funded primarily by budgetary contributions from the General Revenue Fund plus interest earned on the fund balances.
- 4) Water and Sewer Funds to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business operations, where the intent is that costs of providing the services on a continuing basis be financed through user charges.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2015

Consolidated Financial Statements – the General Revenue Fund, Water Revenue Fund, Sewer Revenue Fund, General Capital Fund, Water Capital Fund, Sewer Capital Fund, Parkland Acquisition Reserve Fund, Equipment Replacement Reserve Fund, Capital Works Reserve Fund, Land Sale Reserve Fund, Development Cost Charges Fund, and Carbon Trust Fund belong to one economic entity under control of City Council.

The consolidated financial statements reflect the removal of internal transactions and balances. The Cemetery Trust Fund administered by the City is specifically excluded from the consolidated financial statement.

Basis of Accounting – Revenues and expenses are recorded on the accrual basis, except for cash flow information, in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS), replacing Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (Canadian GAAP). Revenues and expenses are recorded in the period that the events or transactions giving rise to the revenues and expenses occur.

Tangible Capital Assets – effective 2008 the City adopted the provisions of PSAB Accounting Handbook Section 3150 that required that tangible capital assets be recorded at cost and amortized over their useful lives.

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated amortization. Cost includes all costs directly attributable to acquisition, construction, or interest from financing of the tangible capital asset. Amortization is recorded on a straight-line basis over the estimated life of the tangible capital asset. Assets under construction are not amortized. Contributed tangible capital assets are recorded as revenue at fair value at the time of contribution.

Estimated useful lives of tangible capital assets are as follows:

Land improvements 10 to 20) years
Buildings (including building components) 25 to 40) years
Machinery and equipment 5 to 30	years
Engineering structures 30 to 75	years
Storm systems 45 to 75	years
Transportation systems 15 to 60) years
Water systems 8 to 75	years
Sewer systems 8 to 75	years

Tangible capital assets do not include works of art or historical treasures. Costs related to the acquisition of such items are expensed in the year in which they are acquired.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2015

Revenue and Expense Recognition

- Taxation taxes are recognized as revenue in the year they are levied. Taxes may be adjusted by the Province by way of supplementary roll adjustments through the BC Assessment appeal process. Levies imposed by other taxing authorities are not included as taxes for municipal purposes.
- 2) Sales of services charges for water and sewer usage, solid waste collection and recreation programs and admissions are recorded as sales of services.
- 3) Other revenue includes permit and licence fees, fines, and penalty charges.
- 4) **Investment income** the City invests in pooled funds of the Municipal Finance Authority of BC. The Municipal Finance Authority distributes earnings of these funds to its investors from time to time based on the market value of the pool. The City recognizes only its share of the realized earnings of the pool. This revenue is recorded as investment income and the amount is added to the cost of the units held. To the extent that financial instruments have no stated rate of return investment income is recognized as it is received.
- 5) Grants are recognized as revenues in the period that the events giving rise to the transfer occur.
- 6) **Expenses** are recorded on an accrual basis and are recognized in the period in which the goods and services are acquired and a liability is incurred or transfers are due.

Cash and Short Term Investments – cash consists of funds situate in till floats, ATMs, and bank accounts. Short term investments are considered cash equivalents when there is a maturity date of less than 90 days. All short term investments held by the City consist of money market funds, and are readily available. Short term investments are recorded at cost. Cash and short term investments as at December 31, 2015 were comprised as follows:

Inventories – inventories of materials and supplies are valued at cost with an allowance made for damaged or obsolete goods. Inventories for resale are classified as Financial Assets. Inventories of supplies for internal use are classified as Non-Financial Assets and are expensed in the year of acquisition.

Contributed Tangible Capital Assets – land developers are required to provide subdivision infrastructure such as streets, lighting, sidewalks and drainage, etc. At the end of the warranty period, they are turned over to the City for no consideration. The City is not involved in the construction and does not budget for either the contribution from the developer or the capital expenditure in its annual bylaw.

Intangible Assets - Intangible assets consist of the fair value of a permanent lease acquired for access to properties on which sewage infrastructure is situated. Amortization will be recorded over the remaining term of the lease plus one renewal term. No amortization has been recorded prior to 2015 as the infrastructure was not in use until 2015.

Reserve Accounts – reserves for future expenditures are non-statutory reserves, which represent an allocation of revenue for specific purposes.

Employee Future Benefits - The City and its employees participate in a Municipal Pension Plan. The Plan is a multi-employer contributory defined benefit pension plan. Payments in the year are expensed. Sick leave benefits and retirement severance benefits are also available to the City's employees. The costs of these benefits are actuarially determined based on service and estimates of retirement ages and expected future salary and wage increases. The obligation under these benefit plans is accrued based on projected benefit costs as employees earn the future benefits.

Use of Estimates/Measurement Uncertainty – the preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditures during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring use of management estimates relate to the useful lives of tangible capital assets for calculation of amortization, determination of employee future benefits, collectability of accounts receivable, and provisions for contingencies.

Financial Instruments – the City's financial instruments consist of cash and temporary investments, portfolio investments, accounts receivable, other assets, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, refundable deposits and long term debt. Unless otherwise indicated, it is management's opinion that the City is not exposed to any significant interest, credit, or currency risks arising from these financial instruments.

Adoption of New Accounting Policy - on January 1, 2015, the City adopted PS 3260 Liability for Contaminated Sites. The standard was applied on a retroactive basis to January 1, 2014 and did not result in any adjustments to financial liabilities, tangible capital assets or accumulated surplus of the City.

5. Municipal Finance Authority Debt Reserve Fund

The Municipal Finance Authority of British Columbia provides capital financing for regional districts and their member municipalities. The Authority is required to establish a Debt Reserve Fund. Each regional district through its member municipalities who share in the proceeds of a debt issue is required to pay into the Debt Reserve Fund certain amounts set out in the debt agreements. The Authority pays into the Debt Reserve Fund these monies from which interest earned thereon less administrative expenses becomes an obligation to the regional districts. It must then use this fund, if at any time there are insufficient funds, to meet payments on its obligations. When this occurs the regional districts may be called upon to restore the fund.

Upon the maturity of a debt issue the unused portion of the Debt Reserve Fund established for that issue will be discharged to the City. The proceeds from these discharges will be credited to income in the year they are received. As at Thursday, December 31, 2015 the total investment of the Debt Reserve Fund was comprised of:

12. Contingent Liabilities

Regional District Debt

Debt issued by the Regional District of Alberni Clayoquot is a direct joint and several liability of the District and each member municipality including the City.

Claim for Damages

In the normal course of a year, the City is faced with lawsuits and other claims for damages of diverse nature. At year end, the City's estimated exposure for such liabilities is not considered to be significant. The City carries general liability insurance with a private insurance carrier in the amount of \$5 million, plus an umbrella liability policy in the amount of \$45 million. When claims are paid the expense is charged to the General Government expense category.

Pension Liability

The municipality and its employees contribute to the Municipal Pension Plan (the Plan), a jointly-trusteed pension plan. The Board of Trustees, representing plan members and employers, is responsible for overseeing the management of the pension plan, including investment of the assets and administration of benefits. The pension plan is a multi-employer contributory pension plan. Basic pension benefits provided are based on a formula. The plan has about 185,000 active members and approximately 80,000 retired members. Active members include approximately 37,000 contributors from local government.

Every three years, an actuarial valuation is performed to assess the financial position of the plan and adequacy of plan funding. The actuary determines an appropriate combined employer and member contribution rate to fund the plan. The actuary's calculated contribution rate is based on the entry-age normal cost method, which produces the long-term rate of member and employer contributions sufficient to provide benefits for average future entrants to the plan. This rate is then adjusted to the extent there is amortization of any funding deficit.

The most recent actuarial valuation as at December 31, 2012 indicated a \$1.37 billion funding deficit for basic pension benefits on a going concern basis. The next valuation will be as at December 31, 2015 with results available in 2016.

Employers participating in the Plan record their pension expenses as the amount of employer contributions made during the fiscal year (defined contribution pension plan accounting). This is because the Plan records accrued liabilities and accrued assets for the Plan in aggregate, resulting in no consistent and reliable basis for allocating the obligation, assets and cost to the individual employers participating in the Plan.

The City of Port Alberni paid \$1,182,500 (\$1,119,482 in 2014) for employer contributions to the plan in fiscal 2015, which represents 0.07% of the total plan contributions. The City expects to pay approximately \$1,206,000 for employer contributions for 2016. Employees contributed \$981,217 to the plan in fiscal 2015 (\$925,889 in 2014).

There were no writedowns of tangible capital assets in 2015 (2014 - \$ nil). Contributed assets recognized in 2015 were \$60,450 (2014 - \$63,240) recorded at fair market value at the end of the warranty period. These include land, transportation, storm, sewer and water infrastructure. Interest capitalized in 2015 was \$125,304 (2014 - \$47,756). No amortization has been recorded on assets not in use in 2015.

14. Segmented Information

The City of Port Alberni provides a wide range of services to its citizens including police, fire, recreation, roads, sewer and water. For reporting purposes the City's operations and activities are organized and reported by Fund as described in Note 1. Funds were created for the purpose of recording specific activities to attain certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations.

City services are provided by departments and their activities are reported in these funds. Certain departments that have been separately disclosed in the segmented information, along with the services they provide are as follows:

General government services

General government provides internal support services to Council and other departments who provide direct services to its citizens. General government consists of governance, corporate management and program support. Internal departments include Legislative (Council), City Manager's Office, City Clerk's Department, Financial Services, Information Services and Human Resources.

Protective services - Police, Fire, and Building Inspection

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police is Canada's national police service. They are committed to preserving the peace, upholding the law and providing quality service in partnership with Canadian communities and for all Canadian citizens. The mandate of the Port Alberni Fire Department is to provide fire suppression services; fire prevention programs; training and education related to prevention, detection or extinguishment of fires. It is the mandate of the Building Inspection Department to provide building inspection services as set out in the building bylaw for residents and builders. Building inspection services are provided in order to assist residents and builders in constructing projects which meet minimum construction standards.

Transportation services

The Public Works Department is responsible for the delivery of municipal public works services related to the planning, development and maintenance of roadway systems, traffic control and street lighting.

Environmental health services

The function of environmental health services is to provide for the collection and disposal of solid waste as well as providing cemetery services to the citizens of Port Alberni.

Environmental and economic development

Environmental development provides services relating to planning, economic development and tourism. The Planning Department develops and administers land use regulations to ensure an orderly and well planned community. Economic Development includes responsibilities for diversification of the economy through business retention, business attraction and marketing key properties owned by the City.

Recreation and cultural services

The mission of the Parks and Recreation Department is to enrich the quality of life of residents and visitors. The parks, facilities, programs and services are designed and delivered to provide the greatest benefit to the community as a whole. The Museum Department works with the community to collect, document, preserve and present all aspects of the cultural heritage of the Alberni Valley and West Coast of Vancouver Island. Cultural services also contribute towards the information needs of citizens through the provision of library services in partnership with the Vancouver Island Regional Library.

Water utility

The Water Department provides for the supply and treatment of safe drinking water to the citizens of Port Alberni.

Sewer utility

The Sewer Department provides for the collection and treatment of wastewater.

The accounting policies used in these segments are consistent with those followed in preparation of the consolidated financial statements as disclosed in Note 2. For additional information see Segmented Information (Schedule 2).



Background:

At a regular meeting on April 12th, 2016, Council for the City of Port Alberni endorsed the following resolution:

That Council for the City of Port Alberni direct the discontinuation of the Special Superannuation Agreement for exempt staff and provide a one-time payment incentive to staff equal to two years of contributions (\$34,000).

The Pension Corporation has advised that they require a resolution of Council with a specific date for discontinuation of the Special Superannuation Agreement that they may consider. As they only meet twice per year with the next meeting being held in November, it is recommended that a date of December 31st, 2016 be provided.

Recommendation:

That the report from the Director of Finance dated June 20, 2016 be received and Council for the City of Port Alberni direct the discontinuation of the Special Superannuation Agreement for exempt staff effective December 31, 2016 and provide a one-time payment incentive to staff equal to two years of contributions (\$34,000).

Flooding issues in Dry Creek began in the 1940s but were most devastating in November, 2006, when the flooding shut down a four-block radius of residences and businesses, a major traffic corridor and caused hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages. By addressing this longstanding issue, this project will help protect businesses and residents and ensure economic well-being and prosperity.

These are just a few highlights of what was a year full of many positive achievements. I hope you will take some time to explore the City of Port Alberni's 2015 Annual Report to learn more about our services and the collective efforts to make this city the best it can be.

I look forward to continuing to build on this momentum and focus our energy and resources on building an even better, more livable city.






Johnston Road Beautification

Johnston Road serves as the front door to Port Alberni for the many visitors to the community and those traveling through. Despite it only being a small part of the community. first impressions are quickly made by the natural and built landscapes along this provincial highway.

With an eye to enhancing this important corridor, City Council gave the green light to additional streetscape beautification in 2015 through the installation of 26 planter boxes along the road. The City's two gardeners embraced this direction, building the street planter program with seasonal plants and regular maintenance to ensure it looked its best year-round.

The program was an instant success, generating positive feedback from local residents and businesses and the many of the visitors and passersby alike. The response has also generated interest in further expanding the program to other areas of the city and incorporating partnerships with local businesses.

SERVICE SUCCESS STORIES



Technology Aids Service Delivery

The City's expansive water and sewer network is a source of both pride and responsibility. With an aging infrastructure, the City's Engineering Department is kept busy performing necessary maintenance and responding to service requests from local residents and businesses. With the help of new innovative technology, these essential services are now being delivered more efficiently and effectively.

In a collaborative effort between the City's Information Technology and Engineering Departments, new software was developed to replace a cumbersome paper-based service system with a new mobile application fit for the modern world. The software, known as InspectWorx, brings together the City's detailed water and sewer information, including connection locations, pipe sizes and types, and service histories in a map-based application.

The software is readily accessible to staff through their mobile devices and provides all the information necessary to process and document service requests, meaning less time in the office entering data and more time at job sites.

The InspectWorx software is being used a model for other municipalities and was recognized at a recent Municipal Information Systems Association conference.



The Finance Department maintains the City's high standard of financial management by providing the citizens, elected officials, staff, and vendors with professional customer service through the collection and disbursement of funds, financial reporting, and management of assets.

- The Finance Department is responsible for the financial well-being of our City, through the provision of effective and reliable financial advice, services and information to Council, staff and the public.
- Over \$35 million is collected annually from various sources including property taxes, utility payments, service charges, and senior government grants. The Finance Department oversees the expenditure of these funds through the annual budget process and the City's expenditure policies.
- Other roles of the Finance Department include accounts payable, the purchase of goods and services, inventory control,
 payroll, the provision of property tax and utilities information, preparation of the consolidated year-end financial statements,
 investment management, treasury services, insurance, and risk management.

Highlights - 2015

- Received Canadian Award for Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association for our 2014 Annual Financial Report.
- Prepared and updated budget documentation for the 2015 5 year Financial Plan process.
- Financial software upgrades completed, including improvements to payroll, and implementation of enhanced licencing, MyCity and e-billing in partnership with Tempest and the City's IT department.
- Business licencing transferred from Planning to Finance.
- Completed revision of Equipment Replacement Reserve Fund contributions to ensure sustainability of the Fund.
- Generated over 29,000 billings for property tax, utilities, and other city-related business.

- Continue development of department service plan contributing to achievement of City Strategic Plan including initiatives to increase non tax revenue.
- Continued development on asset management plan, incorporating GIS with water and sewer capital assets.
- Update water system capital assets inventory.
- Continue migration to paperless billing and electronic funds transfers.
- Enhanced internal reporting through new partnership with software support team.



Services provided by the Engineering Department relate to municipal infrastructure and development in the City and include:

- Streets maintenance and upgrading including snow and ice removal, street sweeping, sidewalk maintenance, street lighting, traffic control signals, signage and road construction.
- Water system operation including provision of water supply and distribution and water quality monitoring.
- Sewage and drainage system operation including provision of sanitary and storm sewer collection and treatment.
- Garbage collection including pick up of residential and commercial solid waste.
- Cemetery administration and operation.

Highlights - 2015

- Significant improvements to the City's road infrastructure were completed, including 9th Ave China Creek Road to Montrose Street and Argyle Street Kingsway Avenue to 1st Avenue.
- Water Treatment Plant Upgrade was completed.
- Dry Creek Flood Protection project was substantially completed.
- The Liquid Waste Management Plan advanced in the approval process for Stage 2, including the discharge outfall configuration
- Implemented new water and sewer rate structures that increase equity and ensure sustainability.
- Completion of the upgrade to the Gertrude Street Bridge over Kitsuskis Creek.

- Continuation of the Liquid Waste Management Plan approval with First Nations consultation and engineering design and construction.
- Highway 4 traffic planning with the Ministry of Transportation with the intersections at Beaver Creek Road and at Helen St.
- Improvements to the City's infrastructure on 7th Ave Argyle Street to Angus Street and 5th Ave Redford Street to Bute Street and Craig Road Regina Street to Tebo Ave.
- Improvements to the water network will include the design for a new twin water main along 21st Ave Burde Street to the Cowichan Reservoirs.
- Sewage and drainage improvements to the Coal Creek Outfall.
- Active transportation and cycle lane program.
- Replacement of City owned street lights with high efficiency LED street lights.
- Design of the rehabilitation work to the Victoria Quay Bridge over Roger Creek.
- Planning for implementation of curbside collection of kitchen and yard waste.



The mission of the City's Parks, Recreation & Heritage Department is to enrich the quality of life of residents. This is done by: developing and maintaining efficiently operated parks and facilities; ensuring full and equitable access to a wide range of leisure opportunities; promoting an appreciation of our environment and our heritage; facilitating partnerships with the volunteer, public and private sector; and providing leadership and personal development opportunities promoting community values.

Highlights - 2015

Staffing

- Longtime Director of Parks, Recreation and Heritage, Scott Kenny, retired in August. Theresa Kingston was appointed the new Director of Community Services in November.
- Program and staff schedules were revamped at the Aquatic Centre resulting in a substantial savings in staff costs.

Facilities and Parks

- The first phase of trail development and fish enhancement in Roger Creek ravine was completed in partnership with West Coast Aquatic. The trail was dedicated as the Scott Kenny Trail.
- A number of upgrades took place at Gyro Recreation Park. The playground structure was upgraded with the assistance of a grant from Tire Stewardship BC. The tennis courts were resurfaced. A new pickle ball court was installed with assistance of a New Horizon for Seniors Grant for \$25,000.
- The first phase of the Pool Mural project was completed in partnership with the Community Arts Council and local artists. The project involved 11 local artists painting 16 different pieces of art on composite aluminum panels. Along with the murals, the pool décor was also upgraded.
- The dust control system in the woodwork room at the Industrial Heritage Centre was installed. This work was undertaken with the assistance of the Sunshine Club who paid 1/3 of the costs.
- A new entry sign was installed at the entrance to Harbour Quay with some assistance from the Port Authority. Washrooms at Harbour Quay were reconfigured and renovated.

Programming

- Winter Wonderland is always a big hit, and this was one of the biggest years yet. Revenue was up almost \$2000 from previous year (\$18,075.69 \$16,257.11), attendance was at 6175 compared to 5850 in 2014, and concession sales were \$3585.75 compared to \$2178.50 in 2014.
- West Coast Hockey Prep Camp was held July 13 August 7, 2015. The Prep Camp continues to grow with upwards of 800 participants attending the Camp in 2015 making it their largest camp to date.
- Celebrated the 30th anniversary of the Our Town and Seniors' Week.
- The Department continued to provide a wide array of programs, often in partnership with community organizations. A few of these included:
 - Men's Recreational Basketball League was another hit we had 48 players on 6 teams in 2015 who competed in weekly games. Great to see high school players alongside longtime alumni and recreational enthusiasts! Delivered in partnership with the ADSS Athletics staff.
 - Spring Break Dino Camp in partnership with the Jamie Collins: Legend & Legacy Fund, we were able to host a group of children ages 8-12 as they explored the age of the dinosaurs! Along with awesome games, crafts and activities, the campers joined



the Royal Tyrrell Museum in Alberta for exciting interactive video conference sessions to see the world of paleontology.

- Trail Building program with SD70 this fun partnership with the Step-Up program had students from ADSS participate in a weekly session of trail building/maintenance along the Log Train Trail. They learned hands-on skills and were able to appreciate the hard work that goes into maintaining trail infrastructure, as well as enjoying the benefits of spending time outdoors!
- Survival Kids another great and creative partnership with ROMP. Through hands-on experience and activities, Constable Peter Batt taught campers many different skills and techniques in outdoor survival, as well as concepts covering sustainability, environmental responsibility and respect for nature.

Focus - 2016

Administration

- The Judy Rogers Management Review report will continue to be implemented. Staffing changes will include the transfer of the Parks Supervisor and Facilities Supervisor to the Engineering/Public Works Department. Staff will work with community stakeholders to determine an alternate delivery model for Museum and Heritage Services.
- Develop a community engagement plan for a New Aquatic Centre. It is planned to have a referendum for the new facility on the 2018 Municipal Election ballot.
- Negotiate new contracts with the Junior Prep Camp and the AV Bulldogs.
- Implementation of new registration software program, Perfect Mind. The software will enable on-line registration.

Facilities and Parks

- Complete the installation of Fitness Equipment at Bob Dailey Stadium.
- Undertake an engineering review of the Harbour Quay Clock Tower and recommend structural repairs.
- Develop the mill stone and focal point park site at Victoria Quay.
- Phase 2 of the Pool Mural project.
- Installation of automatic doors at the Multiplex to ensure the facility is accessible for people with limited mobility.
- Echo Park Fieldhouse upgrades to ensure this facility is a premier meeting/workshop location for small groups.
- Work with community groups to obtain grants to upgrade the lacrosse box at Gyro Recreation Park. The upgrade will ensure that the fadility is able to accommodate multiple sports including lacrosse, pickle ball, road hockey and basketball.
- Installation of water bottle filling station at the Multiplex. This project is supported by funding from the Regional District.

Programming

- The Department is taking the lead on establishing a Physical Literacy working group to increase the public's awareness of the importance of activity and physical movement.
- Increasing the number of youth activities including revamping the youth leadership program, partnering with Get Outside BC to develop an outdoor activities leadership program, working with youth to develop youth for youth special events.
- New direction for summer programs including a mobile play van and a focus on 'stay at home' programming.
- Introduction of #playinPA Instagram promotion of facilities and programs
- Implementation of the Emergency Social Services program as part of the Valley emergency response program. Department staff will be trained in setting up and running reception centres and undertaking the ESS function in the event of an emergency. Staff will be involved in the provincial Exercise Coastal Response event in June.



The mission of the Museum and Heritage Network is to conserve, strengthen and share the unique heritage of the Alberni Valley. This is done by: collecting, documenting and preserving material culture, oral traditions and traditional skills; holding heritage resources in the public trust in perpetuity; making heritage resources accessible for public understanding and appreciation; developing relevant and engaging exhibits and public and school programs; fadilitating meaningful volunteer opportunities; and contributing to economic diversification through the development of heritage tourism attractions.



- The AV Museum hosted three major temporary exhibits in 2015, opening the year with We Are All One, based on paintings created by children at the Alberni Indian Residential School. This exhibit was curated by Dr. Andrea Walsh of the University of Victoria and a committee of the artists and other residential school survivors, in collaboration with AV Museum staff.
- This exhibit had a particularly powerful educational component, with survivors and artists volunteering to present to school groups.
- This was followed by The Sampson-Matthews Project: Art for the Nation, featuring 33 silkscreen prints by iconic Canadian artists, assembled by Ian Sigvaldason, the owner/director of the Pegasus Gallery on Salt Spring Island, and curated by AV Museum staff. This exhibit was up for April and May, coinciding with the Heritage Fair, below.
- The third exhibit, Pirates: From Treasure Island to Vancouver Island, was developed in-house, opening in July. It presented and discussed the trope of the "pirate," locating the Vancouver Island experience from fur trade to smuggling in the context of global piracy. It combined genuine pirate artefacts borrowed from the Maritime Museum of BC with text & image panels, along with interactive activities.
- The successful 13th Annual North Island Regional Heritage Fair was hosted in early May by the AV Museum, sponsored by the Port Alberni Lions Club, Quality Foods, Alberni Valley Times, the Hughes Family, and the BC Heritage Fairs Society. Six students were chosen to attend the Provincial Heritage Fair. Special programming incorporated the exhibited Sampson-Matthews prints, and their role in building national identity.
- A number of generous donations of ethnographic, historic, and art objects were made to the AV Museum, along with cash donations to support the Industrial Collection.
- An off-site exhibit, 1965 Basketball Champions, presented the story of the 1964-65 Alberni Athletics Senior A Men's basketball
 team, which won the Canadian national championship in 1965. This used photos, text panels, other graphic
 materials, and team objects, and was prepared in part by the Museum's summer students. It was displayed at the
 Train Station, Fall Fair, and City Hall from August to November.
- The Alberni Valley Museum and Heritage Commission worked throughout the year to develop a Collections Policy for the AV Museum Collection, which includes the Industrial Collection and the McLean Mill Collection, operated by the Western Vancouver Island Industrial Heritage Society. This provides basic guidelines for the preservation and use of the thousands of valuable historical artefacts owned by the City of Port Alberni.



- Had the exterior of the iconic Train Station and Water Tower refinished.
- City Council formed a McLean Mill Advisory Committee, intended to develop new operating models for the historic site, and to make it more financially self-sufficient.
- The volunteers of the WMIHS continued to contribute countless hours to operate McLean Mill NHS & the Alberni Pacific Railway on behalf of the City of Port Alberni, for the benefit of some 10,860 visitors.
- WMIHS volunteers cosmetically restored the famous 2-Spot Shay locomotive that was the start of the City Industrial Collection.
- The volunteers of the Port Alberni Maritime Heritage Society welcomed some 5,300 visitors to the Maritime Discovery Centre in the summer season, with increased donations, as well as developing an historic vessel component, and a successful Maritime Heritage Night series.

- To continue to present high quality, engaging, and locally-relevant museum exhibits.
- To encourage a collaborative approach to presenting the community's heritage, in cooperation with First Nations and other organizations.
- To continue to pursue alternate revenue streams, such as the recently revived and very successful Film Fest.
- To enhance the presentation of the City's Industrial Collection, by making it more accessible to the public.
- To continue to work toward the preservation and presentation of the resources at McLean Mill National Historic Site.
- In response to City Council's direction, to investigate alternate operating models for the Alberni Valley Museum that would remove it from the City of Port Alberni corporate structure.



The Planning Department administers land use regulations, building permits, bylaw enforcement and business licences to ensure an orderly and well planned community. The following services are provided by the Planning Department:

- Land use information to the general public and development industry.
- Processing of development applications including, Official Community Plan & Zoning amendments, Development Variance Permits, Development Permits and Subdivision.
- Upgrade and maintain the City of Port Alberni Geographic Information System & Mapping.
- Coordinate the Advisory Planning Commission for the City of Port Alberni.
- Building and Plumbing Inspections.
- Bylaw Enforcement.

- The Uchucklesaht First Nation began construction of a mixed use commercial, cultural and residential building on Argyle Street.
- The Huu-ay-aht First Nation began and completed an office renovation on Adelaide Street.
- Riverside Motel on Roger Street began an exterior renovation.
- West Coast Aquatic began construction of a Stewardship Centre at Harbour Quay.
- LB Woodchoppers began construction on a small expansion on 3rd Avenue.
- The Port Alberni Friendship Centre began construction on a daycare facility on 4th Avenue.
- Worked with City Clerk and Economic Development Manager on Revitalization Tax Exemption program for all commercial areas.

- Prepare a 5 year Strategic Service Plan for the Planning Department. Develop realistic sustainable budgets by focusing on the 5 year budgeting cycle.
- Work with Economic Development to fadilitate a Design Charette for the Johnston Road corridor. Potential review of Development Permit Area guidelines.
- Create environmental rebated initiatives for property owners.
- Initiative to rename route through dity and better connect Harbour Quay to McLean Mill.
- Call for Proposal for the development of approximately 8 hectares of City owned land adjacent to Westporte Place.
- Prepare report on the two Waterfront Studies and recommend priorities for Council consideration.
- Continue to provide a high level of service to City Council, other City departments, the public and development industry. Effective and efficient operations and delivery of service
- Work with City Clerk regarding implementation of Bylaw Adjudication System.

- Expanded an industrial facility fire inspection program.
- Responded to 1186 incidents, including 43 structure/content fires, a significantly higher than normal number of structure fires.
- Due to extreme weather-related fire risk conditions, experienced a higher than normal number of outdoor fires.
- Supported ACRD in their Emergency Operations Center during the Dog Mountain fire event.

- Prepare department's service plan to contribute to achievement of City Strategic Plan
- Tsunami Warning System support Tseshaht FN to install and operationalize their tsunami warning system tower, which will be integrated with the City system.

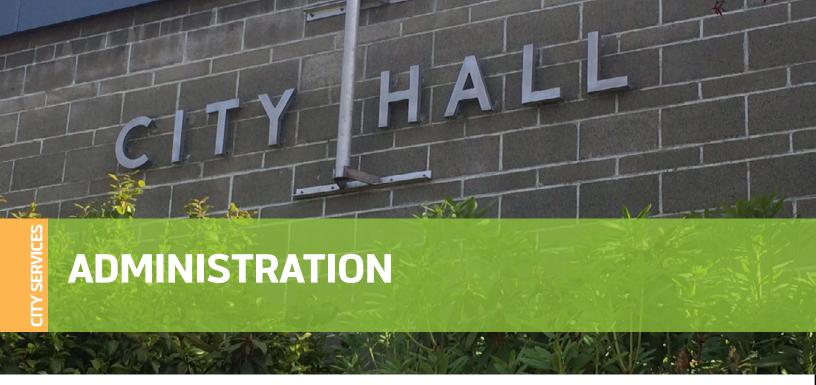
Highlights - 2015

- The Port Alberni Detachment has continued to make positive strides with respect to reducing violent crimes. This crime type has shown a downward trend over the past two years with 2015 falling 6% over that of 2014. Vancouver Island as a whole saw a 5% increase in persons violent crime.
- The Dog Mountain fire, a boating fatality in July and recreational users kept officers busy in the Sproat Lake area.
- The historical homicide of Kristey Morrey continued to be investigated and resulted in charges being laid. A homicide in July 2015 in the City of Port Alberni resulted in charges against a 19 year old female.
- Partnerships were developed with Mental Health and Addictions, the Assertive Community Response Team and West Coast General Hospital. A new referral system was also put into place.
- Attended in excess of 25 community events, undertook in excess of 1000 proactive patrols on foot, boat and bike within the Detachment area,
- Increased provincial traffic with over 2000 contacts made and increased detection of impaired driving offences with 70 interdictions completed.
- Completed over 1300 compliance checks of judicial release conditions,
- Crime Prevention Activities
 - Citizens on Patrol: volunteered a total of 2258 hours which included 79 patrols, checks on 9500 vehicles, 1700 Lock Out Auto Crime checks and security letters to over 550 residents.
 - Speed Watch: volunteered nearly 400 hours and checked over 27,000 vehicles in various locations throughout the Alberni Valley including school zones, local streets and highways.
 - Community Policing Office: continue to provide a service from Monday to Saturday at the Harbour Quay location with 22 active volunteers.

- Continue to provide excellent service to our First Nations partners through contact with each Nation and the provision of youth programs such as DARE, Survival Kids and Cultural Share.



The goal of the Administration Department is to provide service to Council, staff and the public that supports informed, responsive and effective municipal government. Administration includes the offices of the City Manager and the City Clerk and support staff.

The City Manager is the chief administrative officer of the City and undertakes overall management and administration of City operations. He ensures that the policies and direction of City Council are implemented and is responsible to inform and advise Council on the operations and affairs of the City. The City Manager is the leader of the City's management group and supervisor of the Department Heads.

The City Clerk is the municipal Corporate Officer as defined by the Community Charter and established by bylaw of the City and is the designated Freedom of Information and Privacy Coordinator. The City Clerk prepares agendas for and attends meetings of City Council and committees, oversees records management, execution of legal documents on the City's behalf and conducts and administers the municipal election.

ALBERNI VALLEY COMMUNITY FOREST LEGACY FUND

With a healthy cash flow in 2015, the Alberni Valley Community Forest (AVCF) made some significant investments in community projects - to the tune of \$350,000. As the sole shareholder of the AVCF, the City of Port Alberni owns the 6,400 hectare tenure near Sproat Lake.

After receiving a significant dividend cheque from the AVCF. City Council established the Community Forest Legacy Committee to provide recommendations regarding the distribution of funds within the community. The committee solicited applications from local groups and received a number of proposals with broad community benefit.

Council endorsed the Legacy Committee's recommendations for the funding of six local projects (see right) and demonstrated the value of developing a financially viable forest resource business which benefits the community and manages the forest in a sustainable manner.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Financial Overview

The City continued with infrastructure projects in 2015. Significant projects included road upgrades, storm drain, bridge, and water and sewer construction. Service levels were maintained at 2014 levels, and residential taxes were increased to cover the rising costs of provision of these services.

No further reductions were made in major industry taxes; however, as part of the sewage lagoon acquisition agreement, major industry taxes are to remain at 2012 levels until 2017.

The 2016-2020 Five Year Financial Plan adopted by Council reflects increases in revenues and expenses with some reductions in services, and making future provision for necessary infrastructure improvements.

The City completed the 2015 fiscal year with an increase of \$ 4,012,911 to its accumulated surplus. A summary of the accumulated surplus balances is as follows:

The City's capital program included streets and drainage upgrades of \$1,058,898; facility upgrades of \$1,621,425; water upgrades of \$392,331; sewer upgrades of \$136,539; equipment replacement of \$654,233. Funding for the capital program was comprised of government grants and donations of \$439,355; transfers from reserve funds of \$1,749,446; and operating revenues of \$1,614,326.

Issue

To consider the possible lease of 5201 and 5231 Argyle Street to Uchucklesaht Capital Assets Inc. for parking lot and public park.

Background:

The Uchucklesaht First Nation is nearing completion of their Cultural Centre at 5251 Argyle Street. The Uchucklesaht First Nation has previously made a presentation to Council and an expression of interest in the adjacent, city owned land, for the purpose of providing parking for the adjacent cultural centre and developing a park area.

Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to initiate lease negotiations with the Uchucklesaht, for a long-term lease of the City owned parking lot at 5201 and 5231 Argyle Street at a nominal fee.

Discussion:

City Staff have been engaged, together with the representatives from the Uchucklesaht First Nation, and have drafted a lease document to present to City Council for consideration. The proposed term of the lease (see attached Lease Agreement) is 33 years (September 1, 2016 – September 1, 2049) with an option to renew.


The improvements to the lands for parking and a public park shall be completed by October 31, 2016 as show on Schedule B of the lease. The park area along Argyle Street will be a major improvement to the site and will become a valuable community asset.

Other items addressed in the terms of the lease include such key factors as the following:

- Use of the lands for a parking lot and public park.
- Payment of annual taxes owing on the land.
- Permissive Tax Exemption for portion of land not to be used for parking (See Schedule C)
- Payment of all costs of any utility service to the land.
- Property maintenance and Liability Insurance
- Environmental compliance

Lease of Land

1) The Landlord leases to the Tenant the following property, ("the Lands):

Lot A, Block 104, District Lot 1, Alberni District, Plan VIP197D (DD 375781) of Lots 9, 10, 11 and 12 (Easterly 72') and Block 104, District Lot 1, Alberni District, Plan VIP197D Westerly 53' of Lots 9, 10, 11 and 12 of Block 104, Plan 197D (5201 and 5231 Argyle Street) outlined in bold on Schedule 'A' attached to and forming part of this agreement.

Term

2) The term of this Lease is for a period of thirty three (33) years, commencing on September 1, 2016 and terminating on September 1, 2049, subject to earlier termination pursuant to the terms of this Lease.

If the Tenant is not in default, the Tenant may renew this lease for a further thirty three (33) years, provided that this option must be exercised at least one month before the end of the term by notice in writing to the Landlord.

Rent

3) The rent is \$1.00 per year, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged.

Tenant's Covenants

- 4) The Tenant covenants and agrees as follows:
 - To use the Lands only for the purposes of a parking lot and public park (including public markets and events);
 - b) To make improvements to the Lands substantially as shown on Schedule 'B' attached to and forming part of this agreement;
 - c) The improvements noted in paragraph 4 (b) shall be completed by October 31, 2016;

- (d) Not to make or erect in, on or to the Land any buildings, structures, improvements, extensions, installations, alterations or additions, or alter the existing state of the Land in any way, without obtaining the Landlord's prior written consent and in obtaining such consent to provide the Landlord with all plans and specifications relating to any such alterations, as requested by the Landlord;
- (e) To pay all costs of any utility service to the Land;
- (f) Not to cause, maintain or permit anything that may be or become a nuisance or annoyance on the Land to the owners or occupiers of adjoining lands or to the public, including the unsightly accumulation of rubbish or unused personal property;
- (g) To pay annual taxes owing on the Land. The City of Port Alberni will provide a permissive tax exemption for the portion of the Land not being used for parking as shown on Schedule C;
- (h) To carry on and conduct its activities in, on and from the Land in compliance with any and all statutes, enactments, bylaws, regulations and orders from time to time in force and to obtain the required approvals and permits thereunder and not to do or omit to do anything upon or from the Land in contravention thereof;
- (i) Not to erect any sign on the Land without the prior written consent of the Landlord; and
- (j) To promptly discharge any builders' lien which may be filed against the title to the Land relating to any improvements, work or construction which it undertakes on the Land and to comply at all times with the *Builders Lien Act* (British Columbia) in respect of any improvements, work or construction undertaken on the Land.

Acknowledgment and Agreements of the Tenant

- 5) The Tenant acknowledges and agrees that:
 - a) The Landlord has given no representations or warranties with respect to the Land, including, without limitation, with respect to the suitability of the Land for the Tenant's intended use for, or development of, the Land;
 - b) The Tenant leases the Land on an as is basis and the Landlord has not made any representations, warranties or agreements as to the environmental condition of the Land; and
 - c) It is the sole responsibility of the Tenant to satisfy itself with respect to the environmental conditions on and of the Land, including, without limitation, by conducting any reports, tests, investigations, studies, audits and other inquiries as the Tenant, in its sole discretion, considers necessary in order to satisfy itself as to the environmental condition of the Land.

Routine Repair and Maintenance

The Tenant must, at its own cost, keep the Land, including all improvements located from time to time thereon, in good repair consistent with standards of repair generally accepted in British Columbia with respect to comparable premises and the Tenant is responsible for and must do all routine maintenance and repairs with respect to the Land and improvements, including to all utilities, services and snow removal necessary for the use, occupation and operation of the Land and improvements and upon written notice from the Landlord, the Tenant must make such repairs as are required by the Landlord in the notice. At the end of the Term, the Tenant must surrender the Land to the Landlord in good repair, excepting reasonable wear and tear.

Damage and Destruction

- f any improvements on or to the Land are destroyed or damaged by any cause so that in the opinion of the Landlord the Land is no longer reasonably fit for use by the Tenant for the purposes set out in this Lease for any period of time in excess of 10 days, then the Landlord may, exercising its sole discretion:
 - (a) Require the Tenant to repair the damage in which case the Tenant must repair the damages to the satisfaction of the Landlord using the insurance proceeds payable in respect of the damaged improvements under the insurance policy required by section 8(b); or
 - (b) Terminate this Lease in accordance with section 31.

Insurance

- 8) The Tenant must, at its sole expense, obtain and maintain during the Term:
 - a) Comprehensive general liability insurance providing coverage for death, bodily injury, property loss and damage, and all other losses, arising out of or in connection with the use of the Land in an amount of not less than five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) per occurrence; and
 - b) All risk insurance, for replacement cost, on all improvements on or to the Land, and all of the Tenant's fixtures and personal property on the Land, in such an amount as may be reasonably required by the Landlord.
- 9) All policies of insurance required to be taken out by the Tenant must be with companies satisfactory to the Landlord and must:
 - a) Name the Landlord as an additional named insured;
 - b) Include that the Landlord is protected notwithstanding any act, neglect or misrepresentation by the Tenant which might otherwise result in the avoidance of a claim and that such policies are not affected or invalidated by any act, omission or negligence of any third party which is not within the knowledge or control of the insured's;

- c) Be issued by an insurance company entitled to carry on the business of insurance under the laws of British Columbia;
- d) Be primary and non-contributing with respect to any policies carried by the Landlord and that any coverage carried by the Landlord is in excess coverage;
- e) Not be cancelled without the insurer providing the Landlord with thirty (30) clear day's written notice stating when such cancellation is to be effective;
- f) Be maintained for a period of twelve (12) months per occurrence;
- g) Not include a deductible greater than \$5,000.00 per occurrence;
- h) Include a cross liability clause; and
- i) Be on other terms acceptable to the Landlord, acting reasonably.
- 10) The Tenant must obtain all required insurance at its sole expense and must provide the Landlord with certificates of insurance confirming the placement and maintenance of the insurance, promptly after a request to do so by the Landlord.
- 11) If the Tenant fails to insure as required, the Landlord may, after five (5) days' notice to the Tenant, effect the insurance in the name and at the expense of the Tenant and the Tenant must promptly repay the Landlord all costs reasonably incurred by the Landlord in doing so, and such costs shall be additional to the Rent for the Land, and may be collected by the Landlord as Rent.
- 12) For clarity, the Landlord has no obligation to insure the Land during the Term nor any obligation to repair any improvements on or to the Land.

Quiet Possession

The Landlord covenants and agrees with the Tenant to permit the Tenant, so long as the Tenant is not in default of the Tenant's obligations under this Lease, to peaceably possess and enjoy the Land for the Term, without interference or disturbance from the Landlord or those claiming by, from or under the Landlord.

Environmental Matters

- 14) In this Lease:
 - (a) "Contaminants" means any explosives, radioactive materials, asbestos materials, urea formaldehyde, chlorobiphenyles, hydrocarbon contaminants, underground tanks, pollutants, contaminants, hazardous, corrosive substances, toxic substances, special waste, or any other substance the storage, manufacture, disposal, treatment, generation, use, transport, remediation or release into the environment of which is prohibited, controlled, regulated or licensed under Environmental Laws; and

- (b) "Environmental Laws" means any and all statutes, laws, regulations, orders, bylaws, permits and other lawful requirements of any federal, provincial, municipal or other governmental authority having jurisdiction over the Land now or hereafter in force with respect in any way to the environment or health, or occupational health and safety, including all applicable guidelines and standards with respect to the foregoing as adopted by any of those governmental authorities from time to time.
- 15) The Tenant is prohibited to, at any time during the Term:
 - (a) Use, exercise, or carry on or permit or suffer to be used, exercised or carried on, in or upon the Land, or any part, any dangerous, noxious, noisome, odorous or offensive activity, or keep, use, handle or dispose of any goods or things which are objectionable, or by which any of the Land, or any part, may be damaged or injuriously affected, or
 - (b) Use or permit to be used the Land or any part thereof for the storage, manufacture, disposal, treatment, generation, use, transport, remediation, release into the environment of, or any other dealing with, any Contaminants, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Tenant must take all reasonable measures to ensure that any effluent or other substance discharged, spilled, emitted, released or permitted to escape, seep or leak into any ditches, culverts, drains or sewers on or adjacent to the Land does not contain any Contaminants or any other substances harmful to any fish or animal habitat, sewage disposal works or to the bacteriological process of sewage purification.
- The Tenant must promptly and strictly comply with and conform to the requirements of all Environmental Laws at any time or from time to time in force, together with any requirement of insurers, regarding the proper and lawful storage, manufacture, disposal, treatment, generation, use, transport, remediation, release into the environment of, or other dealing with, Contaminants on, in under or from the Land.
- 17) The Tenant must provide the Landlord promptly on request with such written authorizations as the Landlord may require from time to time to make inquiries at any governmental authority regarding the Tenant's compliance with Environmental Laws.
- 18) Without derogating from the prohibitions in section 15, the Tenant must promptly notify the Landlord in writing of:
 - (a) The existence of any Contaminants in, on or under the Land or any part thereof;
 - (b) The existence of any Contaminants, or any occurrence or condition, on the Land which could subject the Tenant, the Landlord or the Land to any fines, penalties, orders or proceedings under Environmental Laws;
 - (c) Any enforcement, order, investigation, litigation or other governmental, regulatory, judicial or administrative action instituted, contemplated or threatened against the Tenant or the Land pursuant to Environmental Laws; and

- (d) All claims, actions, orders or investigations, made or threatened by any third party against the Tenant or the Land relating to damage, contribution, cost recovery, compensation, loss or injuries resulting from any Contaminants brought onto or created on the Land by the Tenant or its employees, agents, contractors, subtenants, licensees or invitees or arising from the use or occupation of the Land hereunder or the exercise of the Tenant's rights hereunder, or any breach of any Environmental Laws arising from any of the foregoing.
- 19) Without derogating from the prohibitions in section 15, the Tenant must, promptly at its own cost and at the Landlord's request from time to time, remove any and all Contaminants from the Land and remediate any contamination of the Land or any other lands, resulting from the Contaminants brought onto or created on the Land by the Tenant or its employees, agents, contractors, subtenants, Tenants, licensees, invitees, Tenants, caretakers or volunteers or arising from the use or occupation of the Land under this Lease or the exercise of the Tenants' rights under this Lease, all in accordance with Environmental Laws. On termination of this Lease, the Tenant must leave the Land free from any and all Contaminants brought onto or created on the Land by the Tenant or its employees, agents, contractors, subtenants, Tenants, licensees, invitees, Tenants, caretakers or volunteers or resulting from the use or occupation of the Land hereunder or the exercise of the Tenant's rights hereunder.
- 20) Despite the prohibitions in section 15, if the Tenant brings or creates upon the Land any Contaminants then, notwithstanding any rule of law to the contrary, such Contaminants are and remain the sole and exclusive property of the Tenant and do not become the property of the Landlord, notwithstanding the degree of affixation of the Contaminants or the goods containing the Contaminants to the Land and notwithstanding the expiry or earlier termination of this Lease. This section supersedes any other provision of this Lease to the contrary.
- 21) Notwithstanding sections 15 through 22 and section 24 of this Lease, the Landlord must indemnify and save harmless the Tenant and its directors, officers, employees, agents, caretakers and volunteers from any and all liabilities, actions, damages, claims, losses, costs and expenses (including without limitation, the full amount of all legal fees, costs, charges and expenses and the costs of removal, treatment, storage and disposal of Contaminants and remediation of the Land) which may be paid by, incurred by or asserted against the Tenant or its directors, officers, employees, agents, caretakers or volunteers for, with respect to or as a direct or indirect result of the presence of Contaminants on the Land on or before the execution date of this Lease.

Indemnity

The Tenant must indemnify and save harmless the Landlord and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns, from any and all liabilities, actions, damages, claims, losses, costs and expenses whatsoever (including without limitation, the full amount of all legal fees, costs, charges and expenses whatsoever) in any way directly or indirectly, arising from the occupation, activities or actions of the Tenant of, on or carried out on the Land or anything done or not done or maintained by the Tenant.

Without limiting the generality of section 23, the Tenant must indemnify and save harmless the Landlord and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns, from any and all liabilities, actions, damages, claims, losses, costs and expenses whatsoever (including without limitation, the full amount of all legal fees, cost, charges and expenses and the costs of removal, treatment, storage and disposal of Contaminants and remediation of the Land) which may be paid by, incurred by or asserted against the Landlord or its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns for, with respect to or as a direct or indirect result of the presence of any Contaminants on, in or under or the escape, seepage, leakage, spillage, discharge, emission or other release of any Contaminants from any part of the Land, except for Contaminants on the Land before the execution date of this Lease.

Survival of Indemnities

The obligations of the Tenant under sections 23 and 24 and of the Landlord under section 22 survive the expiry or earlier termination of this Lease.

Permission to Enter

Despite any provisions of this Lease, the Landlord or its authorized representative may enter upon the Land at all reasonable times for the purposes of inspection of the Land and any improvements on or to the Land.

Improvements at Termination

- On termination of this lease, the Tenant shall, at its expense and if the Landlord requires, remove all improvements and fixtures installed by the Tenant on the Land.
- 27) If the Tenant fails to leave the Land in a condition required by this Lease, the Landlord may do so on behalf of the Tenant and all such costs and expenses incurred by the Landlord shall be a debt owing by the Tenant to the Landlord and the Tenant must, on demand, compensate the Landlord for all such costs and expenses incurred by the Landlord.

Remedies Cumulative

28) No reference to or exercise of any specific right or remedy by the Landlord prejudices or precludes the Landlord from any other remedy, whether allowed at law or in equity or expressly provided for in this Lease. No such remedy is exclusive or dependent upon any other such remedy, but the Landlord may from time to time exercise any one or more of such remedies independently or in combination. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Landlord is entitled to commence and maintain an action against the Tenant to collect any Rent not paid when due, without exercising the option to terminate this Lease

No Assignment or Sublease

29) The Tenant must not assign the Tenant's interest in this Lease or sublet the Land in whole or in part, nor may the Tenant charge, mortgage or encumber or purport to charge, mortgage or encumber the Tenant's interest in the Land or this Lease.

Termination Due to Default

- 30) If and whenever
 - The Term or any of the goods or chattels on the Land are at any time seized or taken in execution or attachment by any creditor of the Tenant or under bill of sale or chattel mortgage;
 - b) A writ of execution issues against the goods and chattels of the Tenant;
 - c) The Tenant makes any assignment for the benefit of creditors or becomes insolvent or bankrupt;
 - d) Proceedings are begun to wind up the Tenant;
 - e) The Tenant is in default in the payment of the taxes under this Lease and the default continues for thirty (30) days after written notice by the Landlord to the Tenant;
 - f) Any improvements on or to the Land are destroyed or damaged by any cause so that in the opinion of the Landlord the Land is no longer reasonably fit for use by the Tenant for the purposes set out in this Lease for any period of time in excess of 10 days;
 - g) The Tenant does not fully observe, perform and keep each and every term, covenant, agreement, stipulation, obligation, condition and provision of this Lease to be observed, performed and kept by the Tenant, and persists in such default for thirty (30) days after written notice by the Landlord; or
 - h) The Tenant vacates or abandons the Land or uses or permits or suffers the use of the Land for any purpose other than the purposes permitted by this Lease, and such default persists for thirty (30) days after written notice by the Landlord,

Then the Landlord may, at its option, terminate this Lease and the Term then becomes immediately forfeited and void and the Tenant must immediately cease all use and occupation of the Land and must vacate and deliver up possession of the Land and the Landlord may without notice or any form of legal process and without any adherence to public law duties or procedural fairness or the principles of natural justice, forthwith re-enter the Land and repossess and enjoy the same.

Distress

If and whenever the Tenant is in default of the payment of any money, whether expressly reserved by this Lease or deemed as Rent, the Landlord may without notice or any form of legal process whatsoever, enter upon the Land and seize, remove and sell the Tenant's goods, chattels and equipment and seize, remove, and sell any goods, chattels and equipment at any place to which the Tenant or any other person may have removed them in the same manner as if they had remained and been distained upon the Land, notwithstanding any rule of law or equity to the contrary, and the Tenant hereby waives and renounces the benefit of any present or future statute or law limiting or eliminating the Landlord's right of distress.

No Joint Venture

32) Nothing contained in this Lease creates the relationship of principal and agent or of partnership or joint venture between the parties or gives the Tenant any power or authority to bind the Landlord in any way.

Interpretation

- 33) Reference in this Lease to:
 - a) The singular includes a reference to the plural, feminine, or body corporate or politic where the context requires, and a reference to the plural includes a reference to the singular, unless the context requires otherwise;
 - b) A particular numbered article or section, or lettered appendix is a reference to the correspondingly numbered article or section, or lettered appendix, of this Lease;
 - c) An "enactment" is a reference to an enactment as that term is defined in the *Interpretation Act* on the reference date of this Lease;
 - d) Any enactment is a reference to that enactment as amended, revised, consolidated or replaced; and
 - e) A party is a reference to a party to this Lease.

Notices

Where any notice, request, direction or other communication must be given or made by a party under the Lease, it must be in writing and is effective if delivered in person, sent by registered mail addressed to the party for whom it is intended at the address set forth above in the Lease or sent by facsimile to the Landlord at facsimile number (250) 723-1003 or to the Tenant at facsimile number (250) 724-1806, as the case may be, provided that any notice to the Landlord must be to the attention of the City Clerk. Any notice, request, direction or other communication is deemed to have been given if delivered in person, when delivered; by registered mail, when the postal receipt is acknowledged by the other party; and, by facsimile, when transmitted. The address or facsimile number of a party may be changed by notice in the manner set out in this section.

No Effect on Laws or Powers

35) Nothing contained or implied herein prejudices or affects the Landlord's rights and powers in the exercise of its functions pursuant to the *Local Government Act* or its rights and powers under any enactment to the extent the same are applicable to the Land, all of which may be fully and effectively exercised in relation to the Land as if this Lease had not been fully executed and delivered.

Severance

36) If any portion of this Lease is held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the invalid portion shall be severed and the decision that it is invalid must not affect the validity of the remainder of the Lease.

No Public Law Duty

37) Whenever in this Lease the Landlord is required or entitled at its discretion to consider granting any consent or approval, or is entitled to exercise any option to determine any matter, or to take any action or remedy including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the termination of this Lease and the re-entering of the Land, the Landlord may do so in accordance with the contractual provisions of this Lease and no public law duty of procedural fairness or principle of natural justice shall have any application.

Binding on Successors

This Lease inures to the benefit of and is binding upon the parties and their respective successors and assigns, notwithstanding any rule of law or equity to the contrary.

Law of British Columbia

39) This Lease must be construed according to the laws of the Province of British Columbia.

Whole Agreement

40) The provisions in this Lease constitute the whole of the agreement between the parties and supersede all previous communications, representations, warranties, covenants and agreements, whether verbal or written, between the parties with respect to the subject matter of the Lease.

Waiver or Non-action

41) Waiver by the Landlord of any breach of any term, covenant or condition of this Lease by the Tenant must not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default by the Tenant. Failure by the Landlord to take any action in respect of any breach of any term, covenant or condition of this Lease by the Tenant must not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant or condition.

Reference

42) Every reference to a party is deemed to include the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, assigns, servants, employees, agents, contractors, officers, licensees and invitees of such party wherever the context so requires or allows.

Time of the Essence

44. Time is of the essence of this Lease.

Issue

In the past the City has entered into contracts with the West Coast Hockey Prep Camp Inc. for 2 or 3 year contracts (2011-2012 and 2013-2015). We have recently negotiated a new five year operating agreement and associated terms.

Discussion

The Camp is a private, for profit business which has operated out of the Alberni Valley Multiplex since 2007, generally for four weeks starting in mid-July. In addition they have also used Glenwood Centre and adjacent sport fields including Bob Dailey Stadium. The Athletic Hall is used as a dormitory and food service facility.

The camp has a significant impact on the local economy. The 2015 Camp included 842 participants from B.C., other areas of Canada and the United States, but also Hungary, New Zealand, Switzerland, Romania, Germany, Australia and more.



Some of the other community benefits include:

- It is estimated that approximately 50% of the participants come with their families. The families stay the week in hotels while their child attends the camp.
- Rental and staff costs for Multiplex and Athletic Hall \$90,000
- Catering utilizing local staff and purchasing food in the valley \$65,000
- Local purchases of supplies \$22,000
- Local accommodation for guest coaches (coming from throughout the world)
 \$25.000
- Local advertising/promotion \$2,000

Staff have been negotiating with the Jr. Prep Camp organization and have developed the attached agreement for Council consideration.

Highlights of the agreement include:

- A five year agreement. To ensure stability for the organizers and the City they have requested a five year agreement.
- Increased minimum hours. In the past the agreements guaranteed a minimum of 480 hours of ice time during the 4 weeks of the camp. The new agreement guarantees 540 hours.
- Available ice time for the community on the weekend. In the past the Camp had exclusive use of the ice during the 4 weeks of the camp. This year the City will be able to rent out ice time to local users from noon on Saturday to 7:00 am Monday.
- Use of Glenwood Centre for dryland training. They will be charged a daily rate of \$150.00 per day. In the past the Camp has rented space at Echo Centre specifically for a yoga class (\$1,300 in 2015) and on occasion used Glenwood for no charge.
- The rental rate increases by 5% for each year of the agreement.

The terms and conditions outlined in the Agreement have been reviewed and approved by the Junior Prep Camp organization.

Recommendation

The Council for the City of Port Alberni receive the report dated June 21, 2016 and approve the Agreement with West Coast Hockey Prep Camp Inc. as negotiated including a five year term (2016-2020) and annual increase of 5% as noted in the agreement.

THIS AGREEMENT dated for reference is April 1, 2016

BETWEEN:

CITY OF PORT ALBERNI, a municipal Corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the Province of British and having an office at 4850 Argyle Street, in the City of Port Alberni, Province of British Columbia, V9Y1V8.

("City")

AND

West Coast Hockey Prep Camp, 102 – 1717 Haro Street, Vancouver, B.C. V6G 1H1

("Camp")

WHEREAS

The City and the Camp hereby are entering into an agreement whereby a Junior Prep Hockey Camp will occupy the Alberni Valley Multiplex, located at 3737 Roger Street, Port Alberni, V9Y 8J4, hereinafter called the "Premises", which Premises are owned and operated by the City.

Now therefore the parties agree as follows:

A. Term:

The term of this Agreement is for a period of 5 years beginning January 1, 2016.

B. Rent:

The Camp must pay to the City rental rates as noted below, plus tax, for each year of the Term.

2016	\$127 per hour
2017	\$133 per hour
2018	\$140 per hour
2019	\$148 per hour
2020	\$154 per hour

Payment for the base rental shall be made in advance of the mid July annual camp.

The rent shall be an hourly rate based on a minimum of:

Annual Dates:

2016 - Monday July 11 - Saturday August 6 2017 - Monday July 17 - Saturday August 12 2018 - Monday July 16 - Saturday August 11 2019 - Monday July 15 - Saturday August 10 2020 - Monday July 13 - Saturday August 8

Glenwood:

Monday to Friday 8am – 6pm for the 4 weeks of the camp, except during City of Port Alberni "Our Town events". The "Our Town events" are hosted on two Tuesdays in July. The rent shall be based on a daily rate of \$150 per day.

Renewal:

The Camp having duly and punctually observed and performed all of the covenants, agreements, conditions, provisions, provisos and terms of this Agreement on the Camp's part to be observed and performed, may, by delivering written notice to the City not later than four months, (May 1^{st)}, prior to the expiration of the Term, renew this Agreement for a further Term of five (5) years from the expiration of the Term. Any such renewal will include all covenants, agreements, conditions, provisos and terms as contained in this Agreement except for the renewal provision and except for the rental rate. The rent will be based on the prevailing market rental rates and the City of Port Alberni Financial Plan forecast at that time. WCHPC requests Renewal/extension option for 5 years following camp in 2019 (to 2024).

C. City's Covenants:

The City covenants and agrees to provide the following for the Camp's operations:

- 1) all necessary and appropriate maintenance and janitorial personnel to properly accommodate the Camp events;
- 2) assurance that the west parking lot will be made available for the exclusive use of the Camp for dry land training exercises; and
- full rent relief during the camp in the event of a closure of the Premises due to labour disputes, or other circumstances that may close the Premises if the parties cannot reschedule ice time as reasonable under such circumstances;

D. Camp Covenants:

The Camp covenants and agrees to provide the following:

- 1) use of the Premises only for the purposes of providing the West Coast Hockey Prep Camp and for any other uses ancillary to those purposes;
- payment to the City all taxes which may be payable in respect to the Agreement;
- 3) compliance with any and all statutes, enactments, bylaws, regulations and orders from time to time in force and be obtaining the required approvals and permits hereunder and not to omit or do anything upon or from the Premises in contravention thereof;
- 4) keeping of the Premises in a reasonable and safe, clean and sanitary condition and at the end of the annual rental, surrender of the Premises to the City in good repair, excepting reasonable wear and tear; and
- 5) agreement not to make or erect in, on or to the Premises any buildings, structures, signs, improvements, extensions, installations, alterations or additions, or nor to alter the existing state of the Premises in any way without obtaining the City's written consent.

E. Indemnity:

The Camp must indemnify and save harmless the City and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns, from any and all liabilities, actions, damages, claims, losses, costs and expenses whatsoever (including without limitation, the full amount of all legal fees, costs, charges and expenses whatsoever) in any way directly or indirectly, arising from the occupation, activities or actions of the Camp of, on or carried out on the Premises or anything done or not done or maintained by the Camp.

The obligations of the Camp to indemnify the City survive the expiry or earlier termination of this Agreement.

F. Insurance:

- 1. The Camp must at their sole expense, obtain and maintain during the Term:
 - a) comprehensive general liability insurance providing coverage for death, bodily injury, property loss and damage, and all other losses, arising out of or in connection with the use of the Premises in an amount not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence; and
 - all risk insurance, for replacement cost, on all Camp's fixtures and personal property in the Premises, in such an amount as may be reasonably required by the City.
- 2. All policies of insurance required to be taken out by the Camp must be

with companies satisfactory to the City and must:

- a) name the City as an additional insured;
- include that the City is protected notwithstanding any act, neglect or misrepresentation by the Camp which might otherwise result in the avoidance of a claim and that such policies are not affected or invalidated by any act, omission or negligence of any third party which is not within the knowledge or control of the insured;
- c) be issued by an insurance company entitled to carry on the business of insurance under the laws of British Columbia;
- d) be primary and non-contributing with respect to any policies carried by the City and that any coverage carried by the City is in excess coverage;
- e) not be cancelled without the insurer providing the City with thirty (30) clear days written notice stating when such cancellation is to be effective;
- f) be maintained for a period of twelve (12) months per occurrence;
- g) not include a deductible greater than \$5,000 per occurrence;
- h) include a cross liability clause; and
- i) be on other terms acceptable to the City, acting reasonably.
- The Camp must obtain all required insurance at its sole expense and must provide the City with certificates of insurance confirming the placement and maintenance of the insurance, promptly after a request to do so by the City.
- 4. If the Camp fails to insure as required, the City may, after thirty (30) days' notice, effect the insurance in the name and at the expense of the Camp and the Camp must promptly repay the City all costs reasonably incurred by the City in doing so, and such costs shall form part of the Rent for the Land, and may be collected by the City as Rent.

G. Improvements at Termination:

If the Camp fails to leave the Premises in a condition required by this Agreement, the City may do so on behalf of the Camp and the Camp must, on demand, compensate the City for all costs incurred by the City.

H. No Assignment or Sub Agreement:

The Camp must not assign the Camp's interest in this Agreement or sublet the Premises in whole or in part without the prior written consent of the City, nor may the Camp charge, mortgage or encumber or purport to charge, mortgage or

encumber the Camp's interest in the Premises or this Agreement.

I. Termination Due to Default:

If and whenever:

- a) the Camp or any of the goods or chattels on the Premises are seized or taken in execution or attachment by any creditor of the Camp or under bill of same or chattel mortgage;
- b) a writ of execution issues against the goods and chattels of the Camp;
- c) the Camp makes any assignment for the benefit of the creditors or becomes insolvent or bankrupt;
- d) proceedings have begun to wind up the Camp;
- e) the Camp is in default in the payment of the rent or any other sum payable under the agreement and the default continues for thirty (30) days after written notice by the City to the Camp;
- f) any improvements on or to the Premises are destroyed or damaged by any cause so that in the opinion of the City, the Premises are no longer reasonably fit for use by the Camp for the purposes set out in this agreement for any period of time in excess of 180 days;
- g) if the Camp does not fully observe, perform and keep each and every term, covenant, agreement, stipulation, obligation, condition and provision of this Agreement to be observed, performed and kept by the Camp, and persist in such default for thirty (30) days after written notice by the City; or
- h) the Camp vacates or abandons the Premises or uses or permits or suffers the use of the Premises for any purpose other than the purposes permitted by this Agreement, and such default persists for five (5) days after written notice from the City; then

The City may, at its option, terminate this agreement and the Term then becomes immediately forfeited and void and the Camp must immediately cease all use and occupation of the Premises and must vacate and deliver up possession of the Premises and the City may re-enter the Premises and repossess and enjoy the same. If the Premises are destroyed and rebuilt the Camp shall have the first right to reinstate the Agreement.

J. Termination - Just Cause

If financial conditions within the City of Port Alberni change significantly necessitating substantial reductions to operating budgets, the City holds the right to issue notice of termination one year in advance of the respective January 1, agreement anniversary date.

K. No Joint Venture:

Nothing contained in this Agreement creates the relationship of principal and

agent or of partnership or joint venture between the parties or gives the Camp any power or authority to bind the City in any way.

L. Whole Agreement:

The provisions in this Agreement constitute the whole of the Agreement between the parties and supersede all previous communications, representations, warranties, covenants and agreements, whether verbal or written, between the parties with respect to the subject matter of the Agreement.

ISSUE

At issue is the consideration of an application for Development Permit No. 16-03 to facilitate a renovation to the apartment building at 3131 5th Avenue.

BACKGROUND

The owners of the apartment building are planning renovate the exterior of the building. The property is zoned RM3- Higher Density Multiple Family Residential and is within Development Permit Area No. 1 (Multiple Family Residential). The development permit guidelines cover the form and character of the project with the intent being to ensure a high quality and appropriate development.

DISCUSSION

Building

The project will remove the existing stucco exterior material and widows from the building. There will be no building expansion and the site layout and parking will not change. An elevation plan illustrate the new exterior appearance of the building is attached. The new exterior will material will consist of two different colours of hardi panel and horizontal hardi plank. There will be wood trim to match the hardi panel and new vinyl windows throughout the building.

CONCLUSIONS

The replacement of all the windows and a new exterior siding for the apartment building at 3131 5th Avenue will be a good façade improvement. The Planning Department supports the issuance of a Development Permit to allow for renovation to 3131 5th Avenue.

RECOMMENDATION



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

ISSUE: May 2016 RCMP report to Mayor and Council

DISCUSSION:

This report represents the policing activities undertaken by the Port Alberni RCMP Detachment during May 2016. I have included an update on policing activities thus far in 2016 and a comparator to previous years.

The following represents some of the calls for services received, investigations undertaken and activities of the RCMP during the month:

- Officers received and responded to 893 calls for service in the City of Port Alberni.
- There was a spike in thefts in May. Messaging has gone out to the public to Lock It or Lose It.
- May saw the first bike patrol with the Number 7 Challenge- Race the Train event.
- Our Community Policing volunteers have been extremely busy with Speed Watch,
 Cell Watch, Citizens on Patrol and in the Community Policing Office.
- Two prolific bike thieves have been identified and charges are pending.



The focus of the Port Alberni RCMP's 2016/17 Annual Performance Plan is:

- Traffic- Road Safety: Increase Provincial Stats, both tickets and warnings.
 Reduction of Impaired drivers on the roads through criminal code charges and
 Immediate Roadside Prohibitions. This will include dedicated traffic enforcement,
 joint enforcement with CITS and IRSU and the use of Speed Watch volunteers.
- **Property Crime:** Reduction in the number of theft complaints through intelligence gathering as well as foot patrols of high crime areas, joint enforcement projects and the use of COP volunteers.
- **Crime Reduction/ Offender Management:** This includes the re-establishment of the Prolific Offender Program as well as the continued use of compliance checks and curfew checks.
- Aboriginal Policing: This includes traffic safety and enforcement on the First Nations, greater visibility at community events and meetings and a focus on First Nation Youth through prevention programs and involvement in schools and at youth events.

The following resolution is proposed:

That the monthly report from the RCMP providing information about current departmental operations be received.

Brief Update on Selected Work from May 24th to present

Façade Improvement Program

- Our partner in this program, Community Futures Alberni-Clayoquot (CFAC), received Expressions of Interest (EOI) applications from 21 building owners for 26 buildings
- EOI applications were from all commercial areas of the City and represent close to \$600,000 worth of façade improvements
- 8 buildings are in Council's priority areas and 18 buildings are on a corner lot or are very visible stand-alone buildings
- In recognition of the value and potential impact of this program, the Board of Community Futures has decided to augment Council's allocation of \$50,000 with an additional \$100,000 of non-refundable investments. This is in addition to CFAC providing for architectural services and special façade improvement loans at Prime + 2% (or 4.7%) for those businesses desiring that
- Most businesses are long-standing ones in Port Alberni and thus have maintained through the recent decade of economic challenges
- Many benefits are anticipated from the program besides a more attractive curb appeal including employment for many local contractors and, based on research done by CFAC, better financial results for the businesses involved.
- The architect has already met with some of the applicants and will meet with all other applicants over the coming weeks
- The architect will work with the building owners to help prepare them for the actual Façade Improvement Program (FIP) application; these are expected to arrive over time considering façade complexity and contractor availability
- Those that get final FIP approval will be required to have any outstanding building permit and fire code issues resolved prior to receiving grant funding
- Some façade improvement will begin imminently awhile others may not conclude until spring 2017
- 4 building owners (some owning multiple commercial properties) have inquired about a second round of funding since the application deadline of June 6th

Grant Applications

- An application was submitted to the Rural Dividend Program for funding to deliver tourism sector training to front-line workers in stores along Johnston Road and Redford Street to better prepare them to respond to questions asked by visitors. The ultimate goals of the project are to increase the number of hours a visitor spends in Port Alberni, to increase tourism revenue and to give workers an opportunity to gain skills useful in the tourism industry which is projecting labour shortages.
- An Expression of Interest was submitted to the Provincial Initiative in Affordable Housing for funding of a project that would install energy-conservation measures in an existing six-unit apartment building in order to reduce monthly expenditures made by low and moderate income renters.
- A letter of support for an Expression of Interest to the Provincial Initiative in Affordable Housing: was provided to a local organization proposing to build 20 new, small units for low to moderate income seniors.

Brief Notes from the BC Economic Development Association Economic Summit

- A BC-wide survey of economic development stakeholders found that their top priorities included Business Retention & Expansion (61%); Tourism & Cultural Activities (48%); Business & Industry Attraction (41%); and Entrepreneurial Development (25%)
- Other top priorities identified by communities with populations between 10,001 and 25,000 included Marketing & Attraction of Residents; Addressing Downtown Matters; Shop-Local Campaigns; and Workforce Development
- A presentation by members of the Fraser River Industrial Association showed that Port Metro's biggest challenge is their growth in the context of a shortage of industrial land
- · Co-working and maker-spaces are being created in many communities throughout BC
- There are more than 100 craft breweries throughout BC employing 4,000 people and generating about \$100 million in revenue annually
- The BCEDA Awards are a source of inspiration and in particular, the City of Powell River's 'Resident Attraction Campaign' and the City of Quesnel's 'Healthcare Recruitment Red Carpet Welcome' are two initiatives worth emulating.

Marketing the City of Port Alberni

- A proposed TV ad campaign has been rescheduled for a mid-September start; the advantages to this later start date are that::
 - o it provides time to collect responses from surveys being distributed to new residents; these responses are expected to give us more insight into who is choosing to move here, where they are coming from, for what reasons, what was known by them prior to moving and what may have been a pleasant surprise after moving here
 - o it provides time for collecting summer footage of events in the city
 - o it allows for additional testimonials from new residents
 - the viewing audience is likely to be larger as most people will have returned from summer holidays



Re: Federal government reviewing our public postal service - Have your say!

I am writing to let you know that the federal government is conducting a review of Canada Post. It says that everything but postal privatization is on the table. This means daily mail delivery, restoring home delivery, postage rates, the moratorium on post office closures and more.

The review will have two phases. The government has appointed an independent task force to collect input from Canadians, do research, gather facts and identify options for the future of our postal service by September 2016. Following this, a parliamentary committee will consult with Canadians on the options identified by the task force and make recommendations to the government by year's end. The government expects to announce its decisions about Canada Post in the spring of 2017. For more information, go to CUPW.ca/canadapostreview and Canada.ca/canadapostreview

While CUPW welcomes the opportunity to look at the future of our public postal service, we have a number of concerns about the review. The review's first phase – the part that determines the options that will be examined – is being held over the summer. As well, there has been very little information and advertising about the review, except in social media. We are concerned people will not learn about the review until it's too late.

CUPW would like to ensure that the views of municipalities are considered. Therefore, we would like you, if at all possible, to provide input to the Canada Post Review. We have attached a resolution for your consideration, information on providing input and some fact sheets on key issues.

Thank you very much for considering our request. There's a lot at stake and we appreciate anything you can do to help. We would also like to take this opportunity to express our gratitude to the many municipalities that supported our campaign to stop the cuts that Canada Post announced in December 2013, including the end of home mail delivery. We had a major victory when Canada Post announced a temporary hold on its plan to eliminate door-to-door delivery. CUPW is confident that we can build on this success and convince the Canada Post Review to recommend against further cuts in favour of new services that generate revenues and allow us to build a universal, affordable and green public postal system for future generations.

Public review on future of Canada Post

Whereas Canada Post announced drastic cutbacks to our public postal service in December 2013, including plans to end home mail delivery in our country.

Whereas there was a huge public outcry in response to the cutbacks and stiff opposition from most federal parties, including the Liberal Party, which promised to halt the delivery cuts and conduct a review of Canada Post, if elected.

Whereas the delivery cuts were halted and our Liberal government is currently conducting a Canada Post Review, starting with an independent task force that will collect input from Canadians, do research, gather facts and draft a discussion paper in September of 2016, identifying viable options for postal service in this country.

Whereas a parliamentary committee will consult with Canadians in the fall of 2016 on the options that have been identified in the task force's discussion paper and then make recommendations to the government on the future of Canada Post.

Whereas it will be crucial for the task force and parliamentary committee to hear our views on key issues, including the importance of maintaining the moratorium on post office closures, improving the Canadian Postal Service Charter, restoring home mail delivery, keeping daily delivery, adding postal banking, greening Canada Post, and developing services to assist people with disabilities and help older Canadians to remain in their homes for as long as possible.

Therefore be it resolved that (name of municipality) provide input to the Canada Post Review task force and make a submission when the parliamentary committee consults with Canadians this fall.

A bank for everyone Support Postal Banking

Postal banking is the provision of financial and banking services through a post office. It is not a new or radical idea. Postal banks already exist in many parts of the world where they are used to:

- increase financial inclusion
- promote economic development
- and generate revenue to preserve public postal service and jobs

In fact, our post office used to have a national savings bank – up until 1969 – and there is no reason we shouldn't have one today.



Why do we need postal banking?

Banks are failing to meet the needs of a growing number of Canadians. Thousands of towns and villages across our country do not have a bank. But many of them have a post office that could provide access to financial and banking services.

Nearly two million Canadians in urban and rural areas desperately need an alternative to predatory payday lenders. A postal bank could be that alternative.

Canadian banks have raked in enormous profits while cutting service, closing branches and charging some of the highest banking and ATM fees in the world. We deserve better.

Post administrations around the world, including Canada Post, have seen traditional mail volumes decline in recent years. Many post offices have added or expanded financial services in order to lessen their dependence on declining mail volumes and revenues. Postal banking could help Canada Post make money and increase its ability to provide public postal service and create decent jobs in communities throughout Canada.

Postal banking is lucrative!

New Zealand: Kiwibank generated 81% of New Zealand Post's after tax profits.

Switzerland: PostFinance produced 48% of Swiss Post's operating profits.

Italy: BancoPosta profits allowed the Italian post office to make 57 million Euros in profits (\$86.1 million CAD) in spite of losses incurred by its postal business.

France: La Banque Postale's operating profits of 842 million Euros (\$1271.6 million CAD) made a significant contribution to Le Group La Poste's operating profits of 719 million Euros (\$1085.8 million CAD).

Postal banking has social & economic benefits

France: Banque Postale has an obligation to provide products and services to as many people as possible. It provides a Livret A or passbook savings account, at



no charge, to anyone who requests it. It also provides banking services to the financially vulnerable and financing for social housing, voluntary organizations and microentrepreneurs lacking bank credit.

Brazil: Since its creation in 2002, Banco Postal at Brazil's post office has



opened over 6,200 postal bank branches and provided bank accounts to about ten million people. These efforts are largely designed to meet the needs of poor and marginalized populations living in rural and underdeveloped areas.

Italy: BancoPosta offers current accounts, payment services and postal


savings products on behalf of Cassa depositi e prestiti (CDP). The CDP, which is 80% owned by the Italian government, supports the development of the country

by financing the investments of public entities, helping local authorities leverage their real estate assets, investing in social housing, and supporting energy efficiency policies.

We had a postal bank

Canada had postal banking for over a hundred years. The federal government passed legislation establishing a post office savings bank system just after Confederation in 1867 in order to provide a savings service to the working classes and small town residents. This system began operating in 1868 with 81 locations and grew quickly. By 1884, there were 343 post office savings banks, with a balance of \$13 million from almost 67,000 accounts. However, Canada's postal banking system confronted challenges from chartered banks by the 1890s. These banks, facing a recession, became interested in attracting the kind of small-time depositors who used post office savings





banks and they actively worked to undermine postal banking. In 1898, the chartered banks successfully lobbied the government to reduce the interest rate paid on deposits at postal savings banks from 3% to 2.5%. They also worked to eliminate advertising by postal banks. As time went on, chartered banks and credit unions increased their presence in communities and the post office and government became less interested in maintaining the network. The post office savings bank system was closed down in 1969.

Support for postal banking


Municipalities: Over 600 municipalities have passed resolutions that support postal banking.

Public: Almost two out of every three respondents (63%) to a 2013 Stratcom poll supported Canada Post expanding revenue-generating services, including financial services like bill payments, insurance and banking.

Canada Post: A number of former Canada Post presidents have considered and even promoted the notion of the corporation getting more involved in financial services: Michael Warren, Andre Ouellet, Moya Greene.

Universal Postal Union: The UPU, a United Nations agency, thinks post offices should be looking at expanding financial services. It has produced a global roadmap for the future. This roadmap calls for the continued development of postal networks along three dimensions – physical, financial and digital/electronic.

Federal parties: Most federal parties have expressed either support for or an interest in postal banking. In 2014, the Liberal Party postal critic said the merits of postal banking should be explored in the context of several different options for the future of Canada Post.



Canada Post's secret postal banking study

Canada Post conducted a secret four-year study on postal banking that indicates that adding this service "would be a win-win strategy" for the corporation. This study was obtained though an Access to Information (ATI) request. Unfortunately, 701 of the study's 811 pages were redacted. CUPW has asked Canada Post's President to release the full report, but he has refused.

What would a postal bank look like?

There are many different models of postal banking. Some postal administrations set up their own bank. Others act as a financial intermediary by providing services in partnership with banking and other financial institutions, such as credit unions. In this instance, they work with one or a number of institutions, which operate nationally or in different regions. Some postal banks deliver a broad range of financial services, while others provide a more limited offering.

Services provided by postal banks:

- Savings and checking accounts
- Online banking
- Bank machines
- Credit cards, debit cards, pre-paid cards
- · Money transfers, including remittances
- Insurance (home, auto, travel, etc.)
- Loans and mortgages
- Investment products (RRSPs, mutual funds, annuities)
- Foreign currency
- Other services such as financial counselling

Government review of Canada Post

CUPW wants the government review of Canada Post to recommend the addition of financial and banking services at Canada Post, or at a minimum, a task force to determine how to deliver new financial and banking services through our postal service.

Canada Post used to and could still provide financial and banking services like other post offices around the world. We could provide savings and chequing accounts; bank machines; lines of credit, mortgages, money transfers, etc.

Postal banking is profitable in many parts of the world and could reinvest its profits back into our communities. See CUPW's A Bank for Everyone campaign and go to cupw.ca/PostalBanking.

Get Display Space:

Canada Post's retail space could be better used in many locations. Why not rent display space to artists and producers for showcasing their specialty goods for fixed lengths of time? Showcase "Canadiana"? Or help on-line sales of products through a website portal like the Swiss post office?

Why Not Get Better Cell, Internet and Secure Data Service?

Canadians want simple, affordable internet and cell phone service. Canada Post could offer basic cell phone packages. It could also use its infrastructure to provide high-speed internet in rural and remote areas that do not have access to this service. Many post offices in Europe, such as the UK, Italy and France, already offer internet and cell service.

Canada Post could also collect data quickly and frequently for ethical use in transportation, infrastructure and public planning.

Why Not Get More at the Door?

With the largest delivery network in the country, Canada Post could deliver a lot more.

Get More Parcels:

The parcel delivery sector is growing rapidly as a result of e-commerce and internet marketing. It doesn't make sense to have multiple courier companies driving down the same streets every day to deliver parcels.

Canada Post could provide last mile delivery for the entire sector. This would lower prices and be good for the environment because it would reduce our use of fossil fuels, and cut pollution and traffic congestion.

Canada Post already provides last mile for FedEx in rural and small communities.

Get Your Groceries:

Canada Post could partner with large grocery stores to offer home delivery across the country like the Swiss and Danish post offices.

Remember, It's A Canada Post for Everyone

Of course, Canada Post isn't simply about making money. Like other Crown corporations, it is supposed to serve our public interest.

As well as considering revenue-generating services, Canada Post ought to be strengthening and expanding the services it provides to all Canadians. For example:

Get Better Services for Seniors and People with Mobility Issues:

Our population is aging and we need to keep our communities connected.

Canada Post used to have a service called Letter Carrier Alert that allowed letter carriers to monitor seniors and people with disabilities. Many letter carriers still informally check up on their neighbourhoods and the people on their routes. In partnership with municipal governments, communities, health care providers and seniors, we can keep doing this, helping older Canadians to remain in their homes for as long as possible.

La Poste in France is a leader in testing such new roles for the letter carriers. It partners with pharmacies to deliver medicine and works with organizations to check on people who are vulnerable, isolated or disabled.

Japan Post also has a service called "Watch Over" that checks on seniors and reports back to family members for a small monthly fee.

This service costs the equivalent of about \$8.40 US per month. According to the Inspector General of the United States Postal Service, a similar service in the US would generate \$12.6 million in revenues annually if just one per cent of its 12.5 million older adults that live alone signed up.

Japan Post will deliver 4-5 million iPads to seniors by 2020. The iPads will have apps that facilitate check-ins and remind seniors to take their medications, eat and exercise.

I'm writing to draw your attention to an issue of importance to members of the United Steelworkers working in the BC forest industry, particularly those employed on Vancouver Island.

It has come to our attention that certain organizations are lobbying for an end to old growth logging in the Walbran area of TFL 46, and more recently, some other areas of the Island. Such a move would inflict considerable harm to the thousands of workers employed in the forest industry throughout Costal BC.

Our union believes strongly in the value of our province's working forests. Our forests are a renewable resource that requires proper management to ensure their sustainability for generations to come. We have not shied away from raising our concerns when actions are undertaken that threaten this sustainability; be it from companies that are not logging responsibly, governments that are allowing for record number of log exports or organizations which seek to lock up large areas of the working forest resulting in lost jobs, economic activity and reduced revenue for important government programs.

High value timber from old growth logging is an integral element of the forest industry that provides balance to the lower values strands of timber that are logged by our members.

As these issues are discussed, we ask you to consider the perspective of forest workers, their families and communities that rely upon a sustainable, working forest for their livelihoods.

Should Council be interested, our office would be pleased to present more information on this important topic for your consideration.

With all due respect to council and staff who have taken the time to be proactive in helping find a solution regarding the zoning and licensing of medical marijuana dispensaries.

We here at West Side Alternatives feel that we have given due process a chance and have allowed fair market to play its course. We formally request that council revisit the bylaw 6.26.2A in regards to distances between dispensaries. There have been several issues of contention during this process and we understand that all direction taken by council has been proactive in attempting to work with what the community as a whole is seeking to adopt which is why we have chosen now to act.

We have given our business a chance to establish itself within the community and have attempted to follow a moral route of contributing a portion of our profits directly back to underfunded city projects.

While we have operated a visually appealing business front and made every attempt to help keep our neighborhood clean we have yet to receive a visit from a single city councilor and we would welcome the opportunity for an open house or an informational meeting on location to help everyone become as educated as possible on the new form of business that you have already chosen to regulate. Helping everyone to access the best information on what's happening is going to be the best approach for everyone. However we have already acted upon some of these issues and the best I can do for you my council is to openly request you come visit each location for yourselves.



Since opening our doors a few months ago we have made charitable donations to multiple organizations not limited to but including the following.

Alberni Valley hospice

Alberni citizens advocacy program

Alberni valley shelter

Stepping stones daycare

Alberni gymnastics academy

We have also started to take the appropriate steps towards being able to help fund or assist in the majority of fundraising towards the construction of the pier at the canal beach. However we are still waiting on call backs from the appropriate channels.

While we respect the direction taken thus far we feel that our continued community support deserves to be brought to light at this point in time.

We have applied to be heard before the board of variance and denied so my next approach is to appeal to you my councilors to please reconsider these distances which were previously set before we had any knowledge of what would happen between stores and the council really didn't have much info to go on.

There is also the matter of timeline issues which have been highly contested... my points to this effect are as follows

In early January Aaron Brevick on behalf of West Side Alternatives met with then city manager Ken Watson. West Side explained to the city that there was a portion of profits that would normally be directed towards federal tax but since the government was not in a position to take the funds with the current federal laws being as they are. West Side was willing to donate 10% of profits towards underfunded city projects. We did explain that there was a possibility that this would be considered proceeds of crime and this was the reason that the city cited for not being able to take funds from us at that time.

On January 6th after more inquisitive questioning to city officials I was directed to pay \$220 to the city for a business license which they would hold and only accept if my application was approved. (I am not sure how the \$220 requested at this time does not fall into the same proceeds of crime category, Regardless I accepted.)

I was directed by city officials that cash would be fine and that it would be held until my application was processed. After I had made my deposit I received a call the following day saying that cash could not be accepted and I would need to return to pick up my cash and I could in turn leave a cheuqe. It quickly became obvious that the rules of engagement were not very clear for myself or for staff who were transitioning into this new development.

On Jan 6th I had already approached the city with a business that had a signed lease in place and I upgraded the building to the extent of \$10,000 to comply with requested monitored fire alarm system and alarm codes. My store front was operating well before it was made public knowledge that applications were to be taken on a first come first serve basis.

In fact I have publicly challenged several councilors to release a timeline of events in which this new industry has unfolded. I explained to Mr. Scott Smith that there is no way that all members came to work one day and everyone decided to regulate on the same day. To lead me to believe this is extending into fallacy and I would appreciate if we could all be realistic. We have all been told repeatedly that everything has been public knowledge the whole time but members are avoiding the direct questions of what came first the decision or the applications. What I believe happened was that someone submitted an application for a dispensary and then the city was forced to act upon this. As rumors spread a second application was tendered and only then was it decided that a first come first serve would be accepted. Had the general public been informed that these would become available first come first serve in advance I assure you the city would have received a hundred more than they did and after speaking with over 800 people about this not a single person was aware of the process and so we the public deem councils actions to be unjust and opens a door for legal recourse by West Side to challenge the city of Port Alberni in court over violation of our section 7 charter of rights and freedoms which is bound to become a costly venture for both parties but not something that we are willing to dismiss at this point.

So far the city has issued Aaron Brevick one ticket of \$150 for operating without a business license and we will be discussing this matter in front of a provincial court at a future date with an unknown cost to tax payers.

We understand that with the many open stores in the uptown area if West Side was to open in a new location we would be in direct violation of what the city has requested however we were already in a secure location with a signed lease and open doors prior to announcing any bylaws pertaining to distance regulations.

If the city wishes for only one license in the uptown area than one or more stores must close...

We just want everyone to be on the same playing field when we appear in a court of law and the only thing stopping that is a number on paper set by the council. Nothing changes except a number. Now that the businesses are established and we know what we can expect from the stores that are open I see no reason why the council wouldn't revisit this issue at this time.

Please consider the numbers of 200 and 300 meters with respect to Victoria and Vancouver.

We have included a large list of support letters from local business owners as well as customers and other local dispensaries.

We hope that all this has been read by each and every member of council prior to casting your vote on this matter.

Thank you for your time in considering our simple request.

Thank you for your correspondence, sent on behalf of the City of Port Alberni, concerning marijuana. I regret the lengthy delay in responding.

As you may be aware, our government will introduce legislation in the spring of 2017 in support of our commitment to legalize marijuana.

It is important to note that, currently, the existing laws concerning marijuana remain in force. The possession, production, and trafficking of marijuana are some of the activities that are prohibited under the *Controlled Drugs and Substances Act* and are subject to law enforcement intervention, except where authorized by exemptions or regulations, such as the *Marihuana for Medical Purposes Regulations*.

I am working with my colleagues the Honourable Ralph Goodale, Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, the Honourable Jane Philpott, Minister of Health, and my parliamentary secretary, Mr. Bill Blair, on the launch of a task force that will provide expert advice on how the legalization process should take place, including the strict regulation of and restriction of access to marijuana. The task force will include perspectives from many different sectors, including health, justice, law enforcement, and public safety.

Our objective is to ensure that marijuana is kept out of the hands of children and the profits out of the hands of criminals. Please be assured that the protection of Canadians is a priority for us as we work on this issue.

I understand that as part of your mandate you have been tasked with working with the Ministers of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness and Health, to create a federal-provincial-territorial process that will lead to the legalization and regulation of marijuana.

As one of many communities across the country that is dealing with a proliferation of medical marijuana dispensaries, I am writing on behalf of our City Council to respectfully request your prompt action on this matter.

Your government's stated intention to legalize marijuana has generated significant interest amongst those who wish to sell the product for recreational and medicinal purposes. Without the corresponding legislative changes, municipalities have been left in an awkward and legally tenuous situation. As a result, our Council is considering adopting regulations as a stopgap measure to address health and safety concerns, potential neighbourhood impacts and security concerns. Regrettably, this work is consuming a considerable amount of our resources and time and taking away from our ability to advance our core areas of service delivery.

On behalf of Council for the City of Port Alberni I would like to encourage your government to act swiftly and responsibly to bring forward new legislation that clearly articulates the new regulations and allows for consistent enforcement by our law enforcement officials.



That the report from the City Planner dated May 4, 2016, be received and Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to start the renaming process for the thoroughfare now named Gertrude Street, Stamp Avenue and 3rd Avenue and notify all property owners, tenants, emergency services and utility service providers of the upcoming change to take effect by July 1, 2017.

I am writing to follow-up on my letter of February 26, 2016, to provide you with a further update on the arrival of Syrian refugees to our province.

I am proud to say that British Columbia (BC) has now welcomed more than 2,300 Syrian refugees to over 45 communities across the province. Nearly all Syrian refugees who have arrived are in permanent housing and are rebuilding their lives as new British Columbians. I am very grateful to our municipalities for the important role they have played in welcoming and supporting Syrian refugees, and would like to express my thanks for their efforts. I have had the great pleasure of meeting with newly resettled refugees and local service providers in Prince George and was humbled by the resiliency and community spirit they possess.

As of March 18, 2016, the regional breakdown for Syrian refugee arrivals to BC was: 52 individuals to the North (2%); 125 to Thompson-Okanagan (5%); 277 to Vancouver Island (12%); 824 to Surrey and the Fraser Valley (35%) and, 1,050 to Metro Vancouver (45%). These figures are updated on a bi-weekly basis and disseminated online through the province's Refugee Readiness Hub (http://refugeehub.issbc.org/newsletters). The province-wide hub also contains information on existing services, community-based refugee readiness teams, training materials, and other resources that may be of interest to municipalities.

Although the federal government has not yet finalized refugee arrivals to BC for the remainder of 2016, the national target for refugees in 2016 is 55,800 – over double the 2015 target. Based on this number, we know that BC can expect a higher number of refugees to arrive over the remainder of the year compared to previous years. It is anticipated that the majority of the remaining 2016 arrivals will happen in the fall. I will be sure to share more up-to-date information with you as it becomes available. In the meantime, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) is currently in discussions with local settlement service providers to assess their capacity and obtain further information to influence final destining decisions. IRCC has communicated that they will continue to promote a regional approach for destining refugees, whereby government-assisted refugees will benefit from resettlement assistance outside of the lower mainland in communities such as Nanaimo, Abbotsford, Prince George, and Kelowna. This approach will continue to support newcomers in finding available housing and employment opportunities across the province.

People arriving to BC as refugees may have travelled with few belongings, but they bring important knowledge, skills, and experience to their new communities. Recognizing that good jobs help create better futures for newcomers and their families, the province has allocated up to \$1M through the Canada-BC Job Grant Refugee Fund to support job readiness and job-specific skills training for refugees. I strongly encourage municipalities to promote this fund among local industry and employer associations, as well as foster connections between employers and the WorkBC Employer Services Centres serving refugees in their communities. More information is available at: www.workbc.ca/Employer-Resources/Canada-BC-Job-Grant.aspx and www.workbc.ca/Employer-Resources/WorkBC-Centres.aspx.

As a part of the overall \$1M Refugee Readiness Fund investment, the province has provided \$500,000 to five Refugee Readiness Teams that are now actively working across BC to identify and prioritize community needs to support a coordinated approach to helping refugees. These teams are an excellent resource for municipalities as they have all completed two-day training workshops on refugee readiness, developed community-based action plans, and are in the process of coordinating local supports. More information on the teams is available on the Hub at: http://refugeehub.issbc.org/readiness-teams/.

I also wanted to inform you that, in honour of Canada's humanitarian traditions, BC has recently proclaimed June 20th as "World Refugee Day". This day will mark a key moment to celebrate the efforts of BC communities in welcoming refugees and to raise awareness of the importance of continuing to help refugees resettle and rebuild their lives in our province.

The selling of the Plywood Lots A and B to Alberni Engineering Co. marked a sad day for Port Alberni.

A study of the zoning on our city's harbour tells that all the lots are industrial or commercial properties. Nothing has been zoned PARK for the public use in Port Alberni. This means that all the bits and pieces of property the city owns on the harbour can be sold to interested buyers. The Harbour Quay pieces, our new Canal Beach can disappear into commercial and industrial hands. They will be lost to the public as places of recreation and beauty on the harbour.

The city planners in developing the strips of commercial businesses on Johnston Rd have killed the need for many people to travel over to the old city centre in South Port.

This lack of foresight and planning has produced a slum like city centre in South Port today. We need attractions that will draw people into the old city. The plywood lots A & B would have made a beautiful place for a seaside experience. Yes, the lots are polluted but so was Central Park (New York), False Creek (Vancouver and Canal Beach. People with vision always look ahead and have the will to make the way. Cities that have respected beauty and the needs of their citizens are known for their beautiful parks. Their leaders had zoned areas for PARKS so they would be saved for future generations.

The 30 new jobs from the sale to Alberni Engineering are only dreams at this point. To have them become reality the company must secure contracts which have to be won through bids. I personally don't see this happening.

Putting more industry back into the living room of South Port will only add more ugliness, more noise and chemical pollution. It also will devalue the property I own.

The creation of Canal Beach has been a joy and a seaside experience for many people. It has already drawn many citizens and visitors to the events scheduled there.

It is sad to note that your city council wishes to develop the Somass River Estuary and you do not want to put any real money into the further development of Canal Beach. You also discourage others from trying to add to the beach. Your actions betray the people you were elected to support.

I'd like to formally express my opposition to the sale of the former Plywood lands - Lots A and B.

This secret deal to an undisclosed company was made with zero consultation with the community. When the report was presented at the City Council meeting on June 13, 2016, staff members that were present were unable to respond to most of Councillor Alemany's questions and the other council members were silent. I expect more from my elected representatives.

This short-sighted decision is wrong for a number of reasons. The strategic plan for the City of Port Alberni calls for development of waterfront recreational opportunities and better access for all residents. Expansion of waterfront lands is critical to creating a better lifestyle for residents and visitors and to expanding an economic base that will support tourism and recreational opportunities. Canal Beach, although small, is a fantastic example of the direction we should be heading, and has already proven its value to the community. The decision to place a large corporate industrial site right next to it is inexplicable. A handful of jobs in exchange for the giveaway of waterfront lands that should be public is a short-sighted deal.

This decision was made behind closed doors with no public consultation. The owner of 1075565 B.C. LTD., based in Ontario, is a mystery, but was allowed to purchase strategic waterfront in our city at a giveaway price of \$250,000.

Council should have fully explored other options. It did not. The public should have been fully engaged in the process and given opportunities to provide feedback. It was not.

Port Alberni has a clear choice for the future. Other municipalities in B.C., like Squamish, have taken advantage of their natural settings and capitalized on the economic opportunities that come with tourism and outdoor recreation. We have the opportunity to do the same. It is a shame that our council members don't embrace this vision.

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<u>Draft Summary of Input from Regional Engagement Sessions on Climate Leadership Team Recommendations (Mar. 8-10, Mar. 15-17, 2016)</u>

During the January 25th - April 8th Climate Leadership Plan public consultation period, the Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development conducted six webinars with local governments, five regional (Kootenay-Boundary, Vancouver Island/Coastal, Lower Mainland, North Central and Southern Interior) and one province-wide. Kootenay	 Recommendation 17: We need to look at forestry practices so we should no longer have slash and burn as this contributes to GHG emissions. We agree with increased carbons equestration. Glad to hear that the Province is working on the above issue (of slash and burn) as it is a big issue. What do you have to induce small companies to use that material? Very supportive of reuse of forest harvest residuals and further development here. It seems as though there are some great initiatives with tenure holders to increase in-the-field use. When forests are clear cut what does that mean interms of GHG emissions? We would see district managers be proactive and put it back into the hands of the public and let them harvest this material prior to it being burned. Whether there are fugitive emissions or not, we need to wear off of fossil fuels. All the current science shows that we should not be creating now fossil fuel infractivature.

Kootenay	 Recommendation 10 & 12: We are concerned about electricity pricing. Fortis has two tiers. How about removing tiers for pricing and moving to time of day pricing? We do not see an emphasis on solar and wind. We would like to see some stimulus programs for solar and more research on where wind might be applicable. We want it spelt out as a focus for proceeding into the future. It is also our experience that the cost of electricity is going up leaps and bounds and becoming cost prohibitive, and so solar would help augment this. We do not see hydro as

	 the only solution, and we want incentive programs from the Province and the Federal government for solar and wind. Solar hot water may or may not be as economical depending on source water, as preheating hot water has an incremental benefit depending on source (temperature) of water. The real potential is assessed site by site. Are the energy potential maps of the Province being updated? We should put the info out to people to help make choices — e.g. maybe solar PV, solar hot water. We hope that these initiatives for energy also eventually explore the components of grid-tied feasibility and increased pricing incentives (i.e. pricing that is fair), for non-commercial residents. This accomplishes both the operational and public relations value in communities. Currently, Fortis pays 2.8 cents/kWh, while at the same time the customer buys back at a bout 4-6 times that much. This balance does not incentivize small-scale power production.
Vancouver Island	Recommendation 12:
	 It seems that this recommendation and BC Hydro's integrated resource plan have inconsistent goals (Climate Leadership Teams ays 100% clean by 2025, but BC Hydrosays it will use Natural gas)? We want clean energy in the North Coast, not natural gas fired. The devil will be in the details. We have gone from support for run of river to extremely negative reaction to it, due to impacts on forest through power lines and other problems. We think this is a great initiative. Were BC Hydro to provide a greater solar incentive (even a few cents per KWh) it could have a huge effect. It may need an integrated strategy, but it could be a good partnership with Hydro as you could use less of water behind dam in summer when you have peak solar. In remote communities which have much higher costs for diesel, there should be good opportunities for solar and other alternatives. We support the other comments on solar projects, as technology has brought the cost down, and it is becoming a viable solution. It is not clear the public knows a bout this. Totally agree that BC Hydro could have higher solar payon grid tie in. There are still barriers to this like increase in property assessment and corresponding municipal taxes. We think there could be other advantages once there are more electric vehicles in use. Advances in battery tech are going to make the a bility of solar array to store power, and power electric vehicles overnight. This will make it even more viable. We would like to see more support for geothermal. It is a consistent energy source unlike other green energy sources that a re intermittent, and we are one of the Pacific Rim countries not doing larger geothermal. There is potential to transform decommissioned
	mines into geothermal energy sources and we would love to have some resources or support to look at doing this in our communities

We would rather use the money we pay to get to carbon neutrality to invest in our communities. We would like Provincial policies to favour this over purchasing carbon offsets. Meeting commenced at 9:00 am.

Chair's report: Patty Edwards attended at City Council meeting Monday June 13 in order to support the recommendation that the ten thousand dollar funding that the City had designated to the Seniors Advisory Committee be allocated to the AVCSI to supplement the \$20000. received from the ACRD for the purpose of hiring a coordinator for the implementation of our plan Still At Home In The Alberni Valley 2015. The motion passed with the support of Councilors' Alemany and Suave.

The Candidate Search committee of Joanne Silver and Patty Edwards met this week to develop a job posting which was presented for review. July 22, 2016 will be the closing date for applications and they are to be sent by email to the Chair at patty.edwards@leg.bc.ca. Start will be September 1, 2016. (job posting to follow in separate attachment)

The Chair requested that City Councilor Chris Alemany join the Selection Committee in consideration of the funding from the City.

Old Business:

Coordinator position- proposed start date for the contract position is September 1, 2016 and it will end August 31,2017. The contract will require a three month probation period with set deliverables to be achieved by that date. Supervision will be provided by the Chair.

Marcie DeWitt reported on the Poverty Reduction Forum held at the Hupacasath First Nation Hall on Monday May 30, 2016. 35 people registered and fifty attended. The all-day session was an Introduction to the Theory of Change.

New Business

Marcie DeWitt gave a report on a \$5000. grant from Plan H-(BC Healthy Communities) that she secured through the Alberni Clayoquot Regional Health Network as seed money to assist the AVCSI in funding the process of implementing our new Plan.

On Thursday June 23 several members of the AVCSI will participate in a Collective Impact Webinar. This webinar is a pre-requisite in order to participate in a supported Collective Impact process being offered in the fall 0f 2016. BC Healthy Communities is sponsoring this process and we are participating as a means to develop a long term strategy to deepen community engagement on the challenge of increasing the stock of affordable rental housing.


