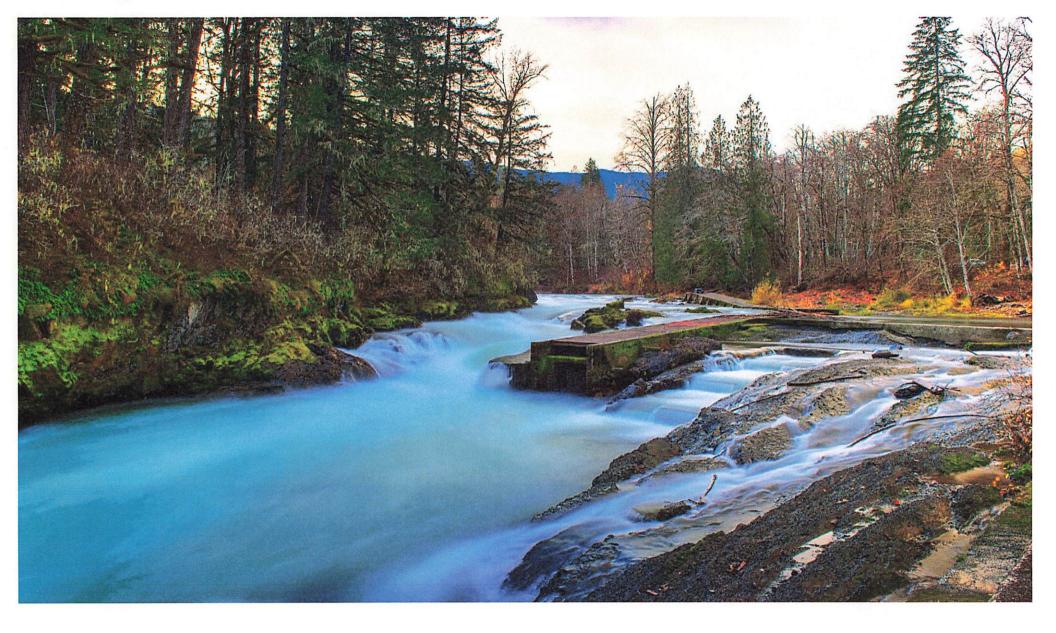

Message from the Board Chair

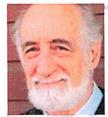
We began our 2020 Vital Signs® report before COVID-19 was a known issue, and we planned to look forward to 2030 and consider the Alberni Valley's role in meeting the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (You'll see these icons woven throughout the report, and we plan to explore them further in future years). However, though important, those Goals feel less a priority now as our community deals with the immediate impact of a global pandemic: jobs lost, an economy damaged, new ways of learning and working, deferred celebrations, and so many other ways of living that comprise our new normal.

We have scaled down our report this year, focusing on four issue areas: Learning, Housing, Food Security, and the Environment. In addition to providing updated statistical indicators, we are also sharing stories about how the pandemic has impacted each of these areas, and how Alberni Valley residents are coming together to create innovative solutions to some of the problems that the coronavirus has wrought. As always, we aspire to see clearly the challenges before us and to support the individuals and agencies that respond.

About Vital Signs®

Vital Signs® is a community check-up conducted by community foundations across Canada. It measures the vitality of our communities, identifies significant trends, and supports action on issues that are critical to our quality of life. The Alberni Valley is defined as the City of Port Alberni, Regional Districts B, D, E, and F, and the Tsahaheh 1, Ahahswinis 1, Alberni 1, and Klehkoot 2 reservations. All efforts have been made to obtain data for this geographic area, but occasionally different geographic areas are measured. This will be noted.



Alberni Valley students are on par with their provincial counterparts when measuring high school completion rates and the transition to post-secondary, while the community lags behind the province in attaining post-secondary education.

High school completion rate

Data from the British Columbia Ministry of Education demonstrates that the School District 70 six-year high school completion rate has hit an all-time high, at 83.0% in both the 2017-2018 and 2018-2019 school years. This compares to 89.0% provincially.1



Indigenous high school completion rate

The six-year high school completion rate for Indigenous students in School District 70 has increased since our last report: from 56.0% in 2016-2017 to 70.0% in 2018-2019. This compares to 69.0% provincially.1



Transition to post-secondary

The post-secondary transition rate provides the proportion of high school graduates that transition to a post-secondary institute within three years of graduation. 69.0% of School District 70 students who graduated in 2013-2014 transitioned to postsecondary, which is on par with the provincial rate of 69.0%.2



has post-secondary education. This is an increase from 2015's rate of 43.9%. Provincially, 55.0% of the population 15 years and older has post-secondary. This indicator has not been updated since 2016, but will be updated in 2021.3

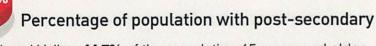


The Impact of COVID-19

One of the fastest changes that the coronavirus brought about was the closure of schools and the transition to schooling from home for students from elementary to post-secondary. But informal learning was also impacted by the pandemic. Recreation programs and library services were both restricted and then brought online. For seniors living in residential care facilities, having their entertainment options go online presented multiple barriers: the first, a need for a device, and the second, the ability to find information, download ebooks, and stream music and movies. The AVCF helped fund the Vancouver Island Regional Library's Digital Care Package program, which provided residential care facilities with a computer, instruction about how to use the library's digital collection, and the means to stream content to a shared screen. Facilities that were without an internet connection were provided with one. This program brought connection and entertainment to a group of people who faced strict isolation.

\$4,521 Average annual cost of undergraduate university tuition

Vancouver Island University is the closest public university. Tuition has increased every year for the last decade, and was \$4,521 for the 2019-2020 academic year, compared to \$5612 provincially. There is no similar comparison for North Island College, where fees vary greatly depending on the program.4

Housing

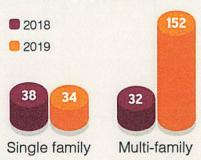
Home values and sales prices continue to increase, and Port Alberni saw a jump in multi-family housing recently with 152 units in progress [140 from the same developer].

\$299,000 Median home value

The median value of a home in Port Alberni has increased from **\$278,000** in 2019 to **\$299,000** in 2020 – an 8% increase.⁶

34; 152 Housing starts by dwelling type

In 2019, **34** single-family housing starts were recorded, a slight decrease over 2018's **38**. There were **152** multi-family housing starts recorded in 2019 – an incredible **375%** increase over the **32** units of multi-family housing started in 2018.⁷



9.0%

Proportion of units requiring major repair

As of 2016, **9.0%** of housing in the Alberni Valley required major repair (for example, dwellings that have defective plumbing or electrical wiring). Across the province, the proportion of units requiring major repair was **6.3%** in 2016.⁸



Owner households

Of the **11,360** households in the Alberni Valley, **73.2%** are occupied by their owners. Of these, just over half (**53.3%**) carry a mortgage. Provincially, **67.8%** of households are owner households.⁸

\$342,700 Benchmark home price

The benchmark sale price of a single-family home in summer 2020 in the Alberni Valley was \$342,700 – still the most affordable city on Vancouver Island, but \$47,800 more than in summer 2018. On Vancouver Island, the average single-family home increased from \$507,700 in summer 2018 to \$545,700 in summer 2020.



\$701 Median monthly home ownership costs

Median monthly home ownership costs were last captured in 2016. At that time, monthly home ownership costs, which include mortgage payments, electricity, heat, water, and other municipal services total \$701. This compares to \$1,149 provincially.8

\$797 Median rent

Median rent costs include rent payments, electricity, heat, water, and other municipal services. In the Alberni Valley, the median rent has risen to \$797 in 2019. This compares to \$1,363 provincially.9



Rental vacancy rate

The rental vacancy rate in the Alberni Valley has decreased every year since 2011. It is currently **1.1%**, having fallen from **1.7%** in 2017. British Columbia's rental vacancy rate is **1.4%**.

The Alberni Valley's homeless population was counted in April 2018. An updated count was planned for April 2020, but was postponed due to COVID-19.10

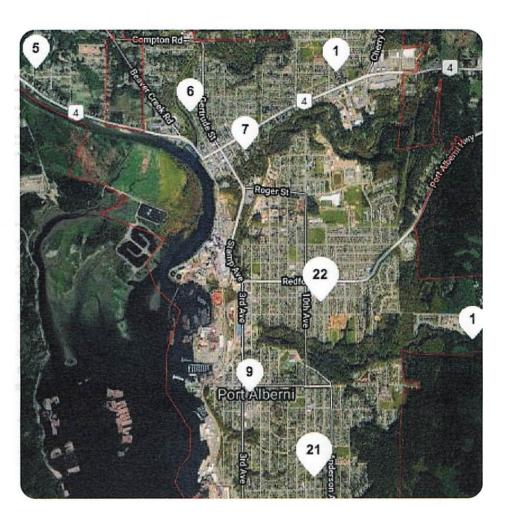
Number of beds in emergency shelter

The Port Alberni Shelter Society operates the emergency shelter in the Alberni Valley. It has **12** beds year-round, and may offer **20**+ additional beds during periods of extreme weather (November 1 – March 31 of each year).¹¹



The Impact of COVID-19

COVID-19 had immediate impacts on housing: at the start of the pandemic, housing sales slowed and prospective buyers had to adjust to virtual open houses. As the housing market has rebounded, there has been a return to normal for homeowners. But for the homeless, the effects of COVID-19 are still being felt. Shelters and programs for people who are homeless needed to adapt their services quickly to promote social distancing and increased hygiene practices while offering a level of service similar to pre-pandemic. The Port Alberni branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association responded quickly, and received \$10,000 in Emergency Community Support Funding through the AVCF in support of an additional Homeless Outreach Worker. This staff member continued the work of homeless outreach, but took on additional tasks in the time of a pandemic, promoting and providing access to hygiene supplies for the homeless population, often living in rough, transient, or dangerous situations.



106

Number of affordable housing units

As of January 2020, there were **106** affordable housing units spread across 8 different sites in Port Alberni. Of these, 1 is operated by BC Housing and the remainder are operated by non-profit organizations.¹²

The pandemic has put increased pressure on food programs, which have adapted as necessary to serve more people and in different ways.

\$1029 Cost of healthy eating

There has been no update to the cost of healthy eating since 2017. At that time, a family of four on Central Vancouver Island paid \$1029 monthly to eat healthy meals. This is only slightly more than the provincial average of \$1019.13

Meals with adults at home

The percentage of Alberni Valley Grade 4 and Grade 7 students who eat meals with their parents or other adult family members 5 or more times per week has decreased since our last report. During the 2019-2020 school year, **74%** of Grade 4 students and **66%** of Grade 7 students ate family meals 5 or more times per week, compared to **77%** and **74%** in 2017-2018.¹⁶



The Impact of COVID-19

For Alberni Valley charities, providing food to community members was - and remains - one of the most pressing priorities of the pandemic. The Alberni Valley's most vulnerable may not have had the finances or space available to stockpile food at the beginning of COVID-19, and, as the pandemic has continued and Valley residents have faced unemployment or lowered income, the demand for food has increased. The Bread of Life, Salvation Army, Canadian Mental Health Association, Shelter Society, and Literacy Alberni quickly came together to form the Alberni Covid Community Response and ensure the both meals and food items are available to anyone in need. The Alberni Valley Community Foundation has provided \$42,000 to various food programs responding to increased need due to COVID. Another grant has been provided to the Bread of Life to better understand the need going forward, so that organizations can source and provide food for all in need.



Food insecurity

An analysis of data from Statistics Canada from 2017-2018 demonstrates that 12.4% of British Columbia residents are food insecure, meaning that households have inadequate or insecure access to food due to financial constraints. This compares to 12.7% of all Canadian households. Due to COVID-19. Statistics Canada has found that household food insecurity has increased to 14.6% across the country, and is predicted to increase as the pandemic continues. 14,15

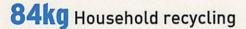
Good news: in 2019, air quality was better than in recent years, while water consumption decreased slightly over 2017, and household recycling household recycling increased.

8.8ug/m3 Air quality

There are many measures of air quality, including concentration of fine particulate matter (PM2.5) Fine particulate matter is reported here because it is a public health concern – PM2.5 can lead to lung and heart problems. In 2019, the Alberni Valley's annual average PM2.5 reading was **8.8ug/m3**. Canada's standard is 10.0ug/m3 or less.¹⁸

503L Daily water consumption per capita

In the Alberni Valley, metered water usage is provided by the City of Port Alberni, Beaver Creek Water System, and Cherry Creek Waterworks District. Daily average water consumption per capita was **503** litres in 2019, a decrease over 2017's **530L**. ^{19,20,21}

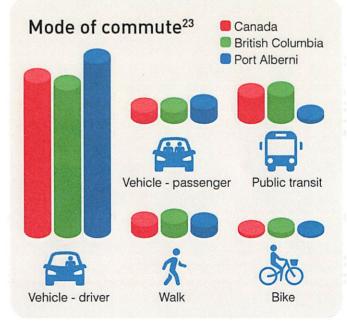


The Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District collects household recycling from residents in the City of Port Alberni, Beaver Creek, Tseshaht, and Hupacasath. In 2017, each household in these communities averaged **75.7kg** of recycling per year. In 2019, the household average increased to **84kg** per household, on average.²⁰

1,588.0mm Annual precipitation

In 2018, the most recent year with comprehensive weather reports, **1,588.0mm** of precipitation fell in the Alberni Valley. This was an decrease from 2017 and 2016, at **1616.7mm** and **2,069.0mm** respectively.²²

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council rescind Resolution No. R20-103 and authorize staff to obtain quotes for the City's annual insurance and liability coverage directly from the City's current broker AON, and the Municipal Insurance Association of BC [MIABC] for the City's 2021/22 policies.

PURPOSE

For Council to reconsider its previous direction that staff issue a Request for Proposals [RFP] for insurance coverage and move to an evaluation between brokerage service versus Municipal Insurance Association of BC [MIABC].

BACKGROUND

In 2020 annual insurance premiums increased 80 percent compared to 2019, with a total increase year-over-year of \$215,712. The City had undertaken an appraisal in 2019 and buildings that were not previously included in the property insurance coverage were added [30% of increase]. Following a shift in the liability insurance market and the City's previous underwriter no longer providing coverage, a new underwriter provided an insurance policy based on our claims history and the experience rating of the local government sector [70% of the increase].

At Council's Regular meeting held April 14, 2020 Council resolved as follows:

"THAT Council for the City of Port Alberni direct staff to proceed with a request for proposals prior to renewal of the City's annual liability and property insurance policies to ensure the City of Port Alberni secures the appropriate insurance coverage based on the City's risk profile." [Resolution No. R20-103]

Since that time staff have been working with AON to better understand the manner in which recent adjustments in the insurance market impact City policy noting that AON, as the City's broker, works on the City's behalf to solicit the best coverage/rates available at the time.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- Option 1: That Council rescind its previous direction and authorize staff to request quotes from the City's insurance broker AON and MIABC for the same level of property and liability insurance coverage.
- Option 2: Proceed with a Request for Proposals for property and liability insurance.

ANALYSIS

Option No. 1: Request quotes from AON and MIABC for the same level of property and liability insurance coverage. Should Council support the staff recommendation within Option 1, staff will work with City's current insurance broker AON, and MIABC to secure quotes to compare the cost and the level of service provided by each proponent.

Option 2: Proceed with the for Liability and Property Insurance. Staff would issue an RFP to seek a solution to meet the insurance needs for the City noting that the effort and time to undertake this work would be more significant and time consuming than sourcing two quotes directly.

IMPLICATIONS

The process that staff are recommending is preferable in relation to staff efficiency and complies with the City's Purchasing - Procedure Policy adopted by Council which provides "exemption to normal purchasing procedure", including "General and Liability Insurance Broker Services".

COMMUNICATIONS

Should Council support the recommendation, staff would confirm the approach with AON and MIABC in relation to confirming coverage requirements and request each proponent to submit a quote outlining detailed services and programs to support the insurance needs of the City. The submissions will be brought to Council at a Regular meeting in December 2020 or early January 2021.

1. GENERAL

The purchasing policy of the City of Port Alberni is administered by the Director of Finance.

The purchasing function is decentralized to the originating departments and managers are responsible for the purchases they require. Department Heads are responsible for ensuring that this purchasing policy is properly observed at all times for purchases originating in their departments.

2. BIDS AND CONTRACTS

Subject to the policies laid down by City Council, and in accordance with any instructions issued by the City Manager, the Department Heads shall use recognized purchasing methods in securing competitive prices and in awarding contracts in accordance with this purchasing policy. Unless otherwise directed by the City Manager, forms of Contract to be used are the standard City of Port Alberni Contract forms approved by the Director of Finance.

3. COOPERATIVE PURCHASING

Where savings may accrue, the City may cooperate with other agencies, local and/or external, to jointly purchase goods and services. In such cases, City staff shall have the authority to commit the City to the purchasing decisions of the Cooperative Group, provided that savings do accrue to the City.

4. PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT MASTER STANDING OFFER

It is deemed to be an acceptable business practice for the City to purchase materials and equipment through the auspices of the provincial government's Master Standing Offer whereby the Province processes a major tender and selects a number of suppliers that will provide the materials and equipment at the best price. Such materials and equipment may be purchased from any authorized supplier of the City's choice, but the prices remain the same, regardless of the supplier.

5. INVENTORY ITEMS FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

Where Council has approved a capital project and goods and materials required to complete the project must be brought into inventory, the award of tenders need not be submitted to City Council for approval unless the selected supplier is not the low bidder.

6. TRADE, INVESTMENT AND LABOUR MOBILITY AGREEMENT (TILMA) REGULATIONS

TILMA applies to the City of Port Alberni's purchases of goods and services. TILMA requires that all tenders for goods and materials and services exceeding \$75,000, and all tenders for construction projects in excess of \$200,000 must be advertised through an electronic tendering system and, notwithstanding section 13.1 that there may be no local preference policy in relation to such tenders. The City will post all tenders affected by the TILMA on the City's internet web site.

7. EXCEPTIONS TO NORMAL PURCHASING PROCEDURE

The services set out below are exempt from the requirements for tendering set out hereinafter. Requests for Proposals for these services may be called at the discretion of the City Manager and Department Heads in cases where service levels and fees and charges of current providers are deemed to be unsatisfactory.

- Architectural Services
- Engineering Services
- Legal Services
- General and Liability Insurance Broker Services
- Employee Benefits Consultant Services
- Auditing Services
- Electrical, Plumbing and Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning Services of an Regular Maintenance Nature

Other exceptions to this policy are:

- when time constraints will not allow for tendering, such as when supplies, services and equipment are urgently needed to maintain City utilities and essential services:
- b) when dealing with professional service contracts; or
- c) when only one supplier exists.

Under these circumstances, the Department Head, with the approval of the City Manager, may obtain direct quotations from suppliers and award the contracts.

8. ORDERS

All orders must originate with a purchase requisition. All orders and purchases shall be made only by issuing a purchase order. Suppliers should always be advised to show this number clearly on their invoices.

9. TENDERING PROCEDURE

9.1 Preparation

Specifications issued shall be reasonable, clear, without ambiguity and designed and advertised to allow for submission of bids or offers by the optimum number of qualified vendors. Department Heads shall be responsible for the technical accuracy of the specifications.

When necessary, Department Heads shall arrange consultations with prospective vendors and shall

9.2 Tender Instructions, Conditions and Pricing Formulae

The Department Head shall be responsible for the preparation of tender instructions, conditions and pricing formulae. Such documentation should combine with the technical specifications to ensure that the tender form is clear and without ambiguity. Except as otherwise approved by the City Manager, tender documents including "instructions to tenderers" and "general conditions" shall be in the form adopted as the City's "Standard Tender Package Form" or "Standard Request for Proposals Form" which have been approved by the Director of Finance

9.3 Completed Tender Forms

Department Heads, or a designated manager shall review and approve the completed tender form before it is released to vendors.

10. TENDER FORMS AND ENVELOPES

Except as otherwise approved by the City Manager, standard tender forms approved by the Director of Finance shall be used to give uniformity to tender submissions, (bids). Additional sheets may be attached by the prospective vendors, but the standard tender form must always be completed by vendors.

11. TENDER OPENING PROCEDURES

When tender envelopes, (bids), are received from vendors, the envelopes shall be date stamped and placed, unopened, in the appropriate file by the Purchasing Clerk.

At the specified time of opening, each and every envelope will be opened publicly by the Purchasing Clerk and witnessed by the Department Head or designate, with both of them signing and dating each tender form.

Any and all tender envelopes, (bids), received after the closing time shall be date and time stamped and returned unopened to the vendor with a covering letter from the Department Head, explaining the reason for the return.

12. ANALYSIS AND AWARDING OF TENDERS

As soon as possible after the opening of tenders, the Department Head shall prepare the tender recommendation for presentation to the Director of Finance for review. Awards will be made in accordance with the Section 13 of this policy entitled, "AWARD OF CONTRACTS". Completed files shall be retained by the Purchasing Clerk for reference as required.

13. AWARD OF CONTRACTS

13.1 General

Awards shall be made for the purchase of equipment, supplies and services that will give the greatest value based on quality, service and price. Criteria for evaluation of bids may include but not be limited to:

- Price
- Experience of the supplier
- Previous legal action that may have been taken by the bidder against the City
- Qualifications of the supplier's personnel
- Past track record of quality of services provided to the City of Port Alberni by the supplier
- Past track record of quality of goods provided by the supplier
- Availability/Delivery Time for goods, parts and service.
- Compatibility of proposed goods with existing units.
- Ingenuity and innovation

Preference shall be given to local suppliers where quality, service and price are equivalent.

13.2 Local Vendor Preference

- 13.2.1 A local vendor is defined as a business that for at least six (6) months immediately preceding the relevant request for bids or proposals has a physical location within the boundaries of the City of Port Alberni and who maintains a current City of Port Alberni business licence.
- 13.2.2 The City will actively seek to identify local vendors interested in doing business with the City of Port Alberni.
- 13.2.3 The price bid by Port Alberni vendors will be adjusted by \$1,000 when prices are compared in the bidding process.
- 13.2.4 The local vendor preference shall be applied to the purchase of goods, materials and services to the maximum extent possible while still complying with the Trade, Investment and Labour Mobility Agreement (TILMA) regulations (Section 6 of this policy).
- 13.2.5 Local Vendor Preference shall not apply to the following purchases or agreements:
 - Goods, equipment or services provided under a cooperative purchasing agreement;
 - The City determines the business is not qualified to perform the work or provide the services or materials;
 - Purchases of supplies, services and equipment not requiring bids;
 - Exceptions as provided for under Section 7 of this policy –
 Exceptions To Normal Purchasing Procedure.

13.3 Purchases Up To \$2,500

Purchases up to \$2,500 may be made by the Department Head *or designate* following sound business principles and practices of buying. Where local suppliers are known to exist they will be given the first opportunity to provide prices.

13.4 Purchases Between \$2,500 and \$10,000

The Department Head or designate shall obtain three written quotations for any purchases valued between \$2,500 and \$10,000. Where local suppliers are known to exist they will be given first opportunity to provide quotations.

13.5 Purchases Between \$10,000 and \$20,000

All expenditures between \$10,000 and \$20,000 must be evaluated by the Department Head in order to determine if tenders are required.

Where a tender is deemed necessary, such purchases shall be awarded through the process of a Sealed Bid Tender or Request for Proposal.

Award of Low Bid Tenders:

Department Heads may award low bid tenders up to a value of \$20,000, providing such tenders meet the specifications.

Award of Greater Value Tenders:

In cases where a tender is considered to be awarded to a bid of greater value than the low bid tender which meets the specifications, the Department Head shall submit a report to the Director of Finance, who may approve the award.

13.6 Purchases Estimated To Be Over \$20,000 but less than \$75,000 in Value
All purchases over \$20,000 in value must be tendered unless otherwise approved by the City Manager.

Such purchases shall be awarded through the process of a Sealed Bid Tender or Request for Proposal.

13.7 Award of Tenders or Requests for Proposals Valued Between \$20,000 and \$75.000

Award of Low Bid Tenders:

The Department Head shall submit a report to the Director of Finance, who may approve the award of the contract.

Award of Greater Value Tenders:

The City Manager shall present the joint recommendation of the Department Head and the Director of Finance to City Council for their decision.

13.8 Purchases Estimated To Be Over \$75,000 In Value

All purchases over \$75,000 in value must be tendered through the process of a Sealed Bid Tender or Request for Proposals unless otherwise approved by City Council.

13.9 Award of Tenders or Requests for Proposals Over \$75,000 In Value The Department Head and Director of Finance shall submit joint recommendations for the award of tenders or requests for proposals of over \$75,000 in value, whether low bid or greater value, to the City Manager for presentation to City Council for their decision.

14.0 TERM OF CONTRACTS

14.1 Multi-Year Contracts

Where the Department Head determines it to be of benefit to the City, contracts may be let for supply of goods or services for a multi-year period. Such contracts may include clauses to allow for modifications to unit prices or lump sum prices based on inflation indices. Maximum term of contract shall be 5 years. Such contracts shall include a cancellation clause in favor of the City for all years subsequent to the original year of the contract signing.

14.2 Extension of Contracts

Where the Department Head determines it to be of benefit to the City, and where a supplier agrees to maintain prices for goods or services at the same level as the previous year the Department Head may approve extension of the contract for an additional year.

15.0 TENDERS VS PROPOSALS

- 15.1 Where the supply required is for goods which are widely available and for which standards of quality are well set and quantifiable a Sealed Bid Tender process shall be used. Examples of these types of goods are: lumber, pipe and fittings, fuel, aggregates.
- 15.2 Where the work required is for construction services involving the supply and installation of materials which are well detailed in constructions drawings with supporting specifications a Sealed Bid Tender Process shall be used. Examples of this type of work are installation of water or sewer mains, construction of buildings.
- 15.3 Where the supply required is for services or for goods which are specialized or have differences between brands or suppliers requiring considerable subjective analysis a Request for Proposals format shall be used.

16.0 ADVERTISING OF TENDERS AND REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS AND QUOTATIONS

- All tenders issued for goods or materials valued at \$10,000 or more shall be advertised a minimum of two times in a local newspaper and on the City's internet web site. Advertisement in non-local newspapers and/or other publications shall be undertaken where the goods or materials required are not known to be readily available from more than one local supplier.
- 16.2 Except as provided in Section 7, all tenders and/or requests for proposals issued for services valued at \$20,000 or more shall be advertised a minimum of two times in a local newspaper and on the City's internet web site. Advertisement in non-local newspapers and/or other publications shall be undertaken where the services required are not known to be readily available from more than one local contractor or consultant.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council authorize the collapse of the City's "Request for Proposals #029-19 – Investment Management Services" and direct staff to amend the RFP to reflect current investment needs of the City and to reissue the City's "Request for Proposals – Investment Management Services" prior to March 31, 2021.

PURPOSE

For Council to consider collapsing the "Request for Proposals #029-19 – Investment Management Services" issued November 4, 2019.

BACKGROUND

At Council's Regular meeting held October 15, 2019, Council adopted a revised City of Port Alberni "Finance - Investment Policy" and were informed of the impending Investment Management Service RFP which was subsequently issued on November 4, 2019. The City received ten [10] submissions in response to the RFP.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- Option 1: Collapse RFP #029-19, amend and reissue a new RFP that address current investment needs
- Option 2: Award RFP #029-19 Investment Management Services

ANALYSIS

Option No. 1: Collapse, amend and reissue a new RFP that addresses current investment needs.

Due to staff changes in January 2020, demands of year-end budgeting process, and the impact of COVID-19, the RFP was not acted upon. In light of these events and the resulting impact on the current investment needs of the City, combined with anticipated interest rates remaining at 0.25% until 2023, the City should seek the best investment management service to meet these changed circumstances.



Should Council support the staff recommendation, there is an opportunity to amend the RFP in order to reflect both the current business climate and expected low interest environment. Anticipated issue date for the amended RFP would be March 31, 2021 with an award date of May 31, 2021.

Option 2: Proceed with the RFP #029-19 - Investment Management Services.

Following confirmation from successful proponents to support submissions made in January 2020 the Finance Department would review submissions received and bring forward a recommendation to Council to award RFP #029-19.

IMPLICATIONS

Staff anticipate that the implications of collapsing RFP #029-19 would be minimal. Should Council support staff's recommendation to collapse, amend and reissue a Request for Proposals for Investment Management Services, this would give the City the opportunity to incorporate new requirements in the RFP that will more accurately reflect the current business, economic and financial climate.

COMMUNICATIONS

Should Council support the recommendation, staff will reach out to those proponents who responded to the City's RFP in 2019 to speak to next steps, including explanation for the collapse of the 2019 RFP and to invite them to resubmit.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

Finance – Investment Policy

SUMMARY

- The City of Port Alberni issued an RFP #029-19 in November of 2019;
- Due to staff changes and the impact of COVID-19 the RFP was not acted upon;
- The long-term forecast is for a low interest rate environment (changed since the RFP closed) and the
 City is seeking the best investment management service for these circumstances;
- Responses to the amended and reissued RFP will be brought to Council for consideration in May 2021.

PURPOSE OF THE POLICY

The purpose of this Policy is to provide a framework for the prudent investment of the City of Port Alberni's funds.

SECTION I: POLICY

It is the policy of the City of Port Alberni to invest public funds with prudent management and within prescribed limits to provide an optimal blend of return on investment and preservation of principal while meeting short and long term cash flow and liquidity demands of the City of Port Alberni, and complying with statutory requirements of the *Community Charter* and the *Municipal Finance Authority Act*.

1. SCOPE

This Policy applies to the investment of all cash and short-term assets of the City of Port Alberni. The City of Port Alberni's invested funds will be divided into operating, capital, and reserves. Investment value will be reported at cost.

2. OBJECTIVES

Principal Protection

Preservation of capital is the foremost objective of the investment program. Investments shall be undertaken in a manner that ensures the preservation of capital, while managing credit risk and interest rate risk.

Liquidity

The investment portfolio shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating requirements that may be reasonably anticipated. The portfolio structure should be such that maturities coincide with cash requirements, as much as reasonably possible. Since all possible cash requirements cannot reasonably be anticipated, the portfolio should consist largely of securities with active secondary markets.

Return on Investment

The Fund shall be constructed with the objective of attaining, at minimum, a benchmark rate of return throughout varying budgetary and economic cycles, taking into account investment risk constraints and liquidity needs. Return on investment is of secondary importance compared to the preservation of capital and liquidity objectives.

Adherence to Statutory Requirements

Investment guidelines for municipal funds are provided in Section 183 of the Community Charter (Appendix C) and Section 16 of the Municipal Finance Authority Act (Appendix D).

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Where possible and practical, social responsibility will be considered in the selection of investments that meet the policy's objective.

3. STANDARD OF CARE

Prudence

Investments shall be made with judgment and care, exercised with consideration of safety of capital foremost for those acting in accordance with the investment policy.

Internal Controls

Management shall establish a system of internal controls, which shall be documented in writing, and reviewed by the independent auditor. The controls shall be designed to prevent the loss of public funds arising from fraud, employee error, and misrepresentation by third parties. The Investment Manager must adhere to the Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct of the CFA Institute.

4. ETHICS & CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Officers and employees involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity with the same individual(s) with whom business is conducted on behalf of the City of Port Alberni. Individuals involved with the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution and management of the investment program or impair their ability to make impartial investment decisions.

SECTION II: INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

1. DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

Authority to manage the City of Port Alberni's investment program is derived from Section 149 of the Community Charter (Appendix B).

The City of Port Alberni delegates the management of the Fund to certain Officers of the City of Port Alberni. The Officers of the City of Port Alberni include Director of Finance and Deputy Director of Finance.

Any purchase or sale transactions contemplated for a City investment account must be authorized by an individual specified in the Client Broker Agreement as authorized to do so. Such authorized individuals will be limited to the City's banking signatories: Mayor, and Director of Finance. A signature stamp will suffice in the absence of original signatures.

Fund Management responsibilities have been allocated as follows:

Council – Audit Committee

- Receive quarterly reports from the designated Officers on the performance of the portfolio at the Audit Committee Meetings.
- Review the policy annually.

Officers' Responsibilities

- Review the Policy periodically and if appropriate make recommendations to City Council for changes.
- Ensure that the sum of all cash, the current account, money market securities, and coupon income expected from the fixed income instruments (i.e. bonds, GICs etc.) in a year are sufficient to cover the disbursements expected to be paid from the portfolio in that year.
- Appointment of the Investment Manager will be made through a Request for Proposals
 process to be undertaken by the Director of Finance and overseen by the Chief
 Administrative Officer. Proposals will be accepted from selected firms meeting minimum
 guidelines set out in this policy. The evaluation of responses will be based on a number
 of factors, weighted according to the needs and judgment of the City of Port Alberni.
- The successful proponent will enter into a formal Client Broker Agreement with the City of Port Alberni.
- A Request for Proposals or Request for Quotes will be prepared at the outset of adoption of this policy, and in five year intervals thereafter.
- The City retains the right to replace the Investment Manager at any time. Reasons for replacement include:
 - The Investment Manager's performance falling below expected performance levels, not reasonably explained by their investment style being out of favour temporarily, as measured rolling five year periods;
 - o Changes to the Investment Manager's style or process; and
 - o Changes to key investment personnel.
- Review the Fund's performance on a regular basis and provide quarterly reports to the Audit Committee at the Audit Committee Meetings.
- To be responsible for the delegation of any responsibility not specifically mentioned in this Policy.

The Investment Manager's Responsibilities

- Select specific investments, recognizing the quality and diversification requirements established in this Policy, and subject to approved signing authority.
- Seek to maximize and preserve the investment return, after ensuring that the foregoing liquidity, quality and diversification requirements have been satisfied.
- Where possible and practical, socially responsible investing criteria will be applied to the selection of investments and preference given to organizations that adopt a socially responsible investment platform.
- Manage the securities held in accordance with this Policy and applicable legislation.
- Provide the Director of Finance (who will then provide to the Audit Committee) with quarterly written reports that include periodic rates of return for the portfolio; details of investments; and a statement of compliance with this IPS.

- Provide the necessary information for the Director of Finance and Audit Committee to review the IPS and the Investment Manager's performance.
- Identify provisions in the IPS that may need revision due to changes in investment strategies or markets.

The Investment Manager and designated Officers of the City of Port Alberni may from time to time engage consultants or other advisors to assist them in fulfilling their responsibilities.

2. AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT DEALERS AND FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

A list will be maintained by the Investment Manager of approved investment dealers and financial institutions authorized to provide investment services. All qualified bidders for investment transactions will be members in good standing of the Investment Industry Regulatory Organization of Canada ("IIROC"), Mutual Fund Dealers Association ("MFDA") or the B.C. Securities Commission.

Preference will be given to investment dealers and financial institutions who are members of the Responsible Investment Association ("RIA").

SECTION III: INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Permitted investments are as follows:

- Eligible Securities as defined in Section 183 of the Community Charter (Appendix C) and Section 16 of the Municipal Finance Authority Act (Appendix D).
- Investments in internally financed projects.

All investments must be denominated in Canadian dollars.

Certain of the funds are statutory reserve funds; and interest earned thereon must be retained in the fund according to the Bylaw pertinent to the fund.

Investments in shares, warrants, or other equities, convertible debt securities, derivatives, swaps, options or futures are prohibited, and all investment categories that are not explicitly permitted are prohibited.

SECTION IV: RATINGS AND CONSTRAINTS

1. RISK TOLERANCE

All securities must be readily marketable.

Investments held must be rated by at least one rating agency, namely Moody's, Standard & Poor's (S&P) or Dominion Bond Rating Service (DBRS). All investments must be Investment Grade (at least BBB by S&P, or equivalent by DBRS or Moody's.), as classified in Appendix A. In the case where a security is rated by more than one agency listed, the higher ratings will apply.

The total portfolio will be limited to the following credit rating thresholds on a weighted average basis (as defined by S&P or equivalent – see Appendix A):

Rating	Up to %
AAA	100%
AA	90%
Α	70%
BBB	30%

Securities downgraded below the policy standard are to be disposed of as expeditiously as possible.

The maximum exposure to a single investment security, as a percentage of the total portfolio cannot exceed 10%.

Due to market fluctuations, maximum percentages may be exceeded from time to time. Securities need not be liquidated to rebalance the portfolio; however, consideration should be given to this matter when future purchases are made to ensure that appropriate diversification is maintained.

2. PORTFOLIO CONSTRAINTS

The primary constraints relate to safety of invested capital and maintaining the liquidity of the portfolio.

- All securities held in the portfolio shall have a maturity of five years or less, however it is understood that the majority of assets will be invested in securities with a maturity considerably shorter than this five year maximum.
- Cash: The deemed rating for cash, including the current account and any High Interest Savings Accounts, will be equal to the rating of the institution it is being held in.
- Credit Union Deposits: The deemed rating for securities issued by a Credit Union will be equal to the rating of the province that the credit union resides in.
- Bank Deposits: The deemed rating for securities issued by a bank will be equal to the credit rating of that bank.
- Securities issued by a Government entity: The deemed rating for securities issued by a
 Government entity will be equal to the credit rating of that municipality, province, country,
 or equivalent.

3. OTHER CONSTRAINTS

- The Fund shall not borrow funds to acquire securities or otherwise deal in margin trading.
- All investments will be made in accordance with the Code of Ethics and the Charter Financial Analyst standards (https://www.cfainstitute.org/ethics/codes/code-of-ethicsstandards-of-conduct-guidance).

All investments are to follow the constraints in this Investment Policy. If an investment opportunity not exceeding 15% of the total portfolio lies outside the Policy constraints and is eligible under S. 183 of the *Community Charter*, an exception may be made, with Council approval.

SECTION V: REPORTING

1. REPORTING

The investment manager will provide a quarterly report to Council on the performance of the portfolio, to be presented to the Audit Committee at the quarterly Audit Committee Meetings, and an annual report to Council during the first quarter of the following year.

2. DEPARTMENT INVESTMENT POLICY ADOPTION

The investment policy shall be approved by Council for the City of Port Alberni, on recommendation from the Director of Finance and the Chief Administrative Officer. The policy shall be reviewed periodically as required due to changes in the economy or the City of Port Alberni's requirements. Modifications made thereto must be approved by the Council.

APPENDIX B - COMMUNITY CHARTER (SECTION 149)

Financial officer

One of the municipal officer positions must be assigned the responsibility of financial administration, which includes the following powers, duties and functions:

- a. receiving all money paid to the municipality;
- b. ensuring the keeping of all funds and securities of the municipality;
- c. investing municipal funds, until required, in authorized investments;
- d. expending municipal money in the manner authorized by the council;
- e. ensuring that accurate records and full accounts of the financial affairs of the
- f. municipality are prepared, maintained and kept safe;
- g. exercising control and supervision over all other financial affairs of the municipality.

APPENDIX C - COMMUNITY CHARTER (SECTION 183)

Investment of municipal funds

Money held by a municipality that is not immediately required may only be invested or reinvested in one or more of the following:

- a. securities of the Municipal Finance Authority;
- b. pooled investment funds under section 16 of the Municipal Finance Authority Act;

- c. securities of Canada or of a province;
- d. securities guaranteed for principal and interest by Canada or by a province;
- e. securities of a municipality, regional district or greater board;
- f. investments guaranteed by a chartered bank;
- g. deposits in a savings institution, or non-equity or membership shares of a credit union;
- h. other investments specifically authorized under this or another Act.

Appendix D – MUNICIPAL FINANCE AUTHORITY ACT (SECTION 16)

Short term pooled investment funds

- (1) The authority may enter into agreements with public institutions and institutions prescribed under subsection (7) under which, on the terms and conditions established in the agreements, the authority, in its own name or otherwise, holds and invests money received from the institution for the purpose of investment in pooled investment funds as permitted for the institution.
- (2) The authority has the power to provide for the creation and management of pooled investment funds for the purposes of subsection (1).
- (3) The trustees may invest money received for investment in a pooled investment fund in any of the following:
 - a. securities that are obligations of or are guaranteed by Canada, a province, or the United States of America;
 - fixed deposits, notes, certificates and other short term paper of or guaranteed by a savings institution, including swapped deposit transactions in the currency of the United States of America;
 - c. securities issued by the authority, a municipality or regional district in British Columbia, or by a local, municipal or regional government in another province;
 - d. commercial paper issued by a company incorporated under the laws of Canada or of a province, the securities of which are rated in the highest rating category by at least 2 recognized security rating institutions;
 - e. investments permitted under the provisions of the Trustee Act respecting the investment of trust property by a trustee;
 - f. despite the provisions of the Financial Administration Act, pooled investment portfolios established under that Act.
- (4) If money is to be invested in a pooled investment portfolio under subsection (3) (f), the Minister of Finance may enter into agreements with the authority to sell units of participation in a portfolio to the authority.
- (5) At the first meeting of the authority in each year, the trustees must present a report respecting the previous year to the authority, stating all of the following:
 - a. the pooled investment funds established;
 - b. the public institutions investing in each fund;
 - c. the volume of investments made in respect of each fund.
- (6) The trustees may delegate to a committee of one or more of its trustees and officers its powers under this section, subject to the limitations the trustees may impose.

(7) The Lieutenant Governor in Council may, by regulation, prescribe institutions as institutions for which investments services may be provided under this section.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve a six-month extension of the #ExplorePortAlberni program while the City evaluates the initiative and looks for another possible approach to its delivery, specifically that of identifying another sponsoring or funding organization to manage the program.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's approval for extending the #ExplorePortAlberni program for an additional six months.

BACKGROUND

The #ExplorePortAlberni program was created in 2018 in partial response to a Destination BC (DBC) Co-op Funding Program opportunity and with the financial support of Alberni Valley Tourism. The intent was (and is) to showcase Port Alberni attractions with the aim of instilling a greater pride in the community and making our target visitor market more aware of our assets. The name (#ExplorePortAlberni) is in alignment with DBC marketing preferences. Seekers Media, a company based in Powell River, assisted in the original grant application and was then contracted to do the marketing work (videos, blogs, etc.). After a review of the program in 2019, we concluded that a Port Alberni presence in the campaign was needed, in part to seek a 'bigger bang for the buck', to develop local social media expertise and to ensure greater control of the content.

A Request for Proposal was directed to eight individuals and companies in Port Alberni who were known to work in the social media field. Only one respondent, Chris Pouget, provided responses to each request in the RFP and was subsequently hired under a six-month contract approved by the CAO. The engagement contract included an option to renew for a further one-year term. This was reported to Council on May 13th, 2019. On October 15th, 2019 Council approved renewal of the contract for a further one-year period. It was stated that an evaluation of the initiative would take place in April 2020. This evaluation was not done in large part because of the focus on a range of small business COVID-19 support initiatives, however anecdotal evidence suggests the initiative is meeting its goals.

The proposed six-month program extension would cost an estimated \$17,400 from the Economic Development operating budget. For the six-month period the City would seek to divide the work between two contractors, one of whom would be the current contractor Chris Pouget. The City's Purchasing Policy authorizes the



Economic Development Manager to approve this expenditure with concurrence from the CAO. However, the matter is being brought to Council for consideration because the program extension would extend beyond the one-year extension period in the previous engagement contract.

The contractors will be responsible for the following:

- posting to Instagram, Twitter and Facebook (five per week/per platform)
- creation and management of #ExplorePortAlberni web page and YouTube channel
- assisting in the creation of a social media strategy
- · developing and maintaining a social media calendar
- providing monthly reports to the City representative
- creating monthly videos (30 seconds in length) featuring unique people/experiences/initiatives in the Alberni Valley (not being covered by other components)
- producing a bi-weekly blog with images featuring stories about locals, the arts, events, etc.
- monitoring the three #ExplorePortAlberni channels and engaging with followers/commenters
- monitoring and engaging with other social media channels and groups as deemed appropriate
- · creating unique and current content/images for use in City run initiatives
- uploading photos to the City's image bank on a monthly basis
- assisting in the creation and implementation of a training program for social media reporters

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- 1. Extend the #ExplorePortAlberni program for six months and do an evaluation of it during that time while looking for other delivery options.
- 2. Evaluate the #ExplorePortAlberni program before deciding how to approach its future.

ANALYSIS

Option 1: Extend the program for six months

Pro: this would allow the momentum gained by the project to continue.

Con: the program funds could alternatively be invested in a formal evaluation of the initiative.

Option 2: Do an evaluation of the program before deciding on its future

Pro: if any concerns about the program exist, they would be resolved prior to deciding on its future

Con: the momentum that has been developed by this program would be lost

IMPLICATIONS

The primary implication of the recommendation is that a further six-month investment would be made in the #ExplorePortAlberni initiative.

COMMUNICATIONS

A range of stakeholders would be consulted about the #ExplorePortAlberni initiative while deciding on its future.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

SUMMARY

Council is being asked to approve a six-month extension of the #ExplorePortAlberni program that would allow for an evaluation of the initiative without losing momentum during that time.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

The opportunity presented by COVID-19 to attract people to our small community with its many desirable assets is somewhat unprecedented and should be leveraged by the #ExplorePortAlberni initiative. The City's Communications function cannot be expected to focus on this economic development/tourism initiative.

RECOMMENDATION[S]

Council direction is requested.

PURPOSE

For Council to consider returning to in-person meetings of Council.

BACKGROUND

In Spring of this year, the Province of British Columbia declared a state of emergency throughout the entire province in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. While a number of Ministerial/Public Health Orders have been issued since the declaration was made, the most recent and still current Order No. M192 |2020 addresses the ability to conduct meetings of Council without members of the public in attendance. The order goes further to state that a council must use best efforts to allow members of the public to attend an open meeting of council or body in a manner that is consistent with any applicable requirements or recommendations made under the Public Health Act.

In accordance with Ministerial Order 192 | 2020 Council endorsed a resolution at its July 13th Regular meeting that "future meetings of Council proceed without public present in accordance with the Ministerial Order until the basis of holding the meeting without members of the public in attendance is resolved".

Staff have been actively investigating opportunities to return to "in-person" meetings of Council which include both City owned and privately-operated facilities.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- 1. That Council direct staff to return to holding in-person meetings of Council at the Capital Theatre effective January 2021
- 2. That Council direct staff to return to holding in-person meetings at either Echo or Glenwood Centres effective January 2021
- 3. That Council resolve to continue to conduct meetings of Council electronically

ANALYSIS

A general analysis follows and will apply to all meetings of Council.



In order to conduct in-person meetings we are required to adhere to all public health orders such as:

- 50 persons maximum [assuming this is not more than the total number of persons permitted under the safety plan for the premises]
- administering a questionnaire to each attendee [e.g., are they feeling ill; have they recently travelled, have they been exposed to a confirmed case of COVID-19]
- recording contact information of all meeting attendees for the purpose of carrying out contact tracing if required
- any persons who leave the premises during the meeting are not to be replaced by other persons
- no more than two meetings may be hosted on the same premises in one day and if two meetings are held, there must be at least one hour between each meeting in order to permit mandated cleaning and sanitizing

Option No. 1 - Capital Theatre

City staff have had ongoing discussions with Mr. Brent Ronning, Past President, Capital Theatre regarding the use of this facility for the purpose of conducting in-person meetings of Council. An on-site visit was held and it has been determined that the theatre could accommodate Council, staff and members of the public, and adhere to all safety/distancing protocols. As required by WorkSafeBC, the Capital Theatre has the required COVID-19 safety plan in place. While the theatre has audio/visual equipment currently in place, the City would need to install additional equipment in order to facilitate recording and livestreaming of meetings. We anticipate these improvements to cost \$20,000. There would also be a rental charge of \$500 per day for use of the theatre [this to cover the costs of cleaning/sanitizing and a member of theatre staff to be present when the facility is being used]. Given the structure of the theatre, no additional time relating to set-up/take-down on the part of City staff would be required.

Option No. 2 – City owned Facilities [Echo/Glenwood Centre]

Staff also carried out site visits of City owned facilities and while either one of these locations could accommodate in-person meetings, both lack the necessary audio/visual equipment to accommodate recording/livestreaming of meetings. Costs estimates to equip either facility with the required equipment has been estimated to be \$30,000 or \$52,000 [see Appendix 'A' attached]. While there would be no direct rental cost, the City would experience a loss in revenues as a result of displacing the various user groups/organizations who rent/occupy either centre. Further, in addition to the costs to install necessary audio/visual equipment, there would also be costs associated with staff time to set-up and breakdown the space after each in-person meeting as well as costs associated with cleaning and sanitizing the facility.

Option No. 3 - Electronic Meetings

Council began conducting its meetings electronically [March 2020] via Zoom platform in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Since moving to this format, Council has been able to continue City business including engaging members of the general public. At times, participants have experienced technical difficulties during the meetings but generally, these occurrences are rare and/or quickly resolved.

IMPLICATIONS

A move to in-person meetings will require additional resources to manage Council, staff and public attendance and perhaps more so given the uptick in COVID-19 cases. Moving to in-person meetings will also require the purchase of additional equipment to facilitate live streaming/recording of meetings at locations outside of City Hall given City Hall Council Chambers is unable to accommodate more than 12 persons at one time.

Costs associated with returning to in-person meetings are as follows:

Option No. 1 – \$32,000 [\$20,000 equipment; \$12,000 rental fee based on 2 meetings per month [RCM]. Additional costs would apply should Council elect to reinstate Committee of the Whole and conduct Public Hearings in person.

Option No. 2 – \$30,000 [A] or \$52,000 [B] [Echo/Glenwood Centre]. These cost estimates do not speak to loss of rental revenue nor staff costs/time associated with meeting set-up/take-down and cleaning/sanitization. **Option No. 3** – Zoom Platform licence fee annual renewal \$13,200 [due March 2021].

COMMUNICATIONS

The Corporate Services Department will continue to provide information to the public regarding Council meetings and participation opportunities. Should Council elect to return to in-person meetings of Council in January 2021, this information will be communicated via the City's website and social media platforms. We are also legislatively required to provide public notice of Council meetings and the Corporate Services Department will advertise accordingly.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

Should Council elect to return to in-person meetings outside of City Hall, staff would bring forward an amendment to "Council Procedures Bylaw, 2013, Bylaw No. 4830", specifically, Part 2 – Council Meetings Time & Location.

SUMMARY

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Council for the City of Port Alberni moved to conducting its meetings electronically. With the issuance of Ministerial Order No. 192 | 2020, local governments who may accommodate in-person meetings safely and adhering to COVID-19 protocols/safety procedures, are encouraged to do so. The City may accommodate in-person meetings with the use of City facilities and/or the Capital Theatre. Given costs associated with equipment required to allow for recording/live streaming, staff are suggesting that only one venue be selected. The functionality of the theatre, its location, continuous set-up [i.e., no additional staff time required to set-up/take down after a meeting and cleaning/sanitization being carried out by Theatre staff], staff are recommending that Council resolve to hold its in-person meetings at the Capital Theatre, should the decision be made to return to in-person meetings of Council.

Options for holding public Council Meetings and Public Hearings at Echo Centre and Glenwood

These options are essentially the same as far as technology options go. The challenge is to be able to present the agenda, speadsheets, and presentation material on the projector screens so that it can be read from a long distance away. Watching a movie on a large screen from far away is quite easy. Reading small text from far away is quite difficult. Additionally, the screens would need to be placed high enough off the ground so that that heads would not block the view. The projector models for the single large screen are quite expensive. None of these options include the time and cost necessary for City staff to install the equipment. We do think that our existing Council Chambers video and audio equipment could be re-utilized for both Echo and Glenwood options.

1. Echo Centre – Cedar Rooms

- A. Dual projector screens with dual projectors this option would place the screens physically closer to the audience, making it slightly easier to read. From what we tested and measured out with assistance from staff at Echo a reasonable layout would be to start the first row 3ft back from the screen, and have three people across, then repeat each row adding one more person. Turning off the bank of lights overhead is required to not wash out the image too much. The 5th row is not comfortable to read with a 135" screen, but if we stretch out the image to what would be a 180" it seems reasonable to read. With the Cedar Room, there did not appear to be an appropriate layout for mayor, council, a couple staff, and more than 35 public. This becomes more constrained when trying to dedicate paths for entering and leaving. I would say Cedar room would not be the preferred option. We would recommend that a neutral rug could be rolled out below mayor/council to not cast reflective shadows and portable dividers (cubicle style) placed behind. This option does call for quite a bit of setup/teardown for the meetings. ~\$30,000
 - a. Dual 180" floor standing screens ~ \$4,000 each, ~ \$8,000 total

RECOMMENDATION[S]

This report is being provided for Council's information only.

PURPOSE

To update Council regarding a release of Bunker Oil at McLean Mill National Historic Site.

BACKGROUND

The City owns various heritage rail equipment, some of which has been maintained and operated for decades by Western Vancouver Island Industrial Heritage Society (WVIIHS). WVIIHS owns and operates Alberni Pacific Railway (APR).

Until 2020 the #7 heritage steam train operated by APR was fueled primarily by Bunker C Oil. Bunker oil is a low cost, heavy oil. In years past #7 operated on a regular schedule between the City's Train Station and McLean Mill National Historic Site. In order to have fuel on hand for #7 a rail tank car was stationed on a makeshift rail siding at McLean Mill.

Bunker oil was last purchased and placed in the rail tank car in 2019. That year the operation of #7 was curtailed due to breakdown. An undetermined amount of fuel remained in storage in the rail tank car. #7 did not operate in 2020.

Sometime prior to October 26th 2020 a valve was opened on the rail tank car, releasing Bunker oil from the tank onto the ground. WVIIHS members who are familiar with the rail tank car reported that the valve through which the oil was released was normally left in a closed position.

Immediately upon being made aware of the incident the City responded by engaging contractors and consultants to limit the extent of contamination and begin remediation. The rail tank care has been removed from the site, the rail siding and a portion of the McLean Mill spur line have been removed in order to access the contamination, and a historic Dip Tank has also been removed. The site has been described by the City's primary contractor as "stable and contained."

The City notified regulating authorities at the earliest opportunity. The City's insurer has appointed an adjustor to manage the insurance claim submitted by the City. The RCMP have opened a file investigating any wrongdoing related to the release of the oil.



ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

This report is provided for information only. No action is required by Council at this time.

ANALYSIS

Contamination from the release of Bunker oil at McLean Mill is expected to be fully remediated. The costs of remediation are not yet known. Some of those costs may be recoverable through the City's insurance provider.

The loss of the historic dip tank will not be fully recovered. At best a replica may be constructed.

The release of oil and the costs to respond to that incident come at a time when the City has been successful in controlling costs associated with McLean Mill, and after establishing a sustainable management structure for the site. The incident is partially a result of a legacy hazard remaining on site, and should cause the City to investigate and mitigate other legacy hazards for which the City is responsible.

IMPLICATIONS

The incident may require allocation of City funds.

COMMUNICATIONS

The City will continue to communicate with regulatory agencies and update the public as the response to the incident unfolds.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

SUMMARY

A release of Bunker oil from a rail tank car occurred at McLean Mill National Historic Site. The City has notified regulating authorities, engaged contractors to mitigate the damage, engaged the City's insurers, and reported the incident to the RCMP. As the incident response evolves the City will communicate outcomes to the community.

McLean Mill National Historic Site Oil Release

Port Alberni, BC – During the week of October 26th, the City responded to the report of a potential oil spill at McLean Mill National Historic Site. City personnel found that an undetermined amount of Bunker C oil had been released from a rail tank car on site. Early investigation into the cause of this incident indicated that the oil was released through a previously locked valve that was found to be in the 'open' position. How that valve came to be opened is currently being investigated by the R.C.M.P. The incident has been reported to the Ministry of Environment, Department of Fisheries and Oceans, and the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District.

The rail tank car had been located on a rail siding near the eastern property boundary. It had been used to store fuel for the #7 steam engine that operated between the City and McLean Mill.

Bunker C oil is the residual oil left over after the lighter, more volatile products such as gasoline, diesel and natural gas are distilled out of crude oil. Bunker C is a heavy oil commonly used by freighters. The oil that was released from the rail tank car at McLean Mill was approximately 93 percent Bunker C oil and 7 percent diesel fuel.

The City has mobilized several contractors and professional consultant firms in order to mitigate the environmental impact. Based on preliminary inspection reports from David Clough of D.R. Clough Consulting "it would appear that fuel spill and environmental damage was limited to the railway corridor and dip tank area. At this stage of the investigation based on the visual observations by on-site professionals, there appears to be no escape into surface waters."

The rail tank car has since been removed from the McLean Mill site and contractors are currently working to remove the contaminated rail ties and ballast. Consultants are working to determine an estimate of the volume released. At present, the site is stable and contained.

ALC Response to City Application for Non-farm Use Permissions

RECOMMENDATION[S]

That Council direct staff to prepare and submit an application to the Agricultural Land Commission to have the McLean Mill National Historic Site removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve.

PURPOSE

This report is provided to inform Council of a recent decision by the Agricultural Land Commission in response to the City's application for non-farm use, and to seek Council's direction with regard to making an application to have the McLean Mill site removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve.

BACKGROUND

In early 2020 the City was contacted by the ALC Compliance and Enforcement Branch regarding non-farming activities at McLean Mill. McLean Mill National Historic Site is within the ALR and therefore activities on site are subject to the authority of the ALC. On March 30, 2020 Council for the City of Port Alberni directed that an application be submitted to ALC seeking permissions for non-farm uses at McLean Mill. An application (attached) was submitted on May 1, 2020.

On November 3, 2020 the City received a response (attached) from ALC. The ALC response denies the non-farm use application, and makes the following statement,

"The Panel notes that it would accept a submission of an exclusion application for the Property for the Commission's consideration."

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

Option One: Submit an application to ALC to have the McLean Mill National Historic Site removed from the ALR.

Option Two: Submit to ALC a request for reconsideration.

Option Three: Take no further action.

ANALYSIS

Option Three (take no further action) will result in ALC continuing their enforcement efforts from earlier in 2020, requiring cessation of all activities that they deem to be "commercial," and may place in jeopardy other activities identified in the City's non-farm use application.

Option Two (request reconsideration) is not likely to result in a change to the ALC report based on the criteria identified for such requests.



Option One (apply to have McLean Mill National Historic Site removed from ALR) is the course of action most likely to result in enabling continuation of current services and activities at that site. Removal from the ALR would result in the City's use of the site being regulated primarily by the ACRD.

IMPLICATIONS

The recommended course of action is likely to result in the City's ability to continue current services and activities during the short term while the ALC considers the City's application, and if successful could enable the City to have the fullest latitude for use of the McLean Mill National Historic Site.

Not addressing the ALC land use restrictions will result in a reduction of services and activities at McLean Mill National Historic Site below current levels.

COMMUNICATIONS

Council's decision will be communicated to ALC and ACRD.

BYLAWS/PLANS/POLICIES

Council's decision may have effect on the McLean Mill National Historic Site operating agreement between the City and AV Chamber of Commerce.

SUMMARY

The City has received a response from ALC to the City's request for non-farm use permissions at McLean Mill National Historic Site. ALC has denied the City request, and included in the response report a reference to the potential for the City to make a further application to ALC to have the McLean Mill site excluded from the ALR. That course of action is recommended by staff.

Facilities to be included were a sawmill, support buildings such as repair shops, residences, cookhouse and bunkhouse as well as display and operation as a forestry and milling interpretation centre for tourism. From your discussions with this Officer and information we have received it seems the property has been used for commercial ventures outside the scope of what was included in the proposal.

Commission records indicate that the Property is within the Agricultural Land Reserve (the "ALR") and therefore is subject to the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (the "ALCA") Agricultural Land Reserve Use Regulation (the "Use Regulation").

Be advised that pursuant to s. 20(1) of the Act:

20(1) "A person must not use agricultural land for a non-farm use unless permitted by under section 25 or 45 of the regulations"

Based on the above information, I determine that you must submit a non-farm use application. Please submit the non-farm use application with respect to the Property as soon as possible. The application can be retrieved and subsequently submitted through the ALC's Application Portal via the ALC's website at: http://www.alc.gov.bc.ca/alc/content/applications-and-decisions

Proposal: The MMNHS was designated as a national historic site in 1989. Subsequent to that designation the City and the Government of Canada entered into an agreement for the funding and operation of MMNHS in a manner consistent with national historic site standards.

The parcel of land upon which MMNHS is located was created through subdivision. The subdivision was supported by the ALC specifically to enable the creation and operation of a national historic site. While the ALCs intent to enable creation and operation of a national historic site is evident, the documentation of that intent is limited and, as the City has recently discovered, extremely restrictive when considered relative to current ALC regulations. The City has received a letter from ALC dated February 6th 2020 referencing activities at MMNHS that ALC regards as being non-permitted non-farm use.

The City is of the opinion that the ALC never intended to impose extreme restrictions on the operation of the MMNHS, and does not now desire to do so. Accordingly the City hereby requests that ALC provide clarity regarding permissions in order to reflect ALCs clear original intent to support the operation of a national historic site. ALCs action is required in order to enable the City, ALC, ACRD, and the community at large to move beyond the current uncertainty regarding matters of compliance at MMNHS. Although the MMNHS is unique and there are aspects to its operations that reflect that uniqueness, activities at the MMNHS are consistent with activities at other historic sites. This report will identify current and envisioned activities, and demonstrate that the same or similar activities commonly occur at national historic sites.

The agreement between the City and the Government of Canada for operation and funding of the MMNHS requires the City to undertake two primary responsibilities;

- 1. Preserve the heritage
- 2. Present the heritage

On the former, the City is actively engaged in preserving the heritage through provision of security and fire protection as well as maintenance and capital building restoration projects. Funding for preservation and restoration of the heritage is provided by the City, grants from ACRD and Parks Canada, as well as accumulated funds derived from a 10% heritage fee that is applied to every booking and purchase associated with the site.

On the latter, the City endeavours to create opportunities for as many people as possible, and from as wide a cross section of society as possible. This approach is consistent with the Citys obligations set out in the agreement between the City and the Government of Canada as well as with the McLean Mill Operating Plan which is referenced in the funding agreement.

- 2. Operation of a heritage tourism rail service carrying visitors between the City and MMNHS
- 3. Occupancy by a live-in caretaker and caretaker's immediate family
- 4. Camping
- 5. Food services
- 6. Operation of a gift shop
- 7. Operation of an interpretive center
- 8. Tours
- 9. Hosting of events, festivals, celebrations and programs within the permissible limits of the land use zoning and other regulating factors set by the local government (ACRD) and regulated by the local government
- 10. Operation of a not-for-profit fish hatchery, and associated activities and programs

The Strategy

The City's strategy for preserving and presenting the heritage at MMNHS includes the following:

- The site is open to the public 365 days per year
- No entry fee to access the site
- Encourage self-exploration of the site, supported by passive interpretation
- City directly manages the historic zone within the larger site. This insures the integrity of the historic zone, and provides for maintenance of the historic assets
- Alberni Valley Chamber of Commerce is contracted to operate the non-historic zone. The Chamber is best positioned to advertise the site, increase visitors to the site, enhance the quality of visitor experiences, and to generate revenues that are used to operate the site and preserve the heritage
- A heritage fee (10%) is levied against every booking and transaction associated with MMNHS. Heritage fee funds are directed to capital projects that preserve and restore the heritage assets
- All scheduled activities must support at least one of the City's primary responsibilities, preferably both. Activities should introduce people to the heritage aspects of MMNHS, and should also generate a monetary contribution that assists in preserving that heritage.



Current Activities at MMNHS

1. Operation of a Heritage Steam-powered Sawmill and Other Heritage Steam-powered Equipment

The central component of MMNHS is a complete operating steam-powered sawmill that was last operated commercially by the McLean family in 1965.

2. Operation of a Heritage Tourism Rail Service

The Alberni Pacific Railway operates a heritage tourism rail service carrying passengers between the historic Train Station in the heart of Port Alberni to a debarkation deck at MMNHS. Rail service is provided on a regular schedule basis during the tourism season as well as being offered as a component of special events at MMNHS.

Both regularly scheduled and special event rail trips provide an important interpretive opportunity for visitors. Their heritage experience is broadened, including by the appreciation for the remoteness of the MMNHS and the challenges that would have been presented for those living and working there.









Operation of heritage transportation methods is consistent with activities at other historic sites such as, BC Forest Discovery Centre, Kettle Valley Railway, Kamloops Heritage Railway, West Coast Railway Heritage Park,



3. Occupancy by a Live-in Caretaker and Caretaker's Immediate Family
In order to provide for site security and maximize the safety of site users, a live-in
caretaker resides on site.

4. Camping

Short term, low impact camping is an integral component of the City's strategy at MMNHS. Camping enables visitors travelling by vehicle or cycle to interact with the site longer than the hour or two that is common for visitors who are passing through, deepening the experience of those visitors who choose to spend more time on the site. Camping also enables visitors to interact with the heritage during the quieter morning and evening time periods, when the experience is considerably different and impactful.



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The ability to overnight at MMNHS increases the number of visitors to the site. Many visitors to the Alberni Valley Visitor Centre report that they cannot take the time to visit MMNHS on their current trip because they must travel to their overnight destination. Camping on site directly contributes to the City's ability to present the heritage to as broad a segment of society as possible.

5. Food Services

6. Gift Shop

MMNHS houses a small gift shop where visitors can purchase mementos of their visit to the site. Purchases at the gift shop enable visitors to take with them mementos of their visit and/or share their experience with others through authentic keepsake gifts. In either case the MMNHS heritage experience is broadened by visitor use of the Gift Shop.

7. Interpretive Centre

The Interpretive Centre is located on the MMNHS property, outside of the "Heritage Zone." The Interpretive Centre is co-located with the Gift Shop, food services, public washroom facility, courtyard, and office. The Interpretive Centre is strategically located so that visitors arriving by vehicle, cycle or train pass through the Interpretive Centre area prior to entering the Historic Zone.

8. Tours

9. Event Hosting

Hosting events is critical to the City's ability to fulfill its two primary responsibilities at MMNHS, preserving the heritage and presenting the heritage.

Preserving the Heritage: Events generate revenues that help to defray operating costs and directly fund capital projects that restore aging heritage assets. As mentioned earlier, a 10% Heritage Fee is applied to all sales and bookings. That Heritage Fee is used to fund capital restoration projects.

Presenting the Heritage: Events provide a unique opportunity to broaden the range of visitors to the MMNHS.

Some visitors seek out MMNHS because they desire to interact with the heritage aspects of the site. However, there is a significant segment of society both locally and further afield that would not otherwise visit MMNHS if they were not there for a special event. Hosting of special events is the best means of engaging this segment of society.

Fifty percent of the City's primary responsibility as caretaker of MMNHS is to present the heritage to as many people as possible and from as broad a range of society as possible. The hosting of a wide range of events is the City's best method to achieve that.

It should not go unnoticed that site access is provided at MMNHS 365 day per year for those who are self-motivated to interact with the heritage. That no-fee access is enabled by the event fees paid by those who would not otherwise visit the site or support the preservation of its heritage assets.

All activities listed below and elsewhere in this submission are permissible within the land use zoning regulation and bylaws of the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District, and meet the requirements of other regulatory bodies such as Vancouver Island Health Authority.

The types of events that are currently hosted and/or envisioned to be hosted in the future at MMNHS are many and varied. They include:

- School Programs and Events: A broad range of guided interactive curriculumbased programs for Grades K to 12 that include history, social study, forestry and science themes.
- Family Events: Family events include but are not limited to Breakfast with Santa, Christmas light festival, Jeepers Creepers (Halloween), seasonal craft fairs, Harry Potter themed events, *Our Town* (free family activities), vintage vehicle/equipment shows, bicycle rodeo, City of Port Alberni Parks and Recreation programs, Mother's Day –Father's Day events, Cubs/Brownies/scouts sleepovers.
- Community Events: (example includes *Paper Chase* (10 km race on the Vancouver Island circuit), Days with the Arts, Forest Festival, Spoken Word Festival.
- **Memorial Services:** The heritage site provides a unique and solemn setting to reflect on the passing of a loved one



- Weddings/Birthday Parties: Wedding ceremonies and receptions are hosted in the dining hall area, and wedding photographs often take place in the Heritage Zone where the heritage assets make terrific photo backgrounds. Weddings are often themed based on steam, steam trains or heritage in general. In some cases ceremonies occur in the Heritage Zone where they are strictly managed in order to protect the heritage assets and the unfettered access of others to the heritage
- Themed Events: (examples include cycling organization gatherings, art classes and showings, archery club weekend events, Black Powder club weekend events, Loggers Sports events, Blacksmithing classes and events, Improv Nights, BBQ Dinner Theatre events)
- Corporate Events: include team building and/or strategic planning workshops
- Music Festivals: Can range from Music in the Park afternoons, Sunday Morning Gospel Train, Starlight Concert and Lumber Deck Dance events that attract handfuls of musicians and listeners, to multi-day music festivals that attract hundreds of visitors over a weekend.

Given that the ALC's insistence that the City submit an application for non-farm use may have resulted from a complaint about a music festival at MMNHS, a more detailed summary of an annual multi-day music festival hosted at MMNHS is provided as an appendix to this submission.

10. Fish Hatchery

In 2000 a fish hatchery was established on the MMNHS outside of the Heritage Zone. The Alberni Valley Enhancement Association (AVEA) operates the hatchery under the guidance of West Coast Aquatic. The AVEA's hatchery has increased the numbers of Coho salmon returning to Kitsuksis Creek, and has also supported the rebuilding of salmon stocks in other streams in the Alberni Valley.











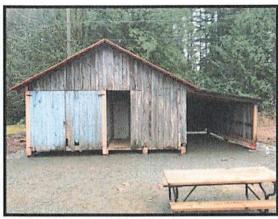


11. Works Necessary for Preservation of Heritage

12. Works Necessary to Protect the Environment

The City has an obligation to meet federal and provincial regulations regarding protection of the environment. Activities undertaken in that regard are regulated by federal, provincial, and/or local governments.











Protection of the natural environment is consistent with activities at all historic sites.

13. Works Necessary to Protect Built and Natural Assets

Protection of built and natural assets is a fundamental responsibility of the caretaker (in this case the City) of a site like MMNHS. When McLean Mill was establishment it imposed a negative impact on the natural environment. Since that time equilibrium has been established that involves in some ways the dependence of the natural environment on McLean Mill infrastructure. For example, the installation of the Log Pond would have created a considerable negative impact on many aspects of the natural environment. Since construction of the Log Pond the natural environment has adapted and now a new natural equilibrium exists that is dependent upon the maintenance and operation of the Log Pond. It is now incumbent upon the City to maintain the Log Pond as a built asset in order to protect the natural environment that has become dependent upon it.



Other similar balances exist, for which the City has a responsibility to ensure protection, and the City must be unfettered in taking actions in this regard, with the goal being maintenance of current built and natural elements of the site.

Please find attached the Reasons for Decision of the Island Panel for the above noted application (Resolution #527/2020). As agent, it is your responsibility to notify the applicant accordingly.

Under section 33 of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (ALCA), a person affected by a decision (e.g. the applicant) may submit a request for reconsideration. Please be advised however that on March 12th, 2020 the ALC Amendment Act (<u>Bill 15 – 2019</u>) was brought into force and effect, changing the reconsideration process.

A request to reconsider must now meet the following criteria:

- No previous request by an affected person has been made, and
- The request provides evidence not available at the time of the original decision that has become available, and that could not have been available at the time of the original decision had the applicant exercised due diligence, or
- The request provides evidence that all or part of the original decision was based on evidence that was in error or was false.

The amendments also propose a change to limit the time period for requesting a reconsideration to 90 days from the date of this decision – this change has not been brought into force and effect yet. As a result, a person affected by this decision will have one year from the date of this decision's release as per <u>ALC Policy P-08: Request for Reconsideration</u> to request reconsideration of the decision <u>or</u> 90 days from the date the legislative change takes effect (date unknown at this time), whichever comes sooner.

 - conduct works necessary to protect the environment and built and natural assets.
- [4] The issue the Panel considered is whether the Proposal is an appropriate non-farm use on land within the ALR.



- [5] The Proposal was considered in the context of the purposes and priorities of the Commission set out in s. 6 of the ALCA:
 - 6 (1) The following are the purposes of the commission:
 - (a) to preserve the agricultural land reserve;
 - (b) to encourage farming of land within the agricultural land reserve in collaboration with other communities of interest; and,
 - (c) to encourage local governments, first nations, the government and its agents to enable and accommodate farm use of land within the agricultural land reserve and uses compatible with agriculture in their plans, bylaws and policies.
 - (2) The commission, to fulfill its purposes under subsection (1), must give priority to protecting and enhancing all of the following in exercising its powers and performing its duties under this Act:
 - (a) the size, integrity and continuity of the land base of the agricultural land reserve;
 - (b) the use of the agricultural land reserve for farm use.

EVIDENTIARY RECORD

- [6] The Proposal along with related documentation from the Applicant, Agent, local government and Commission is collectively referred to as the "Application." All documentation in the Application was disclosed to the Agent in advance of this decision.
- [7] Commissioner Linda Michaluk conducted a walk-around site visit on August 28, 2020 in accordance with the *ALC Policy Regarding Site Visits in Applications*, (the "Site Visit"). A site visit report (the "Site Visit Report") was prepared in accordance with the *Policy Regarding Site Visits in Applications*. The Site Visit Report was certified as accurately reflecting the observations and discussions of the Site Visit by the Agent on September 2, 2020.



BACKGROUND

- [8] The McLean Mill began its operation in 1926 and ceased operating as a working mill in 1965. In 1989 it was designated as a National Historic Site by the federal government (i.e. the MMNHS). At that time, an agreement was signed between the City of Port Alberni (the "City") and Government of Canada to restore and operate the MMNHS in a manner consistent with National Historic Site standards.
- [9] In 1985, Application ID 19143 was submitted to the Commission to include properties into, and exclude properties from, the ALR as part of the ALC's Alberni Fine-Tuning review. Several amendments were made to the areas to be included into, and excluded from, the ALR between 1985 and 1989. As a result of the fine-tuning review, portions of the Property's two parent properties were included into the ALR. The application was approved by way of ALC Resolution #354/89 and was authorized by Order-In-Council No.1631 in 1990.
- [10] In 1991, ALC Application ID 26491 was submitted to the Commission to subdivide a 12.8 ha parcel (the Property) from two subject properties (previously included into the ALR under ALC Resolution #354/89). The purpose of the application was to develop the site as a historic sawmilling complex for educational and interpretive use by the public in partnership with the Province of British Columbia (Heritage Conservation Branch) and Environment Canada (Canadian Parks Service). The National Historic Site facilities would include a "sawmill, various buildings including repair shops, residences, a cookhouse and, as well as display and operate as a forestry and milling interpretation centre for tourism." The Commission approved the subdivision for the purpose of developing the MMNHS by ALC Resolution #734/92, subject to the consolidation of the remaining 67.4 ha of the subject properties with an adjacent property (District Lot 161).
- [11] In 1992, the Commission received a request for reconsideration of ALC Resolution #734/92 from the City. Upon review, the Commission removed the consolidation conditions of ALC Resolution #734/92 by way of ALC Resolution #1323/92 and noted that



"the land referred to in the application continues to be subject to the provisions of the Act and regulations except as provided by this approval."

- [12] In 1995, substantial restoration of the existing buildings on the Property began and in 2000 the MMNHS was opened to tourists in various capacities.
- [13] In 2020, the ALC received complaints about commercial activities occurring on the Property. On February 6, 2020, an ALC Compliance & Enforcement Officer advised the City that some of the current uses taking place on the Property were not permitted as specified in the ALC's original decision (ALC Resolution #734/92), and the ALCA and its regulations, and that the City would be required to submit a non-farm use application to bring the uses into compliance.
- [14] In June 2020, the City subsequently submitted the current application (ALC Application 60615) to the Commission. The Application indicates that the intention of ALC Application 26491 was clear in that the Property was to be subdivided, and restored as a National Historic Site and a forestry and mill interpretation centre, although ALC Resolutions #734/92 and #1323/92 do not refer to any approval of non-farm use on the Property. For this reason, the Application was submitted with the purpose of clarifying the original intent of ALC Resolution #734/92, so as to determine whether the existing ancillary uses are permitted under the approval.
- [15] The Property currently contains the McLean Mill (operating since 1926), a mill pond, several restored historic buildings, interpretive centre facilities (constructed in 1997), a fish hatchery facility (constructed by the Alberni Valley Enhancement Association in 1999), a kitchen facility (constructed in 1997, upgraded in 2017) and several trails. A number of public events are hosted on the Property, including the Five Acre Shaker Music Festival, school programs, family events and weddings. A portion of the Property is forested.



EVIDENCE AND FINDINGS

[16] The Application was submitted on May 1, 2020 and was forwarded to the Commission by the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District (ACRD) on June 26, 2020. On March 12, 2020, the ALCA was amended and changes were made to its regulations. The Applicant was given an opportunity to make written submissions relating to the amendment of the ALCA and changes to its regulations as it relates to this application.

Issue: Whether the Proposal is an appropriate non-farm use on land within the ALR.

- [17] To assess agricultural capability on the Property, the Panel referred to agricultural capability ratings. The ratings are identified using the BC Land Inventory (BCLI), 'Land Capability Classification for Agriculture in B.C.' system. The improved agricultural capability ratings applicable to the Property are Class 2, Class 3, Class 4 and Class 5, more specifically 50% (8:3TP 2:4T), 20% (6:3TP 4:O5W), 9% (7:3TP 3:O3W), 7% (7:3TP 3:O3W), 7% (8:3TP 2:4T) and 7% (5:2DC 5:2C).
 - Class 2 land is capable of producing a wide range of crops. Minor restrictions of soil or climate may reduce capability but pose no major difficulties in management.
 - Class 3 land is capable of producing a fairly wide range of crops under good management practices. Soil and/or climate limitations are somewhat restrictive.
 - Class 4 land is capable of a restricted range of crops. Soil and climate conditions require special management considerations.
 - Class 5 land is capable of production of cultivated perennial forage crops and specially adapted crops. Soil and/or climate conditions severely limit capability.
 - The limiting subclasses associated with this parcel of land are C (adverse climate), D (undesirable soil structure), P (stoniness), T (topographic limitations) and W (excess water).



- [18] Based on the agricultural capability ratings, the Panel finds that the Property has mixed prime and secondary agricultural capability. However, after reviewing the Application material and conducting the Site Visit, the Panel finds that the Property's agricultural capability is significantly limited due to its historical use as a mill site, as a large portion of the Property is comprised of heritage buildings and equipment, the heritage rail and the fish hatchery. As such, the Panel finds there is limited area available on the Property for non-soil bound agriculture to occur. Further, based on the MMNHS Contamination Assessment prepared by Envirochem Special Projects Inc. in 1994, which accompanied the Application, the Panel finds that the land has been exposed to many years of soil contamination as a result of the mill operation and various other activities that occurred on the Property prior to its designation as a National Historic Site. The Panel finds that years of soil contamination from the Property's industrial and commercial uses have disturbed the soil's nutrients and composition thereby limiting the Property's current and future potential for soil-bound agriculture.
- [19] The Panel recognizes the historical use of the Property as a mill and acknowledges that no agricultural activity has ever occurred in the Property. The Panel also notes that the Property, due to its historical site classification, soil contamination, site buildings and related infrastructure has limited opportunities for agricultural use and therefore has no significant soil or non-soil bound agricultural potential. However, in considering an application for non-farm use, the Panel must consider factors such as whether the Proposal would aid in preserving agricultural land, or if it supports or benefits agriculture. Clearly, the Proposal does not contribute to these aims, and therefore, the Panel finds that so long as the Property remains in the ALR, it does not consider the Proposal to be an appropriate use of ALR land.
- [20] The Panel also acknowledges that funding for the preservation and restoration of the Property is provided by the City, grants from the ACRD and Parks Canada, and accumulated funds derived from a 10% heritage fee applied to bookings and purchases associated with the National Historic Site. However, the Panel finds that the financial benefit associated with the commercial and tourism activities occurring on the Property do



not justify them as appropriate non-farm uses in the ALR. The Panel finds that the activities support the historical site rather than agriculture and do not supplement a farmer's income and support agriculture as was intended by designated farm uses and permitted non-farm uses under the ALCA and its regulations. Therefore, the Panel finds that the Proposal is not an appropriate non-farm use in the context of the purposes of the Commission as set out in s. 6 of the ALCA and provides no benefit to agriculture.

[21] The Panel notes that it would accept the submission of an exclusion application for the Property for the Commission's consideration. Any such application would be considered by the Commission based on the application's merits and in the context of the Commission's mandate.

DECISION

- [22] For the reasons given above, the Panel refuses the Proposal to continue operating the MMNHS's ancillary commercial and tourism uses on the Property.
- [23] These are the unanimous reasons of the Panel.
- [24] A decision of the Panel is a decision of the Commission pursuant to s. 11.1(3) of the ALCA.

PURPOSE

To consider abandoning the proposed Official Community Plan (OCP) and Zoning bylaw amendments for 2170 Mallory Drive as both the applicant and new owner have requested to suspend the rezoning process.

BACKGROUND

The City received a development application to amend the OCP and the City's Zoning bylaw for 2170 Mallory Drive in order to expand the industrial uses permitted on the subject property. Council gave 1st and 2nd reading to the proposed bylaws at the May 25, 2020 meeting and a Public Hearing was held on September 8, 2020.

At Council's Regular meeting on September 14, 2020, Council was asked to consider 3rd reading but elected to not proceed at that time. On October 3, 2020 the applicant sent an e-mail to the Manager of Planning requesting that the City suspend the rezoning process given the subject property had sold. On November 2, 2020, the new property owner provided the City with a letter requesting that the City not proceed with the proposed bylaw amendments.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS

- 1. Abandon Bylaw No. 5009, Bylaw No. 5010, and Bylaw No. 5011.
- 2. Provide alternative direction.

ANALYSIS

IMPLICATIONS

Both the applicant and the new property owner have requested that the City not proceed with the rezoning process, as the new owners do not require the M1 – Light Industry zoning. Abandoning the bylaws will result in the property remaining zoned as 'P1 Institutional' and designated as 'Residential'. The property will not be included in the Industrial Development Permit Area.

The applicant had proposed the following Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw amendments for the property located at 2170 Mallory Drive:

- 1. The subject property, is currently designated 'Residential' on the Official Community Plan Schedule A Land Use Map. An amendment is requested to change the designation to 'Industrial'.
- 2. The property is not within a Development Permit Area on the Schedule B Development Permit Areas Map. An amendment is required to include the property in **Development Permit Area No. 3 Industrial.**
- 3. The subject property, is currently zoned 'P1 Institutional' on the Zoning Bylaw Schedule A Zoning Map. An amendment is requested to rezone a portion of the subject property to 'M1 Light Industry' zone.

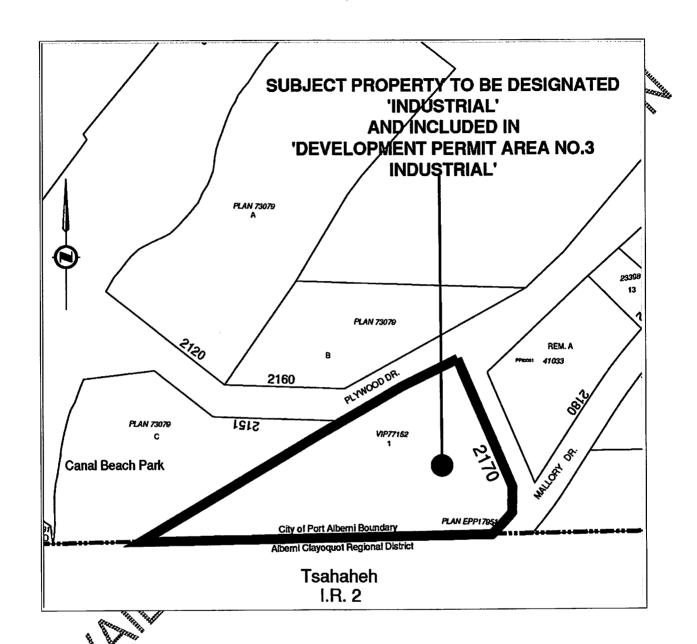

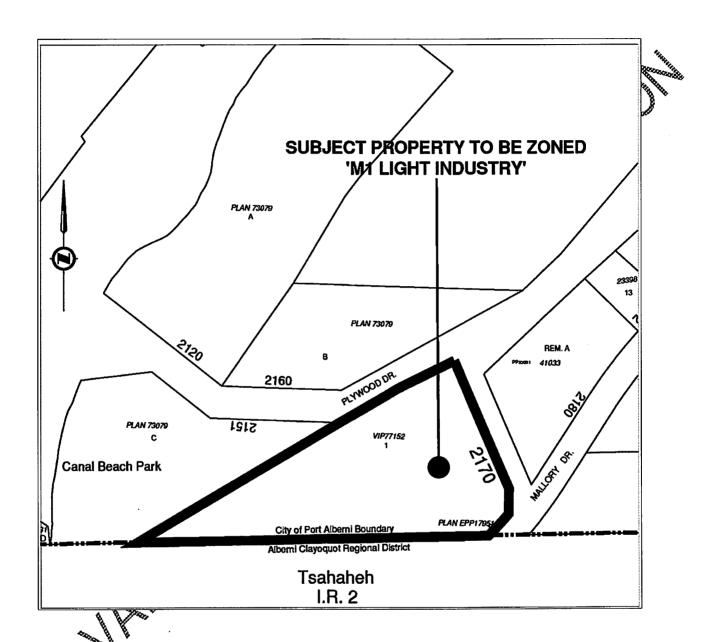

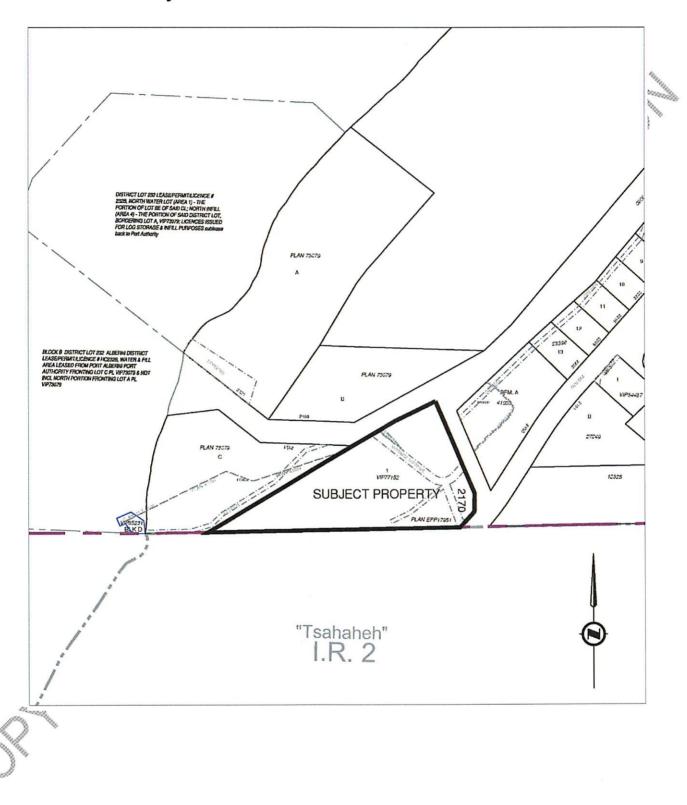

I write this letter to address the urgent need for a transitional action plan for our homeless community in Port Alberni, currently occupying the vacant lot adjacent to the Port Alberni Shelter Society by means of a pop-up tent city.

It has been petitioned as a solution to reopen the old shelter site to house the vulnerable individuals living in the tent city community though understood it is not just as easy as unlocking the front door and letting everyone in!

As both a community service provider currently operating a supportive living environment, having insight to the needs of these individuals as well as a front line volunteer to the most recent activities of the tent city community I am writing to put forth an expression of interest to assist in making this a viable option. Time is of the essence as the impending colder and wetter weather is evident.

If the old shelter site, offering up to the 48 existing beds could be accessed or any other appropriate facility for that matter, I would like to offer my knowledge and ability to work collaboratively with any and or all funding agencies such as but not limited to the City of Port Alberni, BC Housing, Island Health, First Nations Health Authority, Local Band offices etc. to facilitate the services required to get these individuals off the streets and accessing their basic needs. Safe shelter & Nutrition, connection to medical services and resources and an overall watchful eye to their general well-being.

Organizing volunteers, staffing models, grants, funding options, food service and day to day site operations are within our organization's capacity. Insurances, registrations, licenses and legalities will be a challenge to obtain when the urgency is in the forefront, concessions may need to be discussed. A timeline upon entering any agreement could be providing service within a 7-day timeframe if support from all stakeholders can be obtained.



I am hopeful this letter can be added to the agenda and presented at the scheduled city council meeting this upcoming week and further discussion can be scheduled with myself and some of the advocates of our homeless community.

We look forward to your response and appreciate your recognition of the urgency to this matter before us.

As Deputy Minister, I am pleased to acknowledge the topics raised during our conference call, which included an update on some of the mental health and substance use challenges Port Alberni is seeing and the RCMP's new Indigenous Safety Team.

In our meeting, we discussed the successful launch of the Indigenous Safety Team, which focuses on harm reduction, crime prevention, and street-level outreach. I look forward to receiving updates on this wonderful program and wish you continued success with this initiative.

You also noted the strain the COVID-19 pandemic has put on local service providers and the higher than average rates of overdose and poverty in Port Alberni as compared to national rates.

I encourage you to engage with Island Health to see if they are able to provide any support towards additional resources to the Indigenous Safety Team. As mentioned in our call, I had also suggested you reach out to the Special Committee on Reforming the Police Act when they begin their consultation phase to highlight the success of the Indigenous Safety Team, however; as government is now in transition, the Legislative Assembly and its committees were dissolved on September 21, 2020.

Now that we are in the election period, issues regarding future funding programs and other policy decisions must be deferred until after the election is complete and the incoming government is in place. All topics brought up in your meeting will be shared with the incoming Minister.

Dry Dock Project Update - I appreciate the progress made to advance the Dry Dock project over the past year, including efforts to gather broader stakeholder support through the formation of the Port Alberni Dry Dock Committee. The breadth and diversity of stakeholder support for the Committee demonstrates the importance of this project to your community.

The September 2020 study commissioned to understand the economic and social benefits of the project is a helpful addition to the 2018 market assessment. As discussed, if submitted, the Ministry of Jobs, Economic Development and Competitiveness (Ministry) will review the study and discuss with the appropriate government officials as required.

The provincial government understands the fiscal impacts that COVID-19 has placed on local service providers. To help address these challenges, in September the Province of British Columbia announced nearly \$2 billion in joint federal/provincial spending, including: \$540 million for local governments, \$418 million for community infrastructure, and \$1 billion for transit, TransLink and ferries.

The \$540 million for local governments was further divided into three funding streams. Two of the streams ("Development Services" for \$15 million and "Strengthening Communities" for \$100 million) will be application-based funding. More information on these funding streams will be forthcoming.

The third stream will provide direct grants to local governments. This funding stream is called the "COVID-19 Safe Restart Grants for Local Governments" and will provide up to \$425 million for local operations impacted by COVID-19. This funding will support local governments as they deal with increased operating costs and lower revenue due to COVID-19. It will also ensure local governments can continue to deliver the services people depend on in their communities. Eligible costs will include:

- addressing revenues shortfalls;
- facility reopening and operating costs;
- emergency planning and response costs;
- bylaw enforcement and protective services like fire protection and police;
- computer and other electronic technology costs (to improve interconnectivity and virtual communications);
- services for vulnerable persons (e.g. persons living with disabilities, mental illness or addictions, persons experiencing homelessness or other vulnerabilities); and
- other related costs.

I am pleased to advise you that **Port Alberni** is the recipient of a \$3,536,000 grant under the COVID-19 Safe Restart Grant for Local Governments. This amount will be directly transferred to your local government in the coming days.

Under section 36 of the Local Government Grants Regulation, the amount of the grant to each local government is set by Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. The determination of this amount was based on a formula that applies to all municipalities.

This formula is based on two components: a flat funding amount and an "adjusted per-capita" amount. The flat amount is \$169,000, and the "adjusted per-capita" amount is \$308.34 per adjusted population.

The adjusted population formula is designed to ensure that larger municipalities receive more money than smaller ones, but that smaller municipalities receive higher per capita funding than larger ones. This is because small municipalities often lack a diverse tax base and the economies-of-scale to easily restart their operations.

An example of the funding formula (for a municipality of 43,000 people) is provided as an attachment to this letter. If you wish, you can apply this formula to your 2018 population of **18,803** to determine both your adjusted population and total funding amount. 2018 population data was used because it is the last year in which we have complete financial and demographic data for each municipality.

To ensure full transparency regarding the use of funds, your local government will be required to annually report on how it spent this grant. This will be part of your annual financial reporting under section 167 of the Community Charter. Your local government will provide a schedule to the audited financial statements respecting the amount of funding received, the use of those funds, and the year-end balance of unused funds. Your local government must continue to annually report on the use of grant money until the funds are fully drawn down.
